

AN ADVENTURE IN THE WILLAMETTE VALLEY.

While Rev. J. S. Griffin and wife were residing at Ft. Vancouver in the winter of 1840-41, he started to pay the missionaries of the Methodist Board at their old station, a visit. The old station was in Marion county opposite where Westland now is.

He started out from Oregon City, then known as Willamette or Wiameth Falls, with two Frenchmen, in a Cowlitz canoe. This kind of a canoe is long and narrow, cut through the waves and has a rim. A chinook canoe is made to ride the waves. The Frenchmen had loaded it very awkwardly; a grindstone for instance being placed on top instead of in the bottom. There was snow in the mountains and it was very cold. Above Rock Island where a point ran out into the river from the right, the current caught the boat, and it wobbled badly; it was a wonder it did not go under. Two canoes following, did go under. Mr. Griffin saw a trail which struck across to Champow, and had them land him to walk across the point. The river struck off to the right. He struck a stream which he forded, the Pudding river trail followed along for a piece on the gravel and then ascended the bank. He got on a trail which led a way off to the left where Silverton now stands. It had snowed three weeks before, and in the trail was the track of a horse which he determined to follow, as he went he now and then tore a leaf from his note book, wrote on it where he was going and stuck it up in a stake by the trail, night overtook him still following the trail. He had brought nothing along for kindling a fire, but Mrs. Griffin had him wear for the rough journey, a pair of pants, which he had worn the year before on the Mool Pel. In the pocket was a yellow translucent stone which he had picked up on the Mool Pel as a curiosity. On the way he had pulled up some dead grass and kept it next his body under his arm so that, now it was dry. He had in his pocket a piece of birch bark which had been used for tinder, punk. In a cresset of this there seemed to be the least mile of punk. The grass he rubbed till it was like tow; with his knife for a steel and the stone which proved to be remarkably good flint, he managed to start a fire. There were about him scattering large firs under which he found dead limbs. In the crevice in a large tree he stood limbs to the windward and stuffed them with fern to break the wind. He pulled the fire away from where it had been burning, and scamped together a warm bed of the earth, ashes, &c, and managed to spend the night quite comfortably. The next day he tramped on all day. Toward night he saw in the distance, ash trees along a low place and hoped it might be the Willamette, but it proved to be a branch of the Pudding river. He had become much exhausted; when he sat down to rest, he had to make two or three efforts before he could get on his feet again. On reaching the stream he gave up in despair, laid him down without fire never expecting to rise again. He lay on the bank below the main prairie, but as he lay there he felt a jarring of the ground. Human beings must be near, and this put hope and life into him. He looked across the stream, and saw heavy strips of bark leaning against a tree and smoke ascending, some distance away across the stream. Opposite him the stream had undermined the bank, and a tree leaned over toward his side. He waded out till the water came to his waist, caught hold of some branches of the leaning tree, and climbed on to it, and went to the Indians. He and they had just one word in common, Champow. The Indians were pounding some sort of food in a stone mortar, and it was the jar of this which he had heard or felt. His boots did not fit him well, and they had first blistered his feet, and then galled them deeply into the flesh. He showed his feet to the Indians; they examined the inside of the boots, and seeing there was nothing in them to this wound his feet, they understood that he was lost. At first he could not swallow. He gave them a hazel nut which they pounded up, and he mumbled it in his mouth. He crawled into the tent and laid down by the fire. There was a skin over the hole where they crawled out and in, and every little while the dogs would rush out, and push this skin aside, and Mr. G. would have to rise and push it back again. He did not sleep nearly so comfortably as he had the night before.

The next morning he signed to the Indians for two horses and a pack mule. They went for the horses, but afterward signed that the streams were frozen over, and the horses could not cross. So he had to go a foot. They guided him back about three miles, and then turned to the left and brought him to the extreme edge of French prairie—to the first house on it. Here he hired a man and two horses, and rode to the Methodist station, opposite where Westland now is. He found there two or three log houses. He wanted to find Jason Lee's house. He started for the house on the left. In the other house he saw a woman; and as he walked past, she, Mrs. Jason Lee, mistook him for Daniel Lee who had recently married a lady there by the name of Ware. She called to him, "You're a pretty fellow; well, catwauw." At the house he found that the place where the woman was, was Jason Lee's, and when she discovered her mistake, she was a good deal embarrassed;

said it served her right for speaking so to anyone. Mr. G's feet were in a very bad condition; at first he feared they would need to be amputated. He remained some time with the Lees. The cold was very severe, and the river frozen over.

