

PRISON LIFE IN TEXAS.

Capture, Imprisonment and Escape of J. N. Howard,
Co. "E," 32 Iowa Volunteers.

CHAPTER X.

My cousin Amanda Hendly whom I have mentioned before was the cousin that I wrote to from the prison. The letter was taken to the union lines by a chaplain who had been sent home.

I arrived at Ozark on Friday evening where I found my friends, and here like all other places, I found a most cordial welcome. They did everything within the bounds of reason to make me happy. On Sunday I went to Sabbath school with my cousin. It was soon whispered around that I was the prisoner that had written the letter on the brown wrapping paper. I was told that my letter was read in every home in town and my appearance among them made quite a stir, as they all had something to say. I stayed with my friends until Monday morning, then started for Quincy, Ills. Thence to St. Joseph Mo. There I took the steamer for Brownsville, Neb. Now all I knew of my father was his post-office address, but by inquiry I found that Vesta was 45 miles west of that place. I was obliged to go on foot as there was no conveyance. It was two o'clock when I started from Brownsville. I walked out ten miles that afternoon and stopped for the night. In a short time there was a man rode up from the West on horse back who also called for lodging; it was then night and after we were in bed he asked me where I was going. I told him I was trying to find my father. He wanted to know where my father lived; "perhaps I can tell you as I am acquainted all over the country." I told him that his name is Robert Howard, and his postoffice is Vesta.

Said he: "I am well acquainted with him and he is very uneasy about you; he will be greatly relieved to see you. He thought that you were dead."

Then he asked me if I had any friends living in Oneida County by the name of Star or Delay. I told him that I had some friends by those names near Nebraska City but that was all I knew about them. He then told me that they lived fifteen miles from there on the Nemaha, and he advised me to go there next morning and he said: "they will be glad to take you to your father." My mind was greatly relieved at this information. I took his advice as it was a longer walk than I cared to take because it was very muddy. In the morning I started across the country. There was no road the greater part of the way and but few houses. My way was north and on the Nemaha river. It was one o'clock when I struck my uncle's farm. Within a quarter of a mile of the house I met my cousin Hettie Star. Although we were strangers, on inquiry we found that we were of kin. In a short time William Star joined us and we all went to the house. I there found myself surrounded with friends, and what made it seem more strange it was the first time I had ever seen any of my mother's people. This was a great pleasure to me. I had often heard my father speak of my mother who died when I was 8 years old. I stayed over night. In the morning my cousin, William Star and wife went with me to see my father and step-mother, one sister and five step-brothers and sisters.

The children were all small when I left home three years before but had grown almost out of my knowledge. My eldest sister was at one of the neighbors when I came but word was sent to her that I had come. She sprang to her feet and started for home. I saw her coming down the road, and one would have thought that she was trying to kill herself on certainly she had gone beside herself. We were all together once more, to talk of things of the past. I could look back over the three years that I had spent in the war, and wonder how it was possible that I was still here. I remembered the boys that fell by my side, and the death messengers that had down thick and fast around me and yet I come out without a wound or a mark of a ball. Besides all this I remember to this day of the exposure which I have passed through—all the storms, rain and wind, laying on the ground without clothing or blankets to keep me warm, wading swamps and swimming streams. It seems beyond human endurance.

I had saved all my wages and had money enough to buy the best quarter section of land in the county with timber enough for myself and for many of my neighbors. I went to work and put up a house and improved my barn. Everything around me bid fair for financial prosperity. I built many castles in the air and set my stake very high in life, (but alas it all fell to the ground and I have made a failure of life thus far and what there is in the future I don't know.)

Five years after the war was over I was at an election at Vesta, a small town five miles from where I was living. While there, I accidentally found Mr. Straw, the man to whom I gave the basswood poultice for his eyes. At the time I gave it to him he was an entire stranger—I never saw him after, until I met him at Vesta. He had been in business there for one year and I had done my trading

with him all this time and never thought of him being the same man, but owing to a conversation which took place between him and another man, I learned that he had been a prisoner at Tyler. I then remembered that I had asked him his name at the time I saw him there. I waited until the crowd had passed out, when I asked him if he did not live with some of the 150th Ills. boys at Tyler, with some eyes. He said he did. I then asked him if he remembered of some one giving him a poultice to apply to the eyes.

