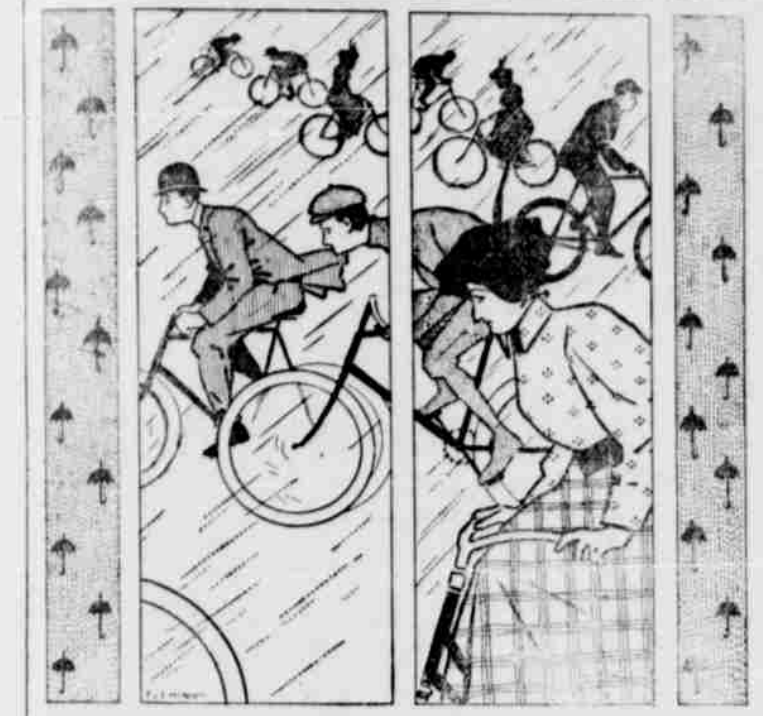

Hon. A. A. Durham died at his residence in East Butte, April 5th, aged 75 years. The deceased was one of the first settlers of the county. His first residence was at Oswego in 1850 where he engaged in the manufacture of lumber which was marketed in California. Ships sailed up the Willamette as far as that place for land. Three sons were left to the state survive him. Hon's, Geo. H., R. L. and S. A.

HON. SAMUEL H. HUGHES.

After an illness more or less severe lasting most of the winter, 1897, Samuel H. Hughes died at his home in Forest Grove Tuesday, April 6, 1898. Mr. Hughes was in Hillsboro Monday or Tuesday of the last week of the present term of court at which time he stated that he was feeling better than he had been for several weeks, but any exertion was Ashland hoping the change would be beneficial, but his ailment was one that climate could not influence. He returned home on the evening train of Monday. He slept fairly well Monday night, but was stricken with apoplexy Tuesday morning and lay in a comatose state till he died. The funeral was from the family residence yesterday, Thursday, and conducted by the Masonic order.

Samuel H. Hughes, who was a pioneer merchant of Forest Grove, was a native of England, born July 6, 1815. His father, John W. Hughes, was born in 1809. His great-grandfather Hughes was born in Ireland, and emigrated to America previous to the Revolutionary war, and was an active Continental soldier during the struggle for independence. Three generations of the family from this ancestor bore the name of Satawhite, down to the father of the deceased, John W. Hughes. The latter was married in 1843 to Susan Williams, of Tennessee. This union was blessed with seven children, of whom four are living, the deceased being the second child. He was reared in his native state, and then moved to Texas, where he followed the trade of blacksmith, as well as that of an engineer on many of the boats on the Mississippi river. He resided at Galveston, Texas for a short time, working in a foundry, and was also engaged in putting up sugar mills and running them in that state from 1852 to 1856. He then followed the example of many others, and went to California the trip being made by the Isthmus of Panama.

After reaching the West, he mined in several different counties of California, but tiring of this, he returned to the States, and worked in a foundry for some time, and was later engaged in the coast survey under Colonel Fairchild. After finishing this work he came to Portland, reaching here November 14, 1857. He always remembered that day, as it was the one on which the state constitution was adopted. Until the following March he worked at his trade, and then went to Forest Grove, opening a blacksmith shop in the same month, which he continued successfully until 1864, when he went to Idaho, and worked two years in the mines.

When he retired from the mines he purchased 116 acres of land adjoining Forest Grove, where he built a home, and has since resided. His farm at the time of his death contained 286 acres. In 1872 he opened a hardware store in Forest Grove, where he prospered so much in his business that four years later he built a store 27x100 feet, which he had since occupied. In this he made much space for a large stock of groceries, and other supplies, showing his interest for reaching the country trade, a large portion of which he enjoyed. His was the first store of its kind in Forest Grove, and he was the oldest merchant continuously in business at that place. His continued residence in Hillsboro Oregon as a citizen and liberal. He was always enterprising in the way of improvements in the city being one of the organizers of the Electric Light & Canning company.

In 1859, after being in Forest Grove one year, he married Miss Georgia A. Reed, of Missouri, daughter of James H. Reed, who came to Oregon in 1852. The couple raised five sons and three daughters, six of whom with their mother, survive Mr. Hughes—Eugene, Eugene, Eugene, George, Samuel, G. J. Wilbur, and George M. Hughes and Mrs. Eugene E. Larimore, of Portland.

Mr. Hughes was a hold over Senator from this county in the state legislature, having been elected in 1866. He had held the office of Justice of the peace in Forest Grove for 25 years. Mr. Hughes was a leader in the republican party and often a candidate, and though his opponents elected to consider him a weak candidate, they were never able to defeat him.
