STUDY TO PLEASE THE MARKET.
The Agricultural Experimental Station has just issued a bulletin on Marketing fruit which is timely since preparation for that should commence now, for if the horticulturist has no good fruit to sell how can he market any. Speaking of the customers tastes and peculiarities the bulletin remarks:

The importance of striving to please customers is not always fully realized by those marketing fruit. The consumer's wants may not coincide with your views of what they should be, and when he is satisfied you not only make a sale but gain a permanent customer. Keep in close touch with the markets, visiting them often to find out what people really want and pay the most for.

The producer, retailer and consumer should, as each other, remembering that in union there is strength, and each needs the others' assistance.

The sale of fruit depends on its appearance, quality, the kind of packaging used, proper grading and packing, and its condition when reaching the market. Overproduction and low prices tend to cause carelessness in picking and packing small fruits which are frequently placed on the market in an uninviting condition, keeping prices down. When graded it is more in demand, and brings higher prices.

More care is needed in selling fruit. The market is seldom so overstocked that choice fruit retailed in perfect condition will not bring a fair price. Beauty of form and color, large, uniform size and good keeping qualities are the things that counting prices. Flavor will not, and many ill-devised may be employed to increase its attractiveness. For example, did you ever try selling choice pears, peaches, prunes or cherries in neatly labeled one and five pound paper boxes?
