The address in the evening will be "A Character Sketch—Martha, the Sister of Mary," practically a continuation of last Sabbath's talk on Mary. The other services are Sabbath school at 10 a. m.; Junior C. E. at 4 p. m., and C. E. prayer meeting at 6:30 p. m.

Representative Yates, of this county, has presented this office with a copy of the House Journal of last session, for which he will please accept thanks. The book is a valuable one, from which it may be convenient to quote. One point may be mentioned. This Journal, as printed, does not show that the senate amendments to the appropriation bill were concurred in by the house. It probably matters little now, since the money appropriated by these amendments is mostly spent.

The spirit of original investigation is strong upon the minds of O. A. C. members. A few days ago, through the courtesy of John H. Gault, a bar magnet was received that possesses properties not before known to attach to those pieces of apparatus. The young man who first made the magnet is a fourth year student and does not desire his name used till he has had opportunity to study the matter further. All bar magnets described in the books have the power to attract magnetic iron at both ends. One end is called the north pole, the magnet, and the other the south pole. The two poles have equal power of attracting, or nearly so. This new magnet has one pole at the extremity, while the other pole is in the middle of the bar. Thus a steel bar is shown that strongly attracts at one end, while the other will not even attract iron filings, though the middle gathers a full coating of the fine iron particles. How the magnet is made is kept a secret by the two boys for the present, till they can finish their study of the queerly acting bar.

A fairly good story is told of two of Washington county's citizens that may call up a ripple of merriment, though it be winter. The joke is on Rogers. Last summer Rev. A. Rogers was off on his vacation, and driving through the mountains to the sea beach. On the way he found a bag of wearing apparel, and seeking means of identification he judged that the garments would be wanted. Accordingly he tied them on his head, but no probable owner was found till he reached camp late Saturday afternoon, where a mutual acquaintance said that Bert Stewart had lost a sack of clothes, and was making anxious inquiry for his property. Having his tent pitched and other camp duties to perform, Rogers sent his friend to the Stewart camp, which was some distance away, by the hands of another, with the message, "that there was no change, and that the only person he would care was that Mr. Stewart should attend church the next day at 2 o'clock p. m." Rogers was to preach. Bert was overjoyed to get his extra wardrobe, and readily returned the answer: "I'll be there, or send a representative." Next day at church time Mr. Stewart was wearied by an active morning's fishing excursion, and concluded to rest, but he kept his word with the dominie, for just as his rude pulpit was about to be occupied by a messenger who handed him a fine string of fish, having a card attached bearing the sentence: "My representative, Bert Stewart." Rogers had three hymns sung before he commenced to talk.

The people who worship in the Congregational church tendered a reception to their new pastor, Rev. Evan P. Hughes, last Wednesday evening. A large number of invitations had been extended to members of the other churches and their pastors. The clergymen were all present, and the service was a most interesting one. Elder Shelley, who has been out of town for a week or more, was the first to speak, and his address was a most timely and inspiring one. The large auditory of the Congregational was jammed, and standing room occupied. Miss Rose Wilcox, on behalf of the Y. P. S. C. E., and Hon. W. D. Hare, for the church, made formal speeches of welcome, which were responded to by the pastor. After this, informal greetings were said by Revs. McDonald, of the Methodist church, Schofield, of the Baptist church, Pratt, of the Evangelical church, and A. Rogers, of the Forest Grove church. These talks were interspersed with music rendered by the choir. The church was tastefully decorated for the occasion, and the greatest cheerfulness and good will prevailed. The church does not expect soon to have another reception to a pastor, but an annual meeting of a business and social nature is planned for January, 1897.

