Hillsboro offers 75 clear of sacks and storage, though dealers are not anxious to buy till there is storage room or till cars can be obtained for shipping.

CONGRESSMAN TONGUE.

The Rosenberg Plasterer has the following report of Congressman Tongue's visit to the people at the holding of the district fair.

"Hon. Thomas H. Tongue, congressman from this district, accompanied by his daughter, came in a line on Thursday evening last and was met at the depot by a number of prominent citizens, headed by the mayor and welcomed to the city.

He was immediately taken in charge however by C. M. Bryant, Byars of the Soldiers' Home and driven to the Soldiers' Home. The old soldier's conversation with agricultural affairs is so conversant with agricultural affairs he could talk to the farmers as no other.

The primary cause of his coming was an invitation from the board of managers of the district fair by letter addressed to the people at the fair grounds. This he did on Friday and delivered a brief address to a crowd standing crowded with people for the purpose.

The address showed that the speaker was thoroughly conversant with agricultural affairs and could talk to the farmers as no other. The McKinley republican denunciation of the proposed visit of the congressman, existing in the city, was a mistake to become the guest of the city after his engagement at the fair grounds.

This was accepted and the club provided for a public reception at the court house on Friday evening and a lunch for the speaker. For the reception the K. of P. band furnished music and at the appointed time the court house was filled with people of all shades of political opinion and not a few ladies.

Mr. E. D. Stratford presided and in fact introduced the speaker. Mr. Tongue did not make a political speech, but touched on the questions considered by congress at the late session, and what would probably be the chief subjects of discussion at the coming session, such as currency reform, coast defenses, the Nicaragua canal, Hawaiian annexation, etc.

The speaker was not an annexationist, but as the destiny of the islands seem to be to annex them to ourselves, we had better improve the opportunity and take them on some. There was a general handshaking at the conclusion and then the members of the club repaired with Mr. Tongue to the banquet hall of the Masonic Temple and partook of a nice little lunch, which was followed by the customary toasts and speaking, breaking up at midnight.

The Douglas County Republican Club had also extended an invitation to the speaker and upon his arrival he became its guest after the speaking at the fair, but as he had already accepted the invitation of the McKinley club he could not accept, so arrangement was made by which he remained over another day and was given, by the Douglas County Republican club, and in the evening there was a spread at the McChallen House very like that of the night before, also followed by speaking and the congressman extended his acquaintance to the members of the club.

Mr. Tongue made a good impression during his visit here and has more friends than when he came. The Douglas County Republican Club had also extended an invitation to the speaker and upon his arrival he became its guest after the speaking at the fair, but as he had already accepted the invitation of the McKinley club he could not accept, so arrangement was made by which he remained over another day and was given, by the Douglas County Republican club, and in the evening there was a spread at the McChallen House very like that of the night before, also followed by speaking and the congressman extended his acquaintance to the members of the club.
