THE LATE ELECTIONS.

The republicans for sound money have carried the state elections in Iowa and Ohio. Those states have a republican majority in their legislatures on joint ballot also in New York and Maryland. The United States senate will therefore gain a vote from Maryland. Kentucky has gone democratic by increased majorities, the attempted fusion between the republicans and gold democrats failing to materialize. New Jersey is republican and so is Pennsylvania. Massachusetts elects a republican governor by 86,000 majority. Nebraska and Kansas both go populist. The great question in 1890 will be sound money opposing free silver coinage, but there is no contest on that question in the republican party.

There seems to have been a full vote cast for mayor of Greater New York and Van Wyck the Tammany candidate is elected but there is nothing to show that the free silver propaganda has made gains. Indeed Van Wyck received a less number of votes than did Bryan one year ago.

Ordinarily it appears strange that there are holy men who prefer to see their corrupt and violent opponents exalted to public places than to unite with a compact organization that stands for good government and win a victory—yet that is what the Low school men did in New York.

The sale of the Union Pacific railroad occurred last Monday, and a sum was realized which it is claimed will pay the government claim, principle and interest. There is one less occasion for populist howls.

The Corvallis Times seems to be quite out of humor because the congressional delegation has not taken care of Yaquina bay. Now a little patience should be exercised. Mr. Tongue, with all of Washington county is interested in that sea port, but down this way we understand that no appropriation was made in 1896 for that harbor, or at the last session of congress. Mr. Tongue only took his seat in the House at the special session at which no general business was done, and hence cannot be held responsible for the present condition if any thing is wrong.
