There is quite a large attendance at the meetings in the Christian church, being conducted by Evangelist F. L. Pierce. One woman has joined the church and other persons are much interested. Sunday evening, Mr. Pierce will give some of his early history. The meetings will be continued every night this week at 7:30 o'clock. All are cordially invited.

Rev. E. Walker, missionary, late of Son Chow China will occupy the pulpit in the M. E. Church next Sunday morning. Mr. Walker has been connected with the Methodist mission in that Chinese City, he is a near neighbor and quite familiar with the work there. He will say something of the magnitude of the Methodist station, including church, school and college. Mr. Walker will be in his pulpit and speak, answering the question: "What shall I read?"

A personal letter from "Bauch Bill" who has occasionally contributed a very readable letter to the INDEPENDENT, states that he will be engaged for two or three months near Brookfield, Washington in trapping some small mammals in the neighborhood of the U. S. N. museum. He did some work of the same kind last fall on "Jim Crow" and "Crooked" creeks, tributaries of the Columbia from the Washington side. The National Museum is actively working up the fauna of the Northwest and "Bill" is its most skillful collector.

Chemist Shaw of the Oregon Agricultural college, writing about the success to be expected from the use of sugar-beets grown in this county: "During the season just passed I received some beets from Washington county that represent more nearly what can be expected from sugar beets when grown under the best conditions. These beets were grown by Mr. R. Kuhne, who for three years was an expert grower for the Oxnard factory in Nebraska, and for many years previous to that, was a grower for sugar purposes in Germany. These beets analyzed as follows: 17 per cent sugar in the juice, 14.4 per cent sugar; 16.6 per cent sugar, 8.2 per cent purity; 17.8 per cent sugar, 88.6 per cent purity."

There will be a meeting in Glencoe tomorrow to agitate the subject of building a plank road to Portland. The thing to be considered tomorrow is the amount of money and labor to be pledged for the improvement. The plan now proposed is to lay an eight foot roadway of four inch plank from Glencoe to Cedar Mills. From Cedar Mills to the County line, from the County line to Portland the road is of rock. The distance to be planked is 16 miles. It is proposed to bed stringers in the ground and lay the plank thereon. They will rest firmly on the ground but the stringers will prevent uneven settling. The lumber will cost \$150 per mile and the whole improvement will require eight or nine thousand dollars.

A very enjoyable reception was given Saturday evening, by the Y. W. C. A. and Y. M. C. A. of Pacific University in honor of Miss Best, lately principal of the Academy, who is soon to depart for Corea. Asia. Herick's hall was thrown open for the occasion. The fore part of the evening was spent in conversation, etc. A short program was rendered, consisting of a piano solo, by Miss Parker, a vocal solo by Miss Scotland, a quartette by the Y. M. C. A. club. President McClelland gave a short talk on Corea and its Missions, after which he presented Miss Best with a gift from the students. Miss Best thanked them for taking so great an interest in her future welfare. After singing, "Missionary Hymn" and a prayer by Rev. E. Walker, the assembly bade Miss Best good-bye, and dispersed. Miss Best left Tuesday morning for her former home, where, after a short visit she will leave for Corea. It is understood that her position at Pacific University will not be filled until next year.

Lincoln Day was celebrated in Hillsboro last Friday evening by the Ladies' Society of the Congregational church. The program was made up of vocal music, addresses and tableaux. Prof. Stanley spoke of Lincoln as a literary man, Hon. H. V. Gates saw him as a soldier, while W. N. Barrett spoke of the great American as a lawyer. One feature of the evening was a soprano and alto quartet by the younger girls and a tenor and bass quartet by the boys. This is the first time these young people have appeared, and it went very pleasantly. The tableaux were judiciously selected and well executed. The celebration of the day at the East was quite general, but so far as Oregon is concerned, this one stands alone. The only other place where schools in Albina, Portland, is expected.

The advance class from the Hillsboro public school is quite vain of the record that it has made in the last week at the teachers' examination. The five representatives passed with a standing of from 83 to 95 per cent. The percentage for passing is 70. The McMinville Transcript reports that in Yamhill county there were 24 applicants, but only 7 of these were successful. The examination questions are reported to be more difficult than any heretofore used.

Mrs. J. A. Imbrie, now visiting with her sister at Ventura, California, writes that they had a very heavy rain there about the first of the month, but that now dust is flying. Clover and alfalfa is about ten inches high, while the oranges are in full fruitage. Oranges are not sold here in the small boxes as heretofore, but in great burlap sacks like we buy potatoes.

The S. P. Company has not taken off the fly from between Portland and San Francisco, nor have the standard rates been established. Including berths, the tickets for Pullman standard sleepers are \$21 and for Pullman tourist sleepers \$14. A train starts every five days, leaving Portland at 10 p. m. The next train leaves Portland Sunday, February 21st.

The U. S. fish commissioner is about to introduce into the Columbia river striped bass, a fish that feeds on carp. It would be a good thing to foster a carp enemy, but while the commissioner is doing that what assurance has he that young salmon will not be exterminated as well. The salmon industry is growing and any striped bass can exploit.

