Hon. M. C. George delivered a instructive and eloquent address before the Hillsboro Republican Club last Tuesday evening. The large auditory of the court house, where the club met, was full to overflowing, subject of speech was the industrial condition of the country and the causes that have led to the present depression. By a review of the history of tariff legislation, Mr. George showed that the prosperity of the country has been greatest when protective revenues have been in force, and worst when the impost on foreign imports have approached nearest to a free trade basis. Wherefore, he concluded that it would always be so. He, further, showed by citing the example of other countries that the principles he had formulated are axiomatic. Now, therefore, there is only one thing to do toward restoring the times we had in 1892 and before, and that is to return to the policy of the government as then administered by the republican party. Mr. George was frequently interrupted by hearty applause as he made telling points for his side of the case.

Last Thursday morning, a short time after 7 o'clock, some inebriated fire through the open window of Mr. Mazzie's house, at the children who were temporarily alone within. Mr. Mazzie lives about a half mile from the city, and his house is in the north of town. The gun was charged with shot, one pellet striking the youngest child in the head and felling it to the floor. Six others took effect in the arm and side of another child, while the third also hit. None of the wounds, however, will prove fatal. At the time of the shooting the father was in his stable, putting harness on his horses. The mother was in an adjoining woodshed, engaged with morning work. The inebriated man, who was most charitable, the careless gunner, made his escape, so that his identity is not revealed. Dr. Robinson was called to dress the wounds.

Sheriff Ford is a careful, painstaking officer, and does his duty in every way. There are some, however, who in their greed attempt to trap him. A few months since, in serving a civil process, some personal or property came into his possession. The defendant gave a sufficient bond, whereupon the sheriff released the property. The plaintiff then thought he saw a plain and speedy way of collecting the debt by bringing an action for damages against Mr. Ford. The case was tried this week, resulting in a verdict for our officer. Another branch of the same matter is yet to be determined in the Multnomah county courts, which Mr. Ford hopes to win and then he will, though after all he will be out of his attorney fees.

An earthquake, more severe than usual, raged across the people of Hillsboro between 3 and 4 o'clock yesterday, Thursday, morning. A few persons happened to be awake at the time who report that the shock was preceded by a rumbling, sounding much like a wagon when it is rapidly drawn over a roadway. The shock seemed to come from the west with a rebound from the east. No damage has so far been reported.

The residence of Mrs. Joyce Johnson, who lives at Glencoe, six miles north of here, was destroyed by fire Wednesday, about 5 p. m.