Mr. Lee had started several stations, manning them with blacksmiths, carpenters, &c. They had come out under strong religious excitement; but some of them were now coming back on him. Several gathered about him one day, one said, "You told us back East that the Willamette never froze over." Mr. Lee replied "be careful what you say." A second said a third made the same assertion, and he gave them the same answer. Then he said "I told you that in three years I had never seen it frozen over."

POPULISTS TOOK MONEY.

The following is taken from the Astoria Budget, a paper that supported the fusion ticket last spring and also supported Bryan in November: "W. S. U'Ren, populist, has confessed in open meeting that all the opposition which held up the legislature at Salem last winter received \$50 to \$100 for their services from the political enemies of John H. Mitchell. U'Ren said he received \$80, and that Representative Ogle, another populist, paid his own expenses out of his own pocket, and he was the only one who did that."

The meeting at which Representative U'Ren made his confession was held in Oregon City Saturday, March 27th. It was called by the populist county central committee, for the purpose of considering the action of the populist members during the late legislative session, special reference being had to the Clackamas county members. About half the precincts of the county were represented at the meeting, and while the public was invited, only about 40 outsiders were present.

"At the meeting Charles Spence, populist, took U'Ren severely to task for the action of the populist members. 'You were sent there,' said Spence, 'to do your honest duty, and prevent to the utmost of your ability vicious legislation. You were sent there to do something, not to do nothing. The people who are responsible for it, and populists could not be responsible for vicious legislation unless they aided in it. If you had gone in and done your duty, we could go out in the state and talk politics; now we've got to defend your conduct.'"

"This is the first populist meeting called since the hold-up legislators came home, and to judge it by the small attendance and the chilly reception it got from the outsiders, it indicates the strong sentiments of disapproval that the hold-ups will meet all over the state. "The statement of Spence is significant. He says on account of the disgraceful conduct of the populist members, it will be impossible for the party to take the stump in the next campaign and talk politics at all. This shows how utterly the populists have been disarmed by a lot of cheap knaves as leaders."

"U'Ren states that all the opposition, with the single exception of Ogle, received money to pay their expenses during the hold-up of 45 days. As this comes from one of the opposition, he certainly knows what he is talking about. This is a serious and sweeping charge, as it includes the members of the senate opposed to Mitchell. It is a fact that none of the members-elect of the senate or house received a cent from the state for their services and it has been a conundrum to their constituents how the expenses of the hold-ups were paid and who paid them. The confession of U'Ren explains the problem. They took money from the enemies of Mitchell. Who were the chief enemies of Mitchell?"

"If what Mr. U'Ren says, regarding the price paid the opposition, per capita be true, they are the cheapest set of scoundrels that ever solicited the suffrages of the people of Oregon and every mother's son of them deserve to serve a term in the penitentiary. They have not only deprived the state of a United States senator, but actually robbed all the employees of the state institutions of 50 per cent of their wages and added 10 per cent or more to the cost of all supplies that the state must purchase in the next two years. The aggregate loss will reach beyond a quarter of a million dollars. If this is the first lesson that U'Ren and his followers would have us take it is a very costly one, and should be the last."

"But we don't believe what U'Ren says in regard to the price paid. There were other knaves in the vanguard of the hold-up. Bourne and Young are not cheap politicians. How much did they get for the delivery of the cheap reformers. A thousand dollars per head would have been cheap for such a lot of gillies."

The spirit which prompted the act is the spirit which is the cause of most of the adversity and suffering in the world. The man who committed the crime must not be in possession of ordinary common sense. That a sane person would destroy \$50 worth of another's property to possess himself of a pair of pistols worth little or nothing is beyond comprehension.

Think how short-sighted and criminally selfish such a man must be. A moment's reflection teaches us that such wantonness is self destruction, that the man who practices it must eventually turn against himself, and adversity, in the nature of things, will follow him through life. It is the short-sightedness of the animal, the dull stupid act of one who would destroy much that he might have little. There is a great deal more of this spirit in the world than one would usually think. It pervades business, politics and society. It is the spirit of the hog. It takes its departure only from those who know the value of equity, who walk in the light of intelligence, who are guided by the spirit of equal rights to all, special privileges to none. This wanton destructive spirit cannot be stamped out by the enforcement of law or the infliction of penalties, but only can be reached by the diffusion of knowledge that will lead to self-government and self-support on the part of every individual.

