

OVER THE STATE.

Hot winds in Umatilla county have scalded the wheat yield ten bushels to the acre.

The official bond of the treasurer of Chockama county has been fixed at \$60,000 which is a raise of \$30,000.

The O. R. & N. Co. property, railroad, cars, steamships, and all other property that originally cost over \$42,000,000 was sold last week under the hammer for a little over \$9,000,000.

Deep sea fishing is being prosecuted near Woods. Two boats go out daily and wondrous hauls for the valley every morning with the catch.

The fisherman have found a halibut tank about three miles from Cape Kiwanda.

Two fishermen were assassinated last Friday night near Astoria. The darkness was a good cloak for the murders, so that they escaped, though there are slight clues by which the officers hope to catch them.

Several members of the national guard at Salem, indulged in unsoldierly conduct on the evening of July 31st. They are now to answer before a court martial and it is not nearly so amusing as it appears.

Several men were at work last week making the necessary repairs on the wooden mill race at Brownsville. The intention of the company now is to put every thing in tip-top shape, and about the first of September start the mill running at full capacity.

It is stated that the Salem Wooden Mills that are soon to start, have on their books the names of those applicants for positions. It is not to be understood that these people are now idle, but a great majority of them are seeking a new place for the sake of change.

T. B. Handley has sued the republican candidate for clerk of Tillamook county for the sum of \$100 political assessment. The other candidate paid their assessments ranging from \$2.50 to \$10, but the clerk refused to put up on the ground that Handley had no right to collect money.

H. B. Miller is talked of for President of the state Agricultural College. Miller's fitness for the place lies in the fact that he is a good mechanic and something of a farmer. Should he be placed at the head of the school, it means less attention to the literary training of the pupils and more to the mechanical education.

Oregonian logging is an important industry on the Willamette and its tributaries. One contractor is now delivering 2,000,000 feet of logs to the pulp mills at Oregon City. The timber is of rapid growth and bottom lands are coming to be recognized as more valuable for cottonwood cultivation than for oats or wheat.

The stock yards, in The Dalles, presented a busy appearance Wednesday and Thursday. Wednesday, 20 carloads of cattle, sold by M. Siegel & Co., of Prairieville, to Mr. Mellic, were shipped to Montana, and Thursday, a like number were loaded, part from Yakima and part from the Siegel drive, which numbered 2000 head in all.

The wool warehouses at Heppner are crammed full from floor to roof. Little is selling yet, though active shipments to the East on consignment has commenced. There is a difference between buyer and seller greater than was between buyer and packer, at Astoria. Buyers offer 5 cents while growers hold for 10. Buyers are conceding somewhat this week, the price offered having advanced.

An impetuous fraud visited Grant's Pass last week and succeeded in bilking several of the citizens of small sums. He has a smattering of knowledge concerning the workings of the Masons, Odd Fellows, and Knights of Pythias orders, and it was his plan to solicit aid from the members. Tom Mason he represented as being a member of the Order of the Knights of Pythias.

Gov. Lord on the 9th inst., issued his annual proclamation warning the people against the crime and penalty involved in the setting aside the timber, or other property of the state or individual under the act of 1893, general laws of Oregon, and that documents in the hands of the state printer. When printed it will be forwarded to the various sheriffs of the state and duly posted to them in their respective court houses.

Fox valley in Grant county is having a small boom, owing to the development of some promising mines there. One placer mine about a mile from Titus Bros. ranch is being worked for all there is in it, and the owner, Mr. Brown, is confident that he will take \$15,000 out of it this season. In the edge of the valley is a quartz mine owned by Messrs. German and Tegen, who are putting in two 50 ton quartz mills.

Ed Murphy, who brutally murdered Andrew Arman at a sheep camp in Chelan county recently was overtaken by a sheriff's posse last week and lodged in a clump of bushes for two days and nights without food or water. The murderer finally attempted to escape when he was shot and killed. Some think this Murphy is none other than the Burdett who shot and killed Birdie Morton in East Portland about two years ago.

The chittin' work industry around Tillamook was a great deal around the small boys the past few weeks reports the Headlight. They piled

every chittin' tree in the vicinity and most every boy had a few pounds of dried bark. Some had as much as 100 pounds. However, when they came to sell the bark they found the buyers didn't care to take it except in large quantities, say a few hundred pounds or a ton. One dealer finally took the small lots at one cent per pound, paying in trade, and one boy who was two weeks gathering bark received for his pay a 25 cent cake of toilet soap.

Horace L. Hotchkiss, of New York, who is largely interested in the Quartzville mines, was in Albany Friday, on his return trip to the San Francisco mines. He is well pleased with the outlook at the mines and speaks in terms of highest praise and confidence of Mr. Lawler's management of the properties. He says the volume of gold bullion which is being taken out of the mines is highly satisfactory, and the company will double the capacity of the Quartzville mining plant this season. He says he considers the mines now being worked by the Lawler Company the richest in the United States, and he would not even except the African mines.