He said: "Yes, are you the man?" I said I was the man that gave it to him. I have forgotten his words of thankfulness, only he said if it had not been for me he would have been blind. He said it was the first thing that he had tried that had done him any good. He followed up the remedy for a few days and the result was that it took out the inflammation and he was so much better that he could see to go around and wait on himself. Now this act of kindness proved to be as bread cast on the water which can be gathered up many years hence. I was trying for a pension a few years after and had it not been for Mr. Straw I would not have been able to get it. But you see he was a witness. I got his affidavit, and secured a small pension.

Now my readers you have the story of my capture on the battlefield of Pleasant Hill and prison life and escape, all my travels through the pines and my arrival at home and the meeting with my friends and as imperfect as these few pages may be, I have spent many an hour of thought to bring it about, but if my readers have been interested in my story I will feel paid for all my trouble. And now if my republican friends and comrades wish to do me a favor, and will give me the nomination and support, for sheriff of Washington County, when the time comes I will be very grateful to them.

A STUPENDOUS COLUMN OF WATER

Altogether the most extraordinary water power installation—so far as head is concerned—ever known has recently been made by the Pelton Water Wheel Co., in one of the famous Comstock Mines at Virginia City, Nevada. The wheel is 36 in. diameter, made of a solid steel disc with the buckets riveted on to the periphery in a way to afford absolute security, weighing complete 179 lbs.

It is running under a vertical head of 2100 feet, equal to 911 lbs. pressure 460 feet of this head is obtained from the pipe line of the Gold Hill Water Co., and the remaining 1640 feet from the California and Con. Virginia shaft, down which the pipe line is run to the Sutor Tunnel level where the power station is located and through which the water discharges after passing over the wheel. The wheel runs at 1150 revolutions, with a peripheral speed of 10,842 feet per minute, or about 120 miles per hour. Two miles per minute.

The construction of the wheel amply provides for the centrifugal strain the velocity of the water gives it, running without load, when it would attain the enormous speed of 21,608 feet per minute, equal to about 240 miles per hour. A nozzle tip 1/2 in. diameter gives under above conditions 100 h. p. Every miner's inch of water, equal to a flow of 1.6 cubic feet per minute, gives 5 h. p., while 1 h. p. is given for every 2 p. of metal in the wheel. It is only by comparison that an idea can be obtained of the height of a column of water due to such pressure. It is more than four times as high as the Washington Monument and considerably more than twice the height of the Eiffel Tower. It is safe to say that no water wheel has ever before been operated under any such head, nor any such demonstration afforded of the velocity and power of water under such an extreme pressure.

The installation made by the Pelton Company some three years ago in the Chollar shaft on the Comstock lode is in some respects no less extraordinary. This consisted of six 40 in. Pelton Wheels, which run under a vertical head of 1680 feet, driving that number of electrical generators, the power from which is conveyed up the shaft to the Nevada Mill some 2000 feet distant. These wheels only weigh 220 lbs. each, and with nozzle tips 1/2 of an inch diameter develop 125 h. p. each.

The water is first run under a Pelton Wheel on the surface under 460 ft. head, and is then carried down the shaft by a pipe to the Sutor Tunnel level, where the underground station is located, the power from the electrical generators being conveyed to the counter shaft of the mill with which the surface wheel is connected, the two distinct forces working together in perfect harmony.

A most interesting illustration of the double use of water is here given, some 400 h. p. being produced in this way from what may be termed waste water. This station has now been running more than three years without interruption and practically without expense in the way of repairs, as well as without any appreciable loss in efficiency, affording a most striking example of the advantages of water power, both by direct

application and electric transmission as also the reliability of a plant of this character running under such extraordinary conditions.

OVER THE STATE.

The torpedo boats building at Wolf & Zwicker's yards in Portland are well under way.

