The ticket named yesterday by the republicans county convention is a republican ticket containing the names of republicans, and as such will be supported by the party in the county, and hence elected by the usual majority.

QUESTIONS TO W. D. HARE.

Will W. D. Hare please answer the following questions: First—You are reported to have said at the populist convention on last Wednesday that there is a bill pending in congress to allow National Banks to issue circulation to the face value of their bonds, 25 per cent of their capital stock and 20 per cent of their deposits.

Second—If there is such a bill pending, do you mean to intimate that it has the slightest chance of passing into law?

Third—You are reported at the same convention to have said that the balance of trade between nations is not paid by the shipment of coin from one to the other.

Fourth—You claim that the republican party demonized silver in 1873. Will you tell what you mean by it? Did they coin less silver or take its legal tender away from it?

Fifth—If such a terrible crime was committed by the republican party in 1873, will you explain why you did not discover it or repudiate it, but continued to adhere to the party, hold office under it, accept nominations by it, run on its ticket and defend its principles until 1892, when you failed to secure nomination for circuit judge in this district after having been a judge candidate for the office?

Sixth—Do you or do you not believe that the intrinsic value of the material out of which money is made has anything to do with the value of the money? Do you or do you not believe that the exclusive value of money consists in the fiat of the government in the exercise of governmental power in making it a legal tender?

Seventh—Do you or do you not approve of the Wilson bill? Do you or do you not believe that the passage of the Wilson bill has entailed loss to the American farmers, stockmen, fruit growers and other industries of this state?

A candid answer to the foregoing questions may tend to enlighten the public as to what are your true opinions.

REPUBLICAN CONVENTION.

Chairman Patterson called the convention to order at 11 o'clock. The call was read by Secretary Coyle.

Dr. Wood placed Hon. C. F. Yates in nomination for temporary chairman and Mr. A. Knox placed Judge B. P. Cornelius in nomination for the same place. The ballot resulted: Yates 52, Cornelius 63.

So Judge Cornelius was chosen. In assuming the chair, he reminded the convention of the importance that would attach to the work done and course-of great deliberation.

Dr. Wood moved a committee of five on credentials. An amendment was offered making the committee one from each precinct; Dr. Woods accepted the amendment and in that shape the motion was adopted.

So Mr Todd was re-nominated. For superintendent of schools, the names before the convention were Austin Craig, D. H. Thomas, J. H. Stanley, L. R. Traver and J. T. Dorrien.

For Representatives Almorán Hill nominated H. S. Hudson v. J. Robinson named Hon. C. F. Yates, Schoen named G. W. Marsh, named J. R. C. Thompson and named B. P. Purdy.

For county surveyor the vote was: E. J. Wilkes 59, L. C. Walker 50, Blank.

For coroner, Dr. C. L. Large, of Forest Grove, was nominated under a suspension of the rules, by acclamation.

On motion, the nomination of precinct officers was ratified. On motion the convention adjourned.

At a meeting of the Central Committee, held after the adjournment of the convention, a temporary organization was effected by choosing T. J. Bety chairman and C. E. Diechman secretary. Dr. W. D. Wood and C. E. Diechman were nominated for permanent chairman. The vote stood: Wood 11, Diechman 7.

Dr. Wood was selected chairman. C. E. Diechman was chosen secretary by acclamation. The executive committee men selected to act with the chairman and secretary are A. Knox and H. Rasmussen.
