LOCAL AND GENERAL.

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The cheap rates of \$12 cabin and \$6 steerage, including meals and berth, are still in effect on the O. R. & N. Co's steamers, from Portland to San Francisco. Steamers leave Portland every five days. For further particulars see J. I. Knight, Hillsboro.

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The S. P. Company has not taken off the flying train between Portland and San Francisco, nor have the standard rates been established. Including berths, the tickets for Pullman standard sleepers are \$19 and for Pullman tourist sleepers \$10. A train starts every five days, leaving Portland at 10 p. m. The next train leaves Portland Sunday, November 9th.

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HORTICULTURISTS AND DAIRYMEN

Special courses for horticulturists and dairymen will be given at the State Agricultural College, beginning the second Monday of January, 1897 and continuing four weeks. The course in horticulture will include special studies and lectures on plant breeding, fungus diseases, fruit drying and general cultivation by Prof. U. P. Hendrick. Lectures on fruit drying and chemistry of fruits and soils will be given by Prof. G. W. Shattuck. Lectures on insect pests and general entomology by Prof. A. B. Cordley.

Lectures upon breeds of dairy stock, grasses and forage plants, and stock feeding will be given by Prof. H. T. Proulx. The use of the Babcock test, practical instruction in dairy methods and the operation of creamery by F. L. Kent.

These courses are provided for the practical dairymen and horticulturists who are desirous of taking advantage of the facilities offered by the Agricultural college. The departments of botany, entomology and chemistry are well provided with special studies and lectures on plant breeding, fungus diseases, fruit drying and general cultivation by Prof. U. P. Hendrick. Lectures on fruit drying and chemistry of fruits and soils will be given by Prof. G. W. Shattuck.