The St. Helens Mist has heard newspaper rumors which he thus records. "During the past two weeks one would have thought to hear the street rumors that Columbia County was the paradise for newspapers, there being three already in existence and two more contemplated. After much talk, however, G. A. Sanford, the plant of the N. Journal at a monthly rental and last Monday moved to St. Helens, where, we hope he will soon get rich. Meanwhile R. H. Mitchell has been negotiating for the Rainier Review, or in case that fails he may move the Seattle plant to Rainier and conduct a populist paper there, all of which would indicate that the business was good in this county. If there are other men looking for a location, where subscriptions never fail to come in advance and where the hand of divine providence does not permit any one to go hungry, they should at once come to Columbia county."

BASELINE THOUGHTS BY NEMO.

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Most of us are apt to underestimate the power of silent influences in the world. We exclaim with wonder at some engulging landslide and overlook the fact that the sluggish Mississippi is carrying away vastly more solid material than all the landslides of a year put together. We marvel at the disruptive force of lightning and of waves and give hardly a moment's thought to the immensely greater power of the bioplast, the infinitesimal transparent speck of jelly that can compel the inert elements of nature into living forms. Elijah had to learn that the real power was in neither roaring flame nor howling tempest, but in the still, small voice and so must we, if we are to gain a proper estimate of things. The trumping may arise from the bandwagon till the Heavens split, and the speakers may lash themselves into a fury until the voice falls and mouth foams, but neither music nor mouth have over a man's mind a fraction of the influence that dwells in the good clear argument of a printed page, appealing to him in the quietude of the evening hour. We too often associate bustle and noise with influence, whereas it may be entirely absent from both.

The members of an unobtrusive class of the community, who make no great stir nor pose for the admiration of the crowd; whose work for the welfare of our nation is frequently left entirely unnoticed by the general public, have already or will soon quietly drop the duties of the school year and silently steal away to rest during the long vacation. Some of them will return to the place they filled, no more forever; and it is not only fitting but urgent that we should give these silent public servants and the work they do, more than a passing thought.

Whether you choose to regard teaching either as a trade, calling for just so much effort for so many dollars; or a profession, demanding years of preparation and mental enthusiasm as well, it is, in either case, a line of work particularly adapted to women because of their functional tenderness and yearning towards children, and because of the instinctual sympathy which belongs to them so much more decidedly than to men. Men are being crowded more and more out of the teaching field. In 1880—1 out of a total of 293,839 teachers only 123,511 were males, and in 1892-3 when the teaching force had increased to 383,010, the male teachers had decreased to 122,050. Teaching is an eminently respectable employment for women and the money reward attached to it is even better than that arising from clerical work, or tending counter. It also leaves the worker a number of hours of leisure, the work being usually condensed into seven, and Saturday is entirely free. So, are we not apt occasionally to think of the teacher as rather pleasantly situated with an almost pre-empted field of work, a fair salary and some leisure? Then we have not looked fairly beneath the surface of this career.

Viewed as a profession teaching is the most unsatisfactory of them all. Its rewards, except to the inner sense of duty faithfully done are too remote. Neither physician, nor lawyer, nor even minister, would be content to wait to wait a whole generation to see the results of his labors; and he would be a most emphatic protestant if he found that increased experience and ability did not carry with them decided increase of earning capacity. Yet for the teacher, though she has studiously prepared for years, there is nothing but sowing in order that others may reap, and the tread-mill recurrence of the self-same duties from year to year. She cannot travel with her charges, but after giving them her portion of the curriculum they are passed onward, only to leave her hands empty for more material, to be similarly molded and passed on.

Neither must we forget in considering the teacher that her duties verge upon the abnormal and that therefore the strain upon her is more than ordinary. The teacher exists because of the human tendency to delegate duties. We are by nature set into small families, the man being made to struggle for the food and the woman seeming most fitted to train the children and direct the household. The man is apt to delegate his religious headship to the Sunday school teacher and his good thinking to the minister at so much per thought, and the lady (Anglo-Saxon; middle-class-giver) in our modern complicated civilization delegates her maternal duties to a nurse her training duties to a teacher, her domestic duties to a servant. But no woman ever yet had the misfortune to look after 20 or 30 of her own children of nearly equal ages at one time. To her they have come gradually and the older ones soon are taught to look after the younger ones and thus ease the mother's burden. Teachers, however, are expected for a small, hardly a living, wage to calmly curb here, restrain there and control everywhere possibly as many as half a hundred restless little entities who are not her own nor even perpetually under her care and whose ways are sometimes of such an exasperating nature that two of them will serve to drive a mother nearly distracted.

If the teacher be at all sensitive to

the burden of responsibility upon her, a burden that is made up of the knowledge that the only moral training some of her fidgety little charges will receive, must be imparted by her, though quite foreign to the duty she is paid for, then her condition is most pitiable. The painful realization is present with her, that the pure atmosphere of the few hours she has with the little ones, hours frequently counteracted by the vile fumes of wicked homes. She is aware that the too often morally spineless midgits that come under her care will receive no real preparation for life by a mere conquest of the three R's while the home is daily inculcating lessons of wrong recklessness and rudeness. And thus daily this reserved little body going about among you many times without co-operation in the home, without appropriate recognition in the community, without hope of ever learning a title of the results of her work, patiently builds her effort as a bulwark against the floods of ignorance and immorality that are constantly threatening our country.
