PROBATE COURT.

Estate L. B. Williams, deceased. Sarah J. Williams, widow, appointed administratrix with bonds fixed at \$1000.00. Ordered that the household furniture be set off for the widow's support, also grocery stores for the present support of the family. The administratrix is to sell the personal property at either public or private sale, but at private sale, it must not be below the appraised value. All sums less than \$10 must be cash in hand, sums over \$10 may be paid in notes, notes bearing 8 per cent interest.

Estate Jacob Keim, deceased. Estate closed of record.

Estate David Munroe, deceased. Ellen First one of the heirs of said Munroe, deceased assigns her interest in said estate to Robt. Ince.

Estate R. D. Malone, deceased. Final account allowed and the estate closed of record.

Estate Wm A. Porter, deceased. Final account shows that the receipts were \$263.40 that the claims allowed are \$594.40, and that the balance on hand of \$181.30. To the Editor:—I call attention to the Short Course on Horticulture and Dairying contemplated by the State Agricultural college at Corvallis, commencing Jan. 11th and ending Feb. 8th. This is probably the best opportunity for a person to acquire a practical, scientific knowledge of those two important industries ever offered in this state.

The Agricultural College Short Courses are becoming very popular in the East, and are all well attended. President Miller deserves great credit for introducing the college innovation in this state.

The advantages offered to students in this short course are many. Lectures from professors who have made a life study of all the different phases of those industries will be given, and the students will be afforded the college library, and to be benefited from all of the experimental stations in the Union. Microscopic photography, and illustrated lectures of every description are also included.

It is certainly a rare opportunity for a young man or woman to acquire a knowledge that will make them proficient in those branches of husbandry.

The tuition is free, and good board and lodging can be obtained for from \$2 to \$4 per week.

and be done with those who are ever ready to shed crocodile tears, of which they seem to have a good supply. All evidence, however, point to the fact that many of those who voted in the past the people's party ticket have opened their eyes; otherwise the combine of the reformers would have been a success for the soreheads and the few demagogues who managed the combine-humbug.

This is plainly seen from a simple comparison of the vote of 1894, 1896 and 1898. In the general elections of 1892 the republican party was 3902 votes behind the vote of the populist and democratic tickets; in 1894, 2500 votes behind; and in 1896 general elections, 4007 votes, and had not Gaston on the populist ticket run 5490 votes behind the two populist candidates for congress, the republican party would have been 9497 votes behind. But in the presidential elections of 1896 the republican party came out ahead with 2042 votes over the whole combine. Any one can thus see the immense gain of the republican party; indeed it is almost a miracle, and the whole secret of the matter is in the fact that the thinking populists would not submit to be handled over like sheep to the humbug combine, and went back to their old affiliations with the republican party. Such is the character of the relation so justly afflicted upon the marriage makers between the dems and the pops.

As to the stupid charge that I am trying to cause a split in the populist party—well, no. I split has been made by my very accusers when they handed over the once splendid organization of the populist party to the treacherous junta, and their slander and abuse of those who would not submit to the deal only reminds one of the old story of the thief, who, to escape his pursuers, kept on shouting at the top of his voice, "Stop the thief!"

By any one of common sense can fully understand this, as he can also understand why the people's party that cast 13,651 votes, and in 1894, 25,579 votes, and in 1896, 31,521 (taking the vote of the two congressmen, since Gaston failed to pull the party's strength by 5490 votes), why, with all this remarkable progress, the party has suffered such a dishonorable defeat.

A STRAIGHT POPULIST. The Railway Age, which as a general thing is correct and clear-headed in its survey of the business situation throughout the country, appears just at this time to be in a pessimistic mood.—New Orleans States.

No, sir! Our contemporary has not read us right, if it thinks we are even pessimistic. If anybody in the country working any harder to bring about the existing situation than we did, or if anybody feels that he has any more reason to feel comfortably self-satisfied with his work, that person will please hold up his hand. We have, it is true, done our best to discourage the promiscuous and unintelligent shouting that so many newspapers indulged in immediately after election. Good times are coming; we all know that, and we must all set soberly and industriously to work to help them to come. But those people or papers who held out hopes of a gigantic and universal revival immediately following the close of the campaign, did unwisely and did wrong. Under any circumstances the business of a great nation can only recover from a prolonged season of prostration by slow and evolutionary stages. Moreover, this is the wrong time of year for a boom. The special reports which we have received during the past three weeks and abstracts of these have been published in these pages—from some 300 railway companies and manufacturing concerns, shows that in many directions there has already been a positive increase in business activity; but it is an increase based only on hope and a spirit of anticipation. Let us all sit tight and go about our work earnestly, giving things a push whenever opportunity offers, but let us not shout "boom boom!" when there is no boom. That only does harm. There is something better than a boom ahead—a good, solid, slow revival of business, which will culminate in a stretch or several years of active prosperity.—Railway Age, December 11.
