More has been heard from the project to build a motor line toward Beaverton. The route will be by the old cable line to Spring street where the hill is to be tunneled and the way continued to the gap in Zion church, thence on the south side of the hill to Beaverton. The tunnel is to be complete and the road built to the church within the next nine months.

The S. P. Company has not taken out the flying train between Portland and San Francisco, nor have the standard rates been established. Including berths, the tickets for Pullman standard sleepers are \$21 and for Pullman tourist sleepers \$14. A train starts every five days leaving Portland at 10 p. m. The next train leaves Portland Saturday, April 17th.

Mr. Ralston of Gaston died of pneumonia last Tuesday morning at his home. He had reached the age of 74 years and had been long exposed to one of those cold winds of ten day ago. A severe case of pneumonia developed which ended six days later. His physician, Dr. Cole could not successfully fight the disease, though he was aided by Dr. Tamsel of this place.

Mr. Joseph Rogers, teacher in district No. 45, at Tualatin, has had to sue the clerk for his wages. The board of directors drew a warrant for the amount, but the clerk refused to pay the warrant, notwithstanding he has money for that purpose. The clerk refused on the ground that the teacher had not been legally employed. The matter is arousing much feeling in the neighborhood.

Mr. J. T. Young living one and a half miles west of town met with a painful accident Wednesday morning. He was plowing and at a turn raised the plow up by the handles, but the spring broke and it fell on his head, striking him on the forehead. Mr. Young's knee which it hit upon broke in three or more places. Dr. Tamsel dressed the wound and sent his patient home with the injunction to keep quiet for a fortnight.