Men will pay money for bread rather than beer. Hops are slow sale at a loss, but when in demand. A large exporter was seen in Portland last Tuesday evening, who stated that the price for valley wheat that day had been 60 cents. This would make it net Hillsboro farmers 32 cents. When asked if he thought it would go higher, he stated that he did not see how the price could be advanced on present figures, since it is now higher than the foreign market justifies, but the local millers are paying the top quotations, and exporters are compelled to do so. There are now five ships in harbor and about twenty more expected to arrive in February. How many of these have charters is not known. If several ships should get into port without charters, there would probably be a cut in ocean freights, in which case the price of wheat might go a notch or two higher. But farmers must not hold too long or else this little fleet will sail and leave them with their wheat still at home. It would seem that Oregon ought to clean out its granary at present figures. It would be safe to do so.

The quarterly meeting occasion at the M. E. church last Sunday was one of great interest and profit. The morning service was a most delightful one, and the presiding elder, Rev. G. W. Gue, D. D., of Portland, preached a most excellent sermon. In the evening, a large and very appreciative audience. All reports at the quarterly conference showed that the church was in a very flourishing and prosperous condition. All seemed very much pleased with the work during the past year. The church's report showed fifty-four had united during that time. There will be special revival services at the church this evening. The services Sunday will be interesting and profitable. The subject for the sermon in the morning is "Faith," and the topic for discussion at the evening service is "Baptism."

Joseph Vaughn, a well-known citizen of Forest Grove, died very suddenly Tuesday forenoon, while in his buggy, going to Dilley from Forest Grove. He was driving on the highway, in company with his brother, when suddenly he gasped for breath, and fell over dead. Joe had many friends in every part of the county west of Hillsboro, and his sudden death is a shock. He leaves a young wife and a child ten months old. The deceased was an active member of the Old Fellows and the Knights of Pythias, and was very much loved by his friends, who occurred yesterday afternoon, at Forest Grove. Between thirty and forty members of those orders went from Hillsboro to attend the last sad rites of their brother. A number of the Rebekah degree members and Baltham Sisters accompanied the delegation.

The Hillsboro Republican Club had a very enthusiastic meeting, largely attended last Tuesday evening. The delegates elected to the State League, which meets at Portland, February 4th, are Thos. H. Tongue, W. N. Barrett, James Imbrie, J. H. Stanley, G. W. Patterson, B. P. Cornelius, H. Ford, J. L. Knight, L. E. Anderson, J. J. Morgan, R. H. Greer, R. Crandall, W. V. Wiley, John Carstens. The seven delegates selected are T. D. Humphreys, E. L. McCormick, A. M. Collins, P. H. Baughman, J. H. Freeman, W. D. Smith.

The Gaston Co-operative Milling Company has been organized with T. W. Thompson, C. H. Peterson and J. D. Hibbs as incorporators. Capital stock, \$10,000, divided into one thousand shares of the value of \$10 each. Stock and subscription books are now in the hands of J. W. Morrow and H. S. Hudson, of Gaston, and J. D. Hibbs, of Forest Grove. Nearly \$5,000 has been signed in days. A meeting of farmers interested in the mill will be held in Gaston, Friday, January 24th, at 1 o'clock.

THE 1896 LEVY.

The tax levy for this year is one mill less than it was last year. The assessment this year is about \$140,000 less than it was last year. Last year the levy was divided as follows:

Total.....12.0 mills
It will be noticed that the reduction is made in the general county fund and the school fund. The county fund loses 2.3 mills and the school fund a half mill, making a loss of 2.8 mills, while the levy for state purposes is increased 1.5 mills.

The revenue this year will not amount to as much as last, hence fewer bridges must be built, road appropriations must be cut down, and court expenses curtailed. A saving all around will bring us out another year in good shape.

DIPHTHERIA IN CORNELIUS.

EDITOR INDEPENDENT: During the past two months there were twenty-six cases of diphtheria in Cornelius. I attended all these cases. There were three remarkable things concerning this epidemic. First, the very malignant type of the disease in each case, requiring the utmost watchfulness and the frequent administration of remedies to prevent a fatal termination. Second, the large number of adults who took the disease, and, third, the entire freedom from it of those persons and families that had it a year ago. This last fact is attributable, I think, to the very abundant use of reliable disinfectants, which I ordered in each case last winter.

There are now no new cases, and it is hoped the disease is ended.
