Mr. Pfanner's project of connecting Hillsboro and Forest Grove with a telephone line is a commendable one. The business over the long distance line is now so large that one frequent line has to wait many minutes for an opportunity to use the line. Mr. Pfanner's line will run directly to the court house, to the bank and to the law offices, so that business men will lose little or no time in communicating with Forest Grove. Mr. Pfanner's line already connects Forest Grove and Greenville, so that when the proposed line is built we can talk with people north of the base line. The line is not to be built for general business, yet the public will be permitted to use it.

Dr. Bowser reports that Mr. Nepp, living east of Glencoe, lost a valuable mare a few days ago, by the gross carelessness of one of his sons. One son was drawing wood from the wood lot, and had on a load. The other son was out getting milk from the wagon to ride in the house. He had his gun at full cock. The piece was discharged, the whole load striking the mare in the hip and crushing the pelvic bone. Loss, \$150. And this leads to the remark that the practice of gunners, when piece at full-cock, is dangerous. Only last week a boy, who lost an arm, furnished an item. Now, this one. Since writing the paragraph last week wherein the number of cases of tardy pupils were compared, attention has been called to several reports on file in the superintendent's office. One school, with an enrollment of 30, reports 25 tardy pupils, and the next month, when the enrollment had increased to 36, the tardy marks were 28. Another school with 22, reports 27 tardy marks, while another school enrolling 94 scholars had 96 tardy marks the first month, 82 the second and 15 the third. Other instances might be quoted, but enough has been said to emphasize the fact that the subject of promptness needs closer attention. It will be unfortunate for the youth of this county if they be allowed to come to maturity with the tardy habits engendered upon them.

The Argus met a new immigrant this week. Our neighbor thus writes the interview:

An old patriarch who stated that he hailed from Kansas, passed through the city the other day, enroute for the mountains where he intended taking up a homestead. His covered wagon contained all his worldly effects, tools, wife, and seven children, ranging from 5 to 19 years, the 4 eldest being girls grown, and the younger three being future voters. Although he was grizzled by the hoary frosts of time, hope still nestled in his heart and occasionally sent up to his head a cheering telephonic message. "Yes," he said to THE ARGUS reporter, "I am going up to the foothills to take me up a homestead. It will be hard rustling for awhile but my patient will come within 5 years and will take time out for me to borrow a couple of thousand dollars for 5 years, and that will take me right down the line." "But," said our reporter, "suppose you lose your land?" "Oh no, no danger of that. You see the government will simply take a few acres of the land in case the loan is not met, instead of selling to the highest bidder. The land thus reverting to the United States, will again be subject to entry, and by that time my oldest boy can file his homestead, and we will still hold the land in our family, which is nothing more than right. It will come, sure, and if it does not, the government might as well sell out." This idea was revelation to the reporter and he repaired to solitude, meditating over the character of Micawber and Col. Sellers.

LAST BUTCHERY.

The last massacre of Armenians at Trebizond, Turkey, is particularly described in the London dispatches of November 1st, as follows:

On Friday, October 4, there were extensive movements of armed men. About 11 o'clock they seemed to disperse, and nothing especially worthy of mention occurred through the night. On Saturday, October 5, the excitement in the town was very intense. The Consul had a consultation, and, going in a body to the Vail, earnestly pressed him to arrest those who were exciting the people to acts of outrage. The Vail declined to do so, but promised in his own way to do the right thing.

Until Monday, October 7, matters seemed to be quieting down, when an incident stirred up the excitement again. On the previous Friday night one of the leading Turks of the town was wounded on the street, some say by one of his own companions, other that he was shot by an Armenian whom he was trying to arrest. On Monday he died, and the funeral received the excitement in an intensified form, and loud and many were the threats of massacre that night, and hundreds of the Armenians rushed to places of safety. The next morning, October 8, all dispersed in the hope the danger was past. Men went to their shops and were encouraged to

open them, as they had not done for two or three previous days.

Suddenly, like a clap of thunder in a clear sky, the trouble began. Unsuspecting people, walking along the streets, were shot down. Men standing or sitting quietly at their shop doors were instantly dropped with a bullet through their heads or hearts. Their aim was deadly, and so far no wounded have been reported. They passed through the quarters where only old men and children remained, killing them and large boys, generally permitting the women and younger children to live. For five hours' this horrible work of inhuman butchery went on, the cracking of musketry, sometimes like a volley from a platoon of soldiers, but more often single, from near and distant points the crashing in of doors, and the thud of sword blows sounded on our ears, then the sound of musketry died away, and the work of looting began. Every shop of an Armenian in the market was gutted, and the victims in this cowardly and brutal way glutted themselves with the spoils.

For hours bales of broadcloth, cotton goods and every conceivable kind of merchandise were passed along without molestation to the houses of the spoilers. The intention evidently was to impoverish and as near as possible to blot out the Armenians of this town. So far as appearance went the police and the soldiers distinctly aided in this savage work. They were mingled with the armed men, and so far as we could see, made not the least effort to check them. Apparently they took care to see that the right one—that is the Armenians—were killed; also, that an offer of surrender might be made to all that were found unarmed. To any found with arms no quarter was given, but large numbers were shot down without any proffer of this kind. This talk of surrender would seem to be on the supposition that all were in an attitude of resistance.

One poor fellow, when called on to surrender, thought he was called on to give up his religion, and when he refused he was hacked to pieces in the presence of his wife and children.

While I write the town is in a great stir, because news has come that the village Armenians, thoroughly armed, are on their way to attack the town. The real fact, however, seems to be that the massacre is extending to the villages, but the constant effort is to show that this affair is only the lull of an insurrection, like at Sassoon. Not one of the perpetrators of these outrages has been arrested or disarmed, but all have moved about with the utmost freedom to accomplish their nefarious purposes. On the other hand, many of the Armenians are in prison.