There is a brick from the outer wall of the old Ford theatre, Washington D. C. in the window of the Delta Drug Store. It looks very much like our Oregon bricks, only larger. It will be remembered that President Lincoln was assassinated in the Ford theatre, and also that the walls fell last summer killing a number of laborers.

Capt. Merryman, President of the Board of Trade calls a meeting for Monday evening next and invites the attendance of the citizens. There are several business men in town who are not members and this is a good thing to seek out. Mr. Walker will be there to work for the board this week, and its ranks should be full.

A German named Hunger, living near Manning with his wife, called on a neighbor one evening this week, leaving their five children at home alone. While the parents were absent their dwelling caught fire and with its contents was burned. The children having gone to bed escaped in their night clothes.

Mrs. S. N. Bronson died suddenly at her residence in Hillsboro yesterday morning, having been stricken two days before with paralysis of the throat. At the time of death she was in the 71st year of age. The funeral services will be observed at 2 o'clock, Friday, at the home of Mrs. M. E. Church.

Mr. Zimmerman, who was lost to his friends Monday night and a part of Tuesday, safely reached home. He got off his horse while on the road home, and the animal went off and left him to stay over night at a neighbor's. Thus the reason for alarm.

Dr. Linklater reports that Col. Pollock, U. S. A., is convalescent and doing fairly well. The Col. has had a close call but he will score another victory, being reinforced by Surgeon Linklater.

Mrs. McKay of Glencoe died at her home Tuesday last at the age of 90 years. She with her husband came to Tualatin plains in 1841 or 1842, and has resided here ever since.

We had a smart shower last Sunday night and Monday forenoon, but the liberal quantity of water that fell seems for the most part to have been wasted.

## SUGAR BEET MEETING.

A call meeting of those interested in sugar beet culture was held at the city hall last Monday evening. Chairman Bryan presided. He stated that the object of this meeting was to hear the report of the committee heretofore appointed.

Dr. Bailey, from that committee, reported in these words: "Mr. Chairman—We, your committee appointed at last meeting to investigate the feasibility of a beet sugar factory to be operated in this vicinity, beg leave to report that we have made diligent inquiry into and investigated the subject submitted to us, and find that our country can successfully grow the sugar beet; that analyses made of samples of beets raised in this county show a sucrose content of 18.91 per cent, 13.96 per cent of succharine matter and 15.50 per cent for 1892 being a fair per cent above the grade required to pay profit in the market for a beet sugar factory."

We have not sufficient data to warrant your committee in saying with certainty that an iron clad promise on the part of the farmers in the vicinity of Hillsboro, could be obtained to cultivate and furnish beets enough to run a plant of a capitalization of say \$250,000, but we are of the opinion that such pledge or promise could be obtained, if there was any assurance that capital could be induced, in sufficient amount, to embark in the enterprise.

We furthermore beg to report that we have investigated the matter of the rumors or reports that capital in Portland or elsewhere was waiting and anxious for investment in a sugar-beet factory in Oregon; that your committee has much to do in inquiry into the matter and has been unable so far to find that any capitalist or capitalist is ready to undertake such an enterprise in our midst. Further time, investigation and correspondence, however, may yet see the capital sufficient to embark in the industry of manufacturing sugar from beets in Oregon. We would therefore recommend that as the Board of Trade of Hillsboro, is a more permanent body than a meeting of citizens, to consider a matter of this importance, the whole subject be referred to said Board with a request to take such action in the matter as the Board may deem best. All of which is respectfully submitted.

The report of the committee was adopted.

It is the discussion of the report Dr. Bailey stated that the analysis of later crops had not yet been published but that he had it from the chemist that it was even better than the earlier tests. The bulletin containing this matter is soon to be issued. It further appeared that Washington county so far, had proven to be better adapted to the industry than any other locality in the state unless it is Douglas and Jackson counties are excepted. Dr. Bailey thinks that the experiment station of the Agricultural College is prepared to furnish standard seed for experimental growing of beets, the experiment being with a plot of ground measuring one fourth of an acre.

Mr. Gates from the committee had looked up the report that a company had been organized and found that while one or two parties are engaged in an attempt to exploit the organization, not a dollar is in sight for that purpose. The manufacturers association, a meeting of which was attended, is working in the interest of a state bounty law. And the executive committee of manufacturers has called all to be introduced in the senate which provides for the payment of a bounty of one cent per pound on all sugar manufactured from beets grown in Oregon for which the farmer has received \$5 per ton. It is the idea of the manufacturers association that such a bounty will attract capital to the state for investment in the industry. Judge Humphries thought the next thing of importance for us in Hillsboro to do is to get pledges from farmers who are ready to cultivate 2,000 acres of land in beets. Such a pledge will be an attraction that will turn sugar makers this way without it they might pass us by.

Several persons thought that the board of trade is the proper organization to handle the matter, and if any of our business men desire to push the matter faster, than they think the board might be inclined to do they should seek membership in that organization and become "fresh blood."

The business of the meeting having been completed, it adjourned.
