The Rebeckah fair last Friday was the best thing of the kind and largest seen in Hillsboro for years, the reason in which it was held was too small, but it was the largest vacant store in town, so all had to be contented. The exhibition was hastily gathered to be sure, but it was large and choice. On the left of the hall the visitors entered was displayed fancy needle work, associated with this was the silk regimental colors won by a regiment in the great rebellion and now in the custody of Capt. Crandall. Further along was the exhibit of the Oregon Women's Flax Association, a very interesting display of flax and linen goods. Mrs. Griffin's exhibit presented more than 60 years ago, in New York. Around the platform was the collection of oil paintings which were very attractive especially the exhibit of Mrs. Brown, who is doing so much for art in Hillsboro. Her show case near the door, the literary exercise was of a high order. Mrs. Gov. Lord attended on Friday evening and was pleased to deliver an address on the flax, the attendance was all that was expected and the managers are so well pleased at their success that they will make the fair an annual event.

At present 13 cents is offered for a prime article, but if like conditions produced like prices, much higher figures would be reached. However buyers claim that there is no cause and effect in the hop market. All hops are taken this year at some price, even those contracted for two years ago. Nevertheless it is stated that the market seems better in Portland than it is here and that dealers are listing every bale in the state and if the list is not already completed, it soon will be and samples of every lot will be found in heavy wrapping paper 17 inches square, and on file in the agents' offices in Portland. Growers will have to keep an eye open for slick agents until they sell.

Hon. H. V. Gates returned last Tuesday from a trip of two weeks in Eastern Oregon. A part of this outing was for business but the greater part was a junket between and over the peaks of Eagle mountains north of Baker City. While at Eagle Valley, Union county, Jos. The apples are beautiful, rich in flavor and altogether desirable. Mr. Wright has about 30 bushels this year, the total product of all the bearing trees in existence.
