MONEY.
The Republican party is unreservedly for sound money. It caused the enactment of the law providing for the redemption of specie payment in 1875; since then every dollar has been as good as gold; we are unopposed to every measure calculated to depress our currency or impair the credit of our country. We are, therefore, opposed to the free coinage of silver except by the international agreement with the leading commercial nations of the world, which we pledge ourselves to promote, and until such agreement can be obtained the existing gold standard must be preserved. All our silver and paper currency must be maintained at parity with gold, and we favor all measures designed to secure the fulfillment of the obligations of the United States and all our money, whether coin or paper, at the present standard, the standard of the most enlightened nations of the earth.

PENSIONS.
The veterans of the Union armies deserve and should receive fair treatment and generous recognition. Whenever practicable they should be given the preference in the matter of employment, and they are entitled to the enactment of such laws as are best calculated to secure the fulfillment of the obligations of the United States and all our money, whether coin or paper, at the present standard, the standard of the most enlightened nations of the earth.

FOREIGN RELATIONS.
Our foreign policy should be at all times firm, vigorous and dignified, and all our interests in the Western Hemisphere should be carefully watched and guarded. The Hawaiian Islands should be controlled by the United States, and no foreign power should be permitted to interfere with them. The Nicaragua canal should be built, owned and operated by the United States, and by the purchase of the Danish Islands we should secure the proper and much needed naval station in the West Indies.

ARMENIAN MASSACRES.
The massacres in Armenia have aroused the deep sympathy and just indignation of the American people, and we believe the United States should exert all the influence it can properly exert to bring these atrocities to an end. In Turkey American residents have been exposed to the gravest dangers and American property destroyed. There is every reason to believe that the policy of any American citizen for friendly intervention in case of European encroachment. We have not interfered and shall not interfere with the existing possessions of any European power in this hemisphere, but those possessions must not, on any pretext, be extended. We hope to look forward to the eventual withdrawal of the European powers from this hemisphere and to the ultimate union of all English-speaking parts of the continent by the free consent of its inhabitants.

THE TARIFF.
We renew and emphasize our allegiance to the policy of protection as the bulwark of an American industrial independence and the foundation of American development and prosperity. This American workingman's policy protects and encourages home industry, and it puts the burden of revenue on foreign goods; it secures the American market for the American producer; it upholds the American standard of wages for American workers; it puts the factory by the side of the farm, and makes the American farmer less dependent on foreign demand and price; it diffuses general thrift, and founds the strength of all on the strength of each. In its reasonable application it is just, fair and impartial, equally opposed to foreign control and domestic monopoly; to sectional discrimination and individual favoritism.

WE DENOUNCE THE PRESENT DEMOCRATIC PARTY AS SECTIONAL, INJURIOUS TO THE PUBLIC INTEREST AND Destructive TO BUSINESS ENTERPRISE. We demand such an equitable tariff on foreign imports which come into competition with American products as will not only furnish adequate revenue for the necessary expenses of the Government, but will protect American labor from the degradation to the wage level of other lands. We are not pledged to any particular schedule. The question of rates is a practical question, to be governed by the conditions of the time and of production; the ruling and uncompromising principle is the protection and development of American labor and industry. The country demands a right settlement, and then it waits.

RECIPROCITY.
We believe the repeal of the reciprocity agreements negotiated by the last Republican administration was a national calamity, and we demand their renewal and extension upon such terms as will equalize our trade with other nations, remove the restrictions which now obstruct the sale of American products in the ports of other countries, and secure enlarged markets for the products of our farms, forests and factories.

PROTECTION AND RECIPROCITY ARE TWIN MEASURES OF REPUBLICAN POLICY, and hand in hand Democratic rule has recklessly struck down both and both must be re-established. Protection for what we produce; free admission for the necessities of life which we do not produce; reciprocity agreements of mutual interest which gain open markets in return for our open markets to others. Protection builds up domestic industry and trade and secures our own market for ourselves; reciprocity builds up foreign trade and finds an outlet for our surplus.

SUGAR.
We condemn the present Administration for not keeping faith with the sugar producers of this country. The Republican party favors such protection as will lead to the production on American soil of all the sugar which the American people use and for which they paid other countries more than \$100,000,000 annually.

WOOL AND WOOLENS.
To all our products—to those of the mine and field, as well as those of the shop and the factory—to hemp, to wool, the product of the great industry of sheep husbandry as well as to the finished wools of the mill—we promise the most ample protection.