Clackamas County is going to pay five dollars per day to a book keeper to go through the money transactions and see how the cash has been spent.

The Columbia & Southern railroad Company expect to reach Wasco from The Dalles this fall with the tract. The cost is estimated at \$80,000.

Wiley and Sullivan picked up a \$300 nugget in a pocket of their quartz claim on Hayes creek last week. This is only 4 miles south of Grant's Pass.

There are many paying mines in Jackson county. Last week, after a run of 12 days, a clean-up of \$112 was made at the mine of Henry McKee, near Evans creek.

Younglove & Green are piping during daylight on their Louie creek diggings some six miles from Grant's Pass, utilizing the waters of their reservoir. They employ eight men.

Kremer & Kiessling are preparing to put in a 5-mile ditch to furnish water for their placer mine on Horsehead, Josephine county. Powell's creek will be tapped for the purpose.

Shary Bros. and Hosmer have bought the Bristow placers on Powell creek, Josephine county, for \$1000. The sale includes pipes giant derrick etc., and the firm now control a good part of this rich gulch.

A \$180 nugget was brought in from the Jewett-Hayes placer mine on Oscar creek last week. Resting on Jewett & Dodge's desk it looks like a yellow stone, just about the size to throw at a chicken hawk, remarks the Grants' Pass Courier.

The O. R. & N. Co. has agreed to make a 50-cent per ton rate on freight belonging to the beet-sugar industry for all points in Union county within a radius of 30 miles from the town of La Grande, conditioned, of course, that a factory shall be located at that place.

The babies' home at Portland is short of cash, and all of the little innocents will be thrown out on the cold world unless charities come in faster than they have done. This state of things is because the popularists refused to help organize the legislature.

Business men of Toledo, Lincoln county, met Wednesday and organized a board of trade. C. L. Gowell was elected president of the board; R. K. Chambers, vice-president; O. O. Krostad, secretary; J. H. McNeil, assistant secretary, and E. F. Gaar, treasurer.

The state of Oregon has a heavy bill of expense to meet for the keep of the criminal and dependent classes. There are 60 pupils in the school for the deaf; 23 pupils in the school for the blind; 1,111 patients in the state insane asylum; 131 boys in the state reform school; 354 convicts in the state prison.

Secretary Kincaid issues certificates of time to senators for attendance on the legislature but refuses to issue them to the members of the house. This is a hard blow to many of them, who are about broke, after their forty days in the Salem wilderness fighting the devil in the guise of hotels, saloons, cigar stores, eating houses and some other houses.

Russell Montgomery son of J. R. Montgomery of Portland was a cadet last year at West Point. He failed in his examinations because he spent too much time with athletics. He was dismissed from school and then disappeared. For months no tidings came. Finally the captain of a Cuban dynamite battery wrote Mr. Montgomery that his son, Russell, is a lieutenant in the battery company, and is fighting for Cuba Libre.

C. F. Royal & Son, contractors of Salem, have been awarded the contract by the Tillamook county court for the construction of a Howe truss bridge across the Big Nestucca, twelve miles above Woods. The price they are to receive is \$5084. There will be a span 184 feet in length and the approach will be 200 feet. This is the third time this firm has been the lowest bidder for the erection of this bridge; heretofore the court held that their proposal was too high, but this time it is higher than ever before.

After cutting down a cottonwood tree on the river bank at La Grande, Mr. James R. Nydols, of that city is reported to have made a peculiar find. The tree was about two and a half feet in diameter, and was hollow in the center. Two words were apparently found on all sides, but in the hollow space there were twenty-six shells of hen's eggs, all in a good state of preservation. From the appearance of the shells, it seemed that the eggs might have been deposited in that strange receptacle many years ago.

A resident on South slough, in Coos county was caught in his own bear trap the other day. He had set the trap a day or two before, and so well did he cover it with leaves and moss that he was unable to locate it when he went to look for it. While hunting for the trap, he put his foot in it and was held fast, remaining there for a day and a night, until rescued by A. Niebois, who happened to be looking for cattle in the neighborhood and heard his calls for assistance.
