Edwin Randolph Ockerman, who has been sick for a long time with pulmonary tuberculosis, died Sunday at the home of his father, N. P. Ockerman, near Redville, last Monday about noon. The young man had been up and about the house during the morning, but had to be helped to bed about 11 o'clock, when he began to sink rapidly. He died within an hour. The deceased was aged 19 years, 7 months and 11 days. He was buried Tuesday in the Farmington cemetery by the side of his mother, who had been taken away some years ago by the same malady.

How slender a thread Vanderburg hangs his hopes of success on in his case may be realized by examining his complaint of fraud in South Hillsboro precinct. He charges that defective votes were rejected. The judges of the precinct declare that no defective votes were rejected as far as the intention of the elector could be determined. About five years ago he gave up the store and put the burden of the farm on his shoulders of his son Frank who was willing to assume the same and that his father, whom he loved, might have rest. In 1874 he wedded Miss Anna R. Jack and they two built a happy home as any in the land. To further gladden their hearts there were born to them two sons and two daughters. The care and perfect training of these loved ones was the task the father set for himself and he did it well up to the day of his death. The deceased took an active interest in politics voting with the democratic party. However, the education of the highest order and most praiseworthy character. He never was an office seeker. Many years ago he was initiated into a lodge of O. H. Fellows and kept his membership with Montezuma Lodge No. 50. Living for from two out at lodge meetings and would never consent to take an office though often importuned to do so by his brothers. During his busy life he accumulated a nice property which is left to his widow, that she may complete the work that they together began—the education of their children. COURT HOUSE NEWS.

COUNTY COURT—LAW. Henry Ridgeway filed his petition in which he stated that C. A. Ridgeway, a boy 14 years of age, is an incorrigible boy, and asks that he be committed to the reform school. After taking the testimony of witnesses, the court found it would be for the best interest of the county to commit the same to the reform school for such period as the authorities deem to be advantageous, or until he shall reach the age of 21 years.

A petition was filed by the district attorney at request of W. T. Grier, superintendent of the Boys' and Girls' Aid Society, asking that the person of Marie Roseclair, a minor, be put in the custody of the Boys' and Girls' Aid Society for the reason that her father abuses his parental authority and cruelly treats said child. Cause set for trial Saturday, August 15th, at one o'clock.

PRIORATE COURT. Estate James R. Shepley, deceased. Ordered that the real property described in the petition be sold at private sale, payments to be one-half cash and the balance in one year at 5 per cent interest.

Inventory filed showing personal property \$65.75, realty \$50.06. Ordered that the personal property be set off to the widow for support of herself and children.

TO THE EDITOR:

Your comment of last week upon an "unpublished correspondence" between the undersigned and Hon. C. P. Yates and the publication of such correspondence, call for passing notice. In your publication of the interrogatory and reply, the real communication which should have been given space, was ignored.

As it has been a matter of fact that Mr. Yates' views upon the money question have been for some time from a republican standpoint, rather questionable, and as Mr. Yates has more than once stated that he was opposed to the gold standard, the query was delivered him under cover with a letter, the import of which was a request for an unqualified reply as to his opinion on, or choice of the two money standards.

In other words a direct reply as to what was in his opinion the better money standard was requested. Mr. Yates evaded the direct question and his answer, you will perceive, was a qualified one, inasmuch as he says he has weighed the various platforms. This but places Mr. Yates on record as preferring the gold standard with "protection" to bimetalism with a democratic revenue plank, and in no way does he give a direct expression as to which money standard he prefers.

Mr. Yates was a candidate before the county convention for re-nomination as representative and it is a well known fact that he had incurred much opposition from the party leaders by his views on the money question. He received but eleven votes as a result and it is very safe to presume these were free silver votes. As Mr. Yates had said he was opposed to the gold standard, the query you published was given him and had the answer been a direct one instead of a resume of party platforms, The Argus would have published his response.