MERCHANT MARINE.
We favor restoring the early American policy of discriminating duties for the upbuilding of our merchant marine and the protection of our shipping interests in the foreign carrying trade, so that the American flag may be seen on the seas, sailing under the Stars and Stripes, and manned, officered and owned by Americans—may regulate the carrying of our foreign commerce.

FREE BALLOT.
We demand that every citizen of the United States shall be allowed to cast one free and unrestricted ballot, and that such ballot be counted and returned as cast.

LYNCHINGS.
We proclaim our unqualified condemnation of the unprovoked and barbarous practice, well known as lynching, of killing of human beings suspected or charged with crime, without process of law.

NATIONAL ARBITRATION.
We favor the creation of a National Board of Arbitration to settle and adjust differences which may arise between employers and employed engaged in interstate commerce.

HOMESTEADS.
We believe in an immediate return to the free homestead policy of the Republican party, and urge the passage by Congress of the satisfactory free homestead measure which has already passed the House and is now pending in the Senate.

TERRITORIES.
We favor the admission of the remaining Territories at the earliest practicable date, having due regard to the interests of the Territories and the United States. All the Federal claims against the Territories should be paid, and the right of self-government should be granted to the Territories.

We believe the citizens of Alaska should have representation in the Congress of the United States, to the end that needful legislation may be intelligently enacted.

TEMPERANCE.
We sympathize with all wise and legitimate efforts to lessen and prevent the evils of intemperance and promote morality.

RIGHTS OF WOMEN.
The Republican party is mindful of the rights of women. Protection of American industries includes equal opportunities, equal pay for equal work, and protection to the home.

WE FAVOR THE ADMISSION OF WOMEN TO WIDER SPHERES OF USEFULNESS, and welcome their co-operation in securing the country from Democratic and Populist mismanagement and misrule. Such are the principles and policies of the Republican party. By these principles we will abide, and these policies we will put into execution. We ask for them the considerate judgment of the American people. Confident alike in the history of our great party and in the justice of our cause, we present our platform and our candidates, in the full assurance that the election will bring victory to the Republican party and prosperity to the people of the United States.

A PRACTICAL SILVER LESSON.
The lessons of experience are worth more than all the theories in the world; and, fortunately, such lessons are not wanting with respect to the question which is at present uppermost in our politics. The very thing that the democrats and populists propose for the restoration of prosperity and the general advantage of the people has been tried in other countries, and have invariably turned out to be disappointing and disastrous. For example take the case of Colombia, as reported by Hon. Luther F. McKinley, the United States Minister to that country. Twenty years ago, he says, gold and silver were coined in the mints of Colombia, both being a legal tender for all debts, and owing to the scarcity of silver it was at a premium of 3 percent over gold. This policy was continued until 1885, gold having meanwhile reached a premium of 20 percent over silver because the imports exceeded the exports and gold had to be brought to pay the balance. Business depression and popular discontent ensued, there was a clamor for cheap money and Congress passed a law making paper currency a legal tender for all debts, and providing that said currency should be redeemable in gold or silver at the option of the Government, the object being to put silver on a par with gold and keep it there by sheer force of legislation.

Thus Colombia declared her financial independence, as Mr. Bryan calls it and attempted to "go it alone" in the matter of her currency. The result was that the gold at once went out of the country, and the Government was forced to a silver basis, the premium on gold rising from 20 percent to 190 percent. By reason of the great reduction in the value of money, there was an advance of about 50 percent in wages; but the increase in the price of commodities was about 200 percent. So, in a practical sense, wages were reduced. The amount of money received for a day's labor in 1885 when gold was the standard would buy a good deal more than the larger amount now received when silver is the standard. "It seems to me," says Minister McKinley, "that if the workmen of the United States will study this object lesson they will readily see that what they want is an honest dollar that will buy as much as the dollar of any other nation." Certainly it is reasonable to assume that the free coinage of silver in this country at the ratio of 16 to 1 while the gold in a gold dollar is worth 100c anywhere in the world and the silver in a silver dollar is worth only a little over 50c would result in the duplication of the experience of Colombia. That is to say, the gold would leave the country, silver would become the standard, and the cost of living be increased in a much larger degree than the price of labor. The experience has worked that way in all the South American countries, and there is not the least reason to believe that it would work differently in the United States. Therefore, it is a thing against which all classes of citizens, and particularly those who labor for a living should cast their votes.

