On Friday last the barn of Mr. Jas. Corbett of Lincoln, was burned. The structure was a frame building about ten or twelve years old and contained about 20 tons of hay and probably 200 bu. of wheat and oats, a buggy, some harness, and other implements, none of which was saved as the men were all from home when the fire occurred. The fire was caused by children playing with matches about the barn. The loss will reach about \$300. No insurance.

During the first of the week fierce forest fires raged in the timber on the hills between West Dairy Creek and Gales Creek. Mr. John Mittlewholfe came near being burned out. His dwelling was on fire four different times while Mr. Whitney, a near neighbor saved his premises only by the violence and assistance of his friends. Hon. C. P. Yates, who brings his second thought, forest fires are raging further in the mountains. Mr. Ordway reports that the Cape Horn road to Vernonia is blocked by fire.

There is a big fight on between the Southern Pacific Company and other transportation lines. The S. P. Co. has made some big cuts in freight rates on teas carried east over its lines. The reduction not only affects Northern traffic lines, but will be felt by ships patronizing the Suez canal route. The S. P. people in this attempt to control the shipping market so as to bring that article through America is to be commended. At late years we have been lagging in commerce, and this new departure by a land transportation company is calculated to make the sea dogs open wide their eyes. Who knows but that the way to far Cathay fondly dreamed of by Columbus has been found. It is said the N. P. and Great Northern will meet the cut.

Rev. J. S. Griffin has loaned the Independent for a few days a file of the Oregon Free Press published at Oregon City in summer of 1884 by Geo. L. Curry, editor and proprietor. The sheet is a folio 12 by 15 inches in size. There are two columns to the page each being ten inches long and 18 m/s or 3 inches wide. The mechanical work is good, better than that of many of our modern papers. The type used was a French font that contained no w's two w's make that letter. There are a few advertisements, but they are set mostly in body type. The office was without doubt short of display letter. The paper of June 10 1884 contains the election returns of the election held the previous Monday, June 3rd. Five counties were reported, Clackamas, Yamhill, Vancouver, Tualaty and Clatsop. Tualaty County was what is now Washington. In Tualaty County as far as heard from for representative, Ralph Wilcox had received 61 votes; S. H. Thurston, 52; David Hill, 52; Sherill, R. E. Wiley, 74; Treasurer, Chambers, 80; Coroner—Hugh Burns 38—Prohibition, 43—Regulate 40. So it seems that the temperance question was agitating the mind of the day. The Ralph Wilcox mentioned in Mrs. Judge Archibald's father, R. E. Wiley is W. V. Wiley's father. Chambers is probably Wm. Chambers, Mrs. Dr. F. A. Bailey's father. In this county the 4th of July was celebrated with Judge Bailey for orator. The thing that most forcibly strikes the modern news dates. The issue of July 1st contains Washington dates no later than March 15th. A column is devoted to the French revolution that occurred in Jan. and Feb. 1848. The paper is a valuable relic and Mr. Griffin prizes it accordingly. The "Press" was a rival of the "Spectator" published in the same town.

On Sunday last a very severe accident occurred resulting in the wounding of Chas. Dennis, a son of Mrs. Dennis, of South Tualatin. The lad who is about 12 years old was handling a rifle which he had just purchased. He was standing in the yard and the rifle was discharged. The ball striking the left side of the ankle joint ranging downward and entering the joint. Mr. E. O. Edson who for so many years has been the celebrated Portland florist in Yamhill County, has just completed the readjustment of the Dudley mill in this county and is now ready to make as good flour as he did at Milton. His announcement appears in another column.

Last week Mr. and Mrs. McKander of Portland, who are summering between Beaverton and the Willamette Valley, brought their sick child to Dr. L's office. About his first words were, "Man, I am sorry to see this child here." The patient had an attack of diphtheria of a malignant type. Antitoxin and all other methods of treatment were used and successfully, not only with the child but with an adult member of the family. Three bottles of the antitoxin were used. Both patients are now discharged, which pleases the attending physician since the spread of the disease has been prevented.

Victor Hugo's Youthful Work.

Victor Hugo, the great French poet and novelist, is famous everywhere. He began his literary career when he was only 12. At 16 he drew up his first novel in two weeks. The academy at Toulouse crowned two of his odes that he wrote at 17. At 20 his first volume of poems was so good that he received a pension of \$200 from the French government, and you are all aware how he came to be one of the greatest as well as one of the most popular of the French poets. His patriotism was as great as his literary gifts. His life is one of the most interesting in the literary annals of France. I saw this funeral in Paris in May, 1885, when he was followed to the grave by a concourse of sorrowful people. The procession was miles in length. Few emperors or successful generals have had a more imposing burial, nor was ever man laid to rest who was more deeply, truly mourned than this grand and gifted Frenchman.—Arthur Hoebel in St. Nicholas.

The Vice of Overeating.

How much harm is done to health by our one-sided and excessive diet no one can say. Physicians tell us that it is very great. Of the vice of overeating, as practiced by the well-to-do classes in England especially, Sir Henry Thompson, a noted English physician and authority on this subject, says:

"I have come to the conclusion that more than half the disease which inhibits the middle and later parts of life is due to avoidable errors in diet, and that more mischief in the form of actual disease, of impaired vigor and of shortened life accrues to civilized man in England and throughout central Europe from erroneous habits of eating than from the habitual use of alcoholic drink, considerable as I know that evil to be."