So far as one human being lives from the fruits of another's labor without returning value for value received, so far are the germs of this criminality and wanton destructiveness sown, and so far are the lives of all men, as well as those of coming generations, made empty and without result. Any system, or regulation, or method, or law of society and government that encourages men to ask for or expect "something for nothing" gives nourishment to this spirit, thereby continuing its establishment to further threaten and endanger the happiness, prosperity and progress of mankind.—East Oregonian.

A DISCREPANCY.

Morehead, of the Junction City Times, is after the genial editor of the Guard, who writes so much about his recent Mexican trip, and what he saw there as follows:

The editor of the Guard, during his visit in Mexico, forwarded to his paper a number of very interesting letters concerning the conditions of the laboring class in that free silver republic. The facts as communicated are emphatic contradictions of the claims made by the harnaphydrate press during the campaign. When the editor returned and was again astride the editorial nail keg, his exchanges scored him right and left but he could not recant very well as his own evidence would convict him. It is a small hole, though, that will prevent our adipose friend from crawling through when he is headed off. Some three weeks after he returned home he published a "delayed letter" from the city of the Grocers, and in a roundabout way, speaks of the prosperous condition of the American citizen and says they receive better wages than can be had elsewhere and the cost of living is not over one-half what it costs in the United States. If this is true the condition is without a parallel in the history of the world. Who ever heard of living being cheap in a mining country? If such is really the case the producer must be the lowly ignorant peon who receives 20 cents (Mexican money) per day for his hire and labors without clothing, the year around. The Guard's letters are interesting but there is a discrepancy in the hilarious prosperity of this free silver country that is quite ludicrous to say the least.

Grant's Achievement as a Peacemaker. The honors and attentions showered upon General Grant during his tour of the world are, perhaps, unequalled in the history of kingly hospitality. He was received everywhere as the greatest soldier of his time and as the foremost living American. Hon. John Russell Young, who accompanied General Grant throughout the famous journey graphically recalls, in the May Ladies' Home Journal, its conspicuous incidents: the receptions, dinners, fetes, balls, etc., given in honor of the illustrious American. It is said Mr. Young brings to light a fact that has received but passing attention: that General Grant was instrumental in arranging the terms of a treaty of peace between China and Japan, which prevented an outbreak of war between those nations.

At the northern end the roadway merge into one big drive, which sweeps

From this corner can be seen the noble Hudson—the Rhine of America—its bar waters deeply framed by the lofty Palisades, which rise majestically on the opposite side of the river. This is the setting which nature has provided for the Grant mausoleum, and it is a fitting one.

GRANT MONUMENTS.

As the nation's hero many other municipalities have honored General Grant by the erection of monuments and statues. Probably the most pretentious of these is the one in Lincoln park, Chicago. It is a bronze, equestrian statue of heroic size and rests upon a large memorial bridge. It was erected by the citizens of Chicago at a cost of \$65,000. The movement to raise this statue was started the day after General Grant's demise, and the monument was unveiled in October, 1891. Mrs. Grant was present, and thousands of Grant's old soldiers were also there. Another equestrian statue of the famous general was unveiled in Brooklyn about a year ago. It is of heroic size and is mounted on a fine pedestal. It is a most artistic piece of work, having been designed by the celebrated sculptor William Ordway Partridge, who designed the statue of Shakespeare in Lincoln park, Chicago. It stands in Bedford square, facing the Brooklyn Union League club house, where the enterprise originated.

A most lifelike statue was erected in Galena, Ill., the former home of the great soldier, about six years ago. It represents Grant as the citizen. It is a full length bronze and shows him in civilian dress, standing in a characteristic attitude. Leavenworth, Kan., also has a bronze monument of General Grant that is a worthy tribute. It is of heroic size and is mounted on a handsome pedestal. It stands near the National Soldiers' home in that city and was unveiled Sept. 14, 1889. One of the first monuments to be



GRANT STATUE IN BROOKLYN. completed, however, was that which was unveiled in St. Louis fully a year previous. It is a bronze statue, and General Grant is at the head of the movement which resulted in its erection. Efforts have also been made to erect a great memorial bridge across the Potomac at Washington in honor of General Grant, and a bill appropriating \$500,000 for the purpose was introduced to congress nearly ten years ago. The appropriation was never made, however, and although the project has been revived several times since, no decisive action has been taken.

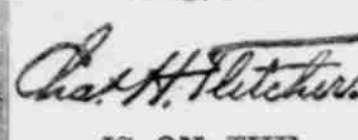
