Counsel Koebel, of San Francisco, is making inquiries of county clerks in Oregon to find out how many subjects of his government—Austria-Hungary—have become naturalized citizens of the American republic from 1880 to 1900. County Clerk Grodin has searched the records in his office and finds that for the time specified there has been but one subject of that country naturalized in this county.

Mrs. Benson's dwelling, at Forest Grove, was burned last Saturday night, with its entire contents. The origin of the fire is not known, as all the members of the family were temporarily absent when it caught. There was no insurance. Mr. Waters' house, adjacent, was protected with wet blankets. A Mr. Wilson, attempting to save property from the Benson dwelling, was rescued with smoke and hot gases, and came near losing his life in the burning structure.

Last week at Laurel, father G. Brothers, at the age of 73 years, was gathered to the innumerable host that has gone before. He had been ill for some weeks, suffering at times great pain, but his christian resignation and his discipline of life fortified him to bear all. The funeral services were conducted by Rev. Mr. Pratt, and the remains were followed to the grave by a great number of the friends and neighbors of the deceased.

John Montgomery and Lizzie, his wife, and Daniel McKeecher, living near Brownsville, at Linn county, were murdered at the Montgomery home last Tuesday afternoon, by some other person than themselves.

Lloyd Montgomery, a 10-year-old son, has been arrested on a charge accusing him of the crime. Montgomery is a poor man but highly respected by his neighbors. McKeecher was a miller and lived eight miles distant. He, too, was an excellent reputation. There appears to be no reason why the boy should be held except insanity.

The sheriff Ford has returned from Benton county, whither he had gone to give evidence in the case of the State v. Dell Cornell and Frank Holcomb, who had been indicted for larceny of a buggy. Both men were convicted and have been sentenced to the penitentiary for a term of two years each. Mr. Ford speaks in the highest terms of Mr. John M. Brown, district attorney, who had the management of the cases. To him much credit is due for the verdict, which is entirely satisfactory to the people of this county.

The Indian War Veterans had a meeting in the court house last Saturday, which degenerated into a political conference, wherein S. A. Holcomb, populist, harangued the few present. If populists want to rise to the dignity of a party and be respected and treated with respect, other orators must be chosen. Profanity and backguardism will not win votes.

The football fever is in full force in Hillsboro. The public school has a team practicing daily, and this (Friday) evening there will be a meeting in Dr. C. B. Brown's dental parlors for the purpose of organizing a heavy-weight team. All persons that are interested in this movement are expected to be present.
