THEY CALLED THEM FARMERS.

Buzz-Boom-Ah! Hillsboro-Hilltown

It was clearly demonstrated a Christmas day that Hillsboro is a football town, and that she has a team of first-class players—a team that couldn't be scared by city boys with long hair, fine garments and all the latest improvements in football paraphernalia, but one in which every man could be depended on to play football from the first kick-off till the final call of time.

Some four or five hundred people waded through the mud and rain to witness the twenty-two minutes struggle and fight and push the leather bag of wind over the ground, but those fortunate ones that were there, were chuck-full of enthusiasm and they cheered and yelled themselves hoarse as their favorites would smash through the opponent's line and carry the pigskin down the field.

The Hillsboro team had very little practice and consequently their end plays were weak through lack of interference, but when they backed the line they would tear through the invincible Neverweats' like they were nothing before them. Tiring of that they would pass the ball to Tongue for a punt, when it would come up dry, as if it had wings, and the High School runners would be down on the man with the ball before he could start back.

The score gives no idea of the game. The teams were more evenly matched than in a score of 10-0. It was anybody's game until the last few minutes of the first half when the home team held the Portlanders down for three downs, secured the ball on a fumble and carried it over the line, which put them four to the good.

In the last half the High School had things pretty much their own way, and backed the visitors steadily down the field and over the line for another touch-down.

With three minutes to play, both captains changed tactics, and there was a swift interchange of kicks by the full-backs, each one netting Hillsboro about ten yards' gain, and the ball being well up in the visitor's territory.

This is the first defeat the terrors of the East Side have suffered and they feel it keenly, enquiring unexpectantly as it did from what they considered a second class team. As they left they gave their yell:

Wet or dry, Never-never-neverweat!

And the Hillsboro boys gave as a parting shout:

AN OLD FAMILIAR FLAG.

The "Olympian," of Washington, has this mention of a flag that is remembered by many now in Washington county. It is the same that was unfurled in the streets of Hillsboro two years ago.

That flag is the one which the company carries, and which attracted no end of interest during the encampment. It is the property of Col. W. C. Painter, of Walla Walla, who carried it through the Yakima war of 1855.

The flag contains but twenty-one stars and bears the inscription, "Company D, First Regiment Oregon Volunteers."

This interesting relic was made by the young ladies of Forest Grove Academy at the outbreak of the Indian war. It was carried by Col. Painter, who took part in all the engagements of the campaign, and to whom it was presented at the close of the war.

The first engagement was at Yakima canyon, near where north Yakima is now standing, and was the first battle in which Phil Sheridan, then a lieutenant, ever took part. It came into service again in the Bannock war of 1878, when Governor Ferry appointed Mr. Painter captain of a company of volunteers and was assigned to the gunboat Spokane, under Major Kress. Their first engagement was at Long Island. The volunteers were relieved by the regulars, but Mr. Painter was soon elected captain of another company of volunteers, and was again in the field on the Grand Ronde, where he captured enough horses to pay the expenses of his campaign. For his valiant services he was appointed aide de camp, with the rank of lieutenant colonel, on the staff of Governor Ferry, and was presented with a handsome sword.
