The weather here in general is not bad, the most disagreeable feature is the wind which blows nearly all the time, at present it is blowing from the south which is not so bad as when from the north. One comes off the mountain and the other from the sea.

The District school closed last Friday after a very successful year under the superintendency of Prof. Case. The commencement exercises were held in the M. E. church last Friday evening. The large audience was packed to its uttermost capacity. Scores went away not being able to get standing room. The exercises and orations were of a high order and the recitations better than we expected.

Rev. E. P. Hughes of the Hillsboro Congregational church has been assisting Rev. D. Staver in a series of religious meetings at Greenfield. His meetings at first were small but grew steadily till last Sunday evening when there was a perfect jam. Much interest in spiritual things was aroused and a number of people expressed the desire to be baptized. It was a very successful meeting. Pastor Hughes has been recognized as a popular evangelist but in the work of the last two weeks he has developed a strength of which his congregation before was ignorant.

Some weeks ago a conversation between the best sugar manufacturers of Utah, Chemist Shaw and our E. E. Bryan, the influence of our damp climate on the sugar beet industry was discussed. Chemist Shaw thought that our fair rains and damp climate would cause an otherwise good beet to deteriorate by starting a second growth. Mr. Bryan thought the claim was greatly exaggerated. He proposed to test the matter. It was arranged that he would furnish a sample of beets that had been exposed to rain so that it might be seen how it would be affected. He took a box grown by Mr. F. M. Hiel and has been subjected to the worst conditions possible. It had started to grow and had taken all the rain of a wet season, but it had been exceptionally mild, not enough frost to hinder the growth of grass in the meadows. The sample was pulled in February. The analysis shows 10.1 per cent sugar and seventy-two per cent purity. Of course the best was spared for the factory, but it has been in the ground four months longer than it should have been. Had it been gathered and in a shed, very little harm would have resulted. Our damp weather is not a bar to the best sugar industry.

A broken wagon and badly jammed up horse was the result of a runaway this week.

The S. P. Co. is distributed at this season not including what would they purchased from different parties.

C. C. Brennan's Buchanan has given up the idea of going to Alaska for this year at least.

Lewis Wederweith our blacksmith is confined to his home with La Grippe.

The grading is finished for the siding for the new mill and the Railroad Co. have the ties on the ground ready to lay.

L. Bailey sold a car load of potatoes for the St. Louis market one day last week. The merchants complain that too many of the farmers do not use enough care in sorting and sacking their potatoes to meet the demands of the markets now open for them. It is estimated that there is from 15,000 to 20 car loads yet in this vicinity.

The democratic-populist-free silver conference committee made up of five representatives from each party in Hillsboro on Wednesday to formulate a plan of Union and apportion the county offices to the parties. The conference decided that each party should hold its separate nominating convention. No attempt of offices was made, though a plan has been formulated which will be reported to the county convention. These have not been called. Chairman Kelly of the populist party has called his central committee for Saturday April 10, at 11 o'clock a. m. At that time the date of holding the county convention will be decided. It was stated on Wednesday that a silver republican stated that considerable difficulty was met in getting men to accept places on the Union ticket.

A movement for the foundation of a military company at Hillsboro and one at Forest Grove was inaugurated last week. A sufficient number of names was secured here and a very enthusiastic meeting was held at the opera house, Wednesday evening, where the boys were practicing "about face" with great energy. There is no doubt that the companies will be made up and if, as is partially promised, a place is given them with the 1st regiment, O. N. G. will help to increase our available "boys in blue" should they be needed. The soldiers have secured the Bailey building, old post-office, where they will meet again on Saturday evening at 8:00 o'clock.

A letter of date March 25th written by a correspondent living at the head of the San Joaquin valley California has these dry year "drys year" and I guess it will be if we do not have a season rain in a few days. Today did not look one bit like rain. One can set fire to some grain fields now. The river is low so that in places irrigation is impossible. Charles is trying to irrigate his grain so as to make a little hay. He cannot plow his ground at all till it is irrigated. Animals will certainly suffer this year. Sheep will die by thousands. It really seems to be there are conditions worse than a rainy season.

THE GRAND JURY REPORT.

The Grand Jury finished its work and was discharged on Monday morning last. The total expense for the term was \$213 which is less than has been run for many years. Another remarkable thing was the absence of whiskey cases, not being presented. The jury makes this report.

In the Circuit Court of the State of Oregon for Washington County.

To Hon. T. A. McBride, Judge of the above named court.

We are assigned, your grand jury for the March term of the above entitled court beg leave to submit the following report:

We have been in session for a period of seven days; examined 25 witnesses and investigated all the crimes charged in the indictment in Washington county which have been brought to our knowledge and have returned into the court eight verdicts.

We have inspected the county poor farm and find the same well kept and the inmates well cared for, and whom express themselves as being thoroughly satisfied.

We next made a thorough examination of the new County Jail and inquired into the cost of building the same, and your grand jury, considering the structure well designed, and the various officers for the county invested with well and properly expended. We find the same well kept.

We did not deem it necessary to call to our assistance experts to examine the books of the county, as the same were examined by you the last term of this court, but we have carefully examined the records ourselves and find them well kept and the funds of the county all properly accounted for. Now, having completed our labors, we desire to thank the various officers for their kind and courteous treatment and the district attorney, his deputy and our bailiff for the assistance rendered throughout our entire session, and respectfully ask to be discharged.
