The swing man outraged public opinion at Forest Grove last Sunday by operating his "amusement" contrary to the provisions of the state law. He was duly arrested, but the papers were not skillfully drawn so that the culprit slipped through the meshes. It now looks as though the new justice of the peace will issue an action for false imprisonment. The swing rolled around and that the young people patronized the "amusement."

How to preserve fruits and vegetables so that they will retain their natural color and flavor has been a study for the housewife which most have failed to solve. All these difficulties have been overcome in the past few years, but only a few housewives know. Last Saturday morning, a wagon passed through town, having 11 large barrels for a load. Those who were in position to know, state that the barrels contained 6 dozen beer bottles each, and one observer stated that it was the fourth load that had gone from Forest Grove while the celebration was in progress. Let us see. Eleven barrels of six dozen each, allows 66 dozen or 792 bottles and five loads allows 3960 bottles of beer that was drank on the celebration grounds at Forest Grove during the fourth of July celebration. And this was free of cost. No tax was paid to county or municipality. The vendor is a citizen of Multnomah county. He imported his "nectar" in defiance of law and of public opinion—hold, but that he modified a little, Washington county citizens drank it. It is Hillsboro in better condition to throw stones. Hardly. The same company had its free trade outfit beneath the grand stand at the race track. However he did not sell there by the bottle. He sold by the barrel, and if there was not so much "nectar" put away as at Forest Grove, it was because there were not as many citizens there to do the work. Now if the aforesaid citizens must have beer and then let them be compelled to buy of our own people who live here, pay taxes and thus help to maintain government. Assure our people the monopoly of the business for which they pay. When the grand jury meets in November, let the story be told how the Portland dealer came to Forest Grove and Hillsboro in July and sold spirits and malt liquors without paying a tax for the privileges. The INDEPENDENT never has favored free trade and it does not in this instance.

At a meeting held last Saturday, at which several of our prominent farmers were present, called to confer with the Washington county Speed and Driving Association touching the holding of a county fair at Hillsboro this fall, Mr. Robert Lubrie was chosen chairman and Wm. McQuillan, secretary. Pending the report of committees, the meeting adjourned till tomorrow, Tuesday, July 18th, when it will again meet at the law office of Geo. B. Bagley. A cordial invitation to attend this adjourned meeting is extended to all our citizens who are interested in holding a fair here this fall.

The choir that sang at the union meeting last Sunday evening was nicely balanced by the addition of the gentlemen composing the symphony male quartet who were visiting in Hillsboro. Seeing that an addition of gentlemen makes a choir, makes the people only the more anxious to find the voices possessed by our own young men. They are here and ought to be brought out.

It appearing that the defendant Thos. Dilley had been arrested and on his plea of guilty sent to prison, and a full fine of \$100.00 paid, M. E. Dilley had repaid all disbursements made by the County amounting to \$310.00 was ordered that the judgment be cancelled.