MAY BE A SILVER CONSPIRACY.
American representatives of the large foreign banking-houses have undertaken the task of protecting the treasury gold reserve. It is understood that they have arranged to ease the exchange market until the crop movement starts the balance in our favor. With that object in view the various New York banks yesterday made gold deposits at the sub-treasury to the amount of \$2,950,000.

This patriotic action on the part of what Young Mr. Bryan terms the "aggrandized wealth of the Atlantic states" serves to disprove the populist charge that the latest depletion of the gold reserve is solely the work of the "gold conspirators." Men do not, as a rule, sustain what they are eager to destroy.

It is more reasonable to lay the present treasury raid at the door of the silver barons than upon the threshold of Wall street. It is an undeniable fact that if the plans of the silver monetarists should succeed a premium would be placed upon gold. What could be more natural, therefore, than the mining millions of the Rockies of engaging in a conspiracy to reap an additional profit by raking in gold and waiting for its inevitable rise. Certain it is that these silver miners have plenty of money to invest, and sure it is that by putting their idle capital into gold dollars they would get back a comfortable premium in the event of a free silver victory next November, while a free silver defeat would not entail the loss of a single dollar of their investment. Even the agitation of the free coinage question would possibly bring them a profit within the next few months. The mere threat of action that would make the gold dollar worth more than any other kind of a dollar is sufficient to enhance the value of the gold dollar and to make gold worth hoarding.

THE CAMPAIGN OPENS.

The Republican League of Oregon has entered upon a campaign of education upon the St. Louis platform, embracing both the financial question and the principle of protection, so dear to the hearts of Oregon republicans. In a few days headquarters will be opened and systematic work commenced. Already considerable sound money and tariff literature has been sent into Oregon through its means, but between now and election time great quantities of it will be mailed to voters. The executive committee of the league has issued an address to the republicans of the state, asking for their active assistance in practical campaign work, especially in the matter of club work. They appeal particularly to republicans who feel an inclination to break over party lines and join the free silver movement, to stop and consider well how the success of that movement would affect them as republicans and the principles which they have always held to be of supreme importance. It is an appeal to republicans to stop and think, to refrain them throwing away their republican birthright for a mess of extremely doubtful pottage. Following is the address:

To the Republicans of Oregon.
The Executive Committee of the Republican League of Oregon has entered upon a campaign, to carry the State of Oregon for McKinley and Hobart in November, and in this effort it asks the hearty support of every republican, whether a member of a league club or not.

If you are a member of a republican club, do your utmost to make it a vigorous and active one. If it has become dormant, revive it. Insist upon having frequent meetings, and have them addressed by speakers both local and those brought from a distance. Speakers will be sent out by the league, who will go from club to club.

See that your club is prepared for such meetings. Attend the meetings yourself and induce your neighbors to attend them also. Endeavor to have the clubs in your county unite in a county league, so that speakers sent to your county may be managed in a practical way and all matters of the campaign receive proper attention.

If you do not belong to a club, join one. If there is no club in your precinct, organize one, even if you can get but ten members. The Secretary will furnish you blanks for that purpose upon application.

The situation at the present time is peculiar, and calls for patriotic and thoughtful action. Through four years of misery and gloom, the republicans of Oregon have waited for the time to come when they might cast their votes for Wm. McKinley and the protection of Oregon's industries, and yet, now that the time so ardently longed for has arrived, a new issue has been raised to turn them aside from their righteous and patriotic purpose. Let every republican who remembers the prosperity of the country under republican administration and the prosperity of Oregon under the tariff which bore the name of the statesman who is now the republican nominee for the presidency, and who saw this prosperity stricken down as with a plague in 1892, by the defeat of the republican nominee at the polls, take sober thought of the situation, and determine solemnly in his own mind, whether it is not his imperative and patriotic duty to vote for the man and party whose names are synonyms of prosperity for Oregon and the entire country.

Behind Mr. McKinley are the thrift, the providence, the industry, the business, the intelligence and the honor of the country. Can any republican find in a triumph at the polls of any being he may happen, for the time being, to hold in common with Mr. Bryan, anything whatever to compensate him for helping to elevate these elements into power in the United States, postponing or defeating utterly the protection to American laborers and producers, and for another four years at least keeping the government out of the hands of the only party through whose management the country has found prosperity.
