Rev. L. Myron Booser, the newly appointed pastor of the Evangelical church will arrive this week and take up his work at once. He will preach his introductory sermon next Sunday evening. Mr. Booser comes from St. Johns where he served very acceptably during the past year.

Dr. Abram Standlee and Claude E. Standlee, both of Cornelius, this county, passed successful examinations at Portland this week and were licensed to practice their profession. Dr. Abram Standlee is a graduate of Medical Institute in 1897 and Claude graduated from St. Louis Medical college in 1892.

The music lovers in Hillsboro can have a grand treat this evening by driving up to Forest Grove and attending the rehearsal at Marsh Hall. Miss Gladys Jones assisted by Miss Cooley and Evans with a chorus of 16 trained voices will render a program of well selected classical music. The reputation of the singers insures an entertainment with pleasing features.

The Pharmacy is the first house in town to display the flag of free Cuba in its window. The flag is made of five stripes or bars—three of blue and two of white. The top and bottom stripes are blue, next either way is white and the fifth in the center is blue. On the end next to the staff is a triangle of red reaching over the whole breadth of the flag. In the center of this red flag is a lone white star. The flag is quite beautiful and will no doubt become familiar in the next few months.

Mr. F. S. Peet, representing the Oregon Commission of the Omaha fair was in town yesterday. The exposition will be held in Omaha, Nebraska commencing June 1st next and will be open to visitors for five months, till Nov. 1st. Oregon will make a state display embracing minerals, agricultural products and fruits. The state exhibit will far surpass our exhibit at Chicago in 1893. The fair will be supported by a loan from the people of the state. Mr. H. E. Dorsch, State sup't. of the world's fair is also superintendent of this state exhibit. He brought \$18,000 of the \$60,000 appropriated for the world's fair home with him. It is proposed to ask the legislature to allow this \$18,000 to be used at Omaha. But ready money is needed and the certificates which Mr. Peet is issuing as evidence of popular contributions will be redeemed a few months later. Oregon is inviting immigration. Our competitors are California, Washington and Idaho. Some twenty and thirty years ago thrifty Germans and Scandinavians settled in Illinois, Iowa, Michigan and Wisconsin. They have reared large families and find their old homes too small. The boys Americanized in our public schools are coming west. It is a question whether by our silence we shall let this desirable population go to Idaho, Washington or California or by showing the products of Oregon we secure them for our state. Let not Washington county be backward in this matter. Mr. Peet will be in the county to-day and to-morrow, to-day at Forest Grove.

Wheat is again in active demand and the price offered is within 3 cts. of the golden figure reached last fall. Yesterday the quoted price in Portland was 90 cents. But as wheat becomes buoyant charters stiffen so that what ought to be gained by an increased foreign price is lost by higher freight rates. The drought in California is the reason for an increased demand for Oregon wheat to supply the local demand. Much wheat is going forward on the Southern Pacific cars.

Drayman Whitcomb finds that his business is picking up. Last year he had an easy time, too easy, but this spring he is rushed with orders. Indeed he has had to get extra help the past week. What is most pleasing about the matter is the permanence that seems to belong to the improvement.

S. H. Dunbar who is handling the duck percheron station "Oregon" was in town yesterday. The horse is in excellent condition this year, and he is showing very fine color, satisfactory in every way.

Good Populists believe, can clean up a million or so in Wall Street any day of the week by precipitating panics and business failures or by buying or selling Government bonds. Several hundred millions have been made in the last few days by the manipulation of President McKinley's message—at least, so we are assured by Populist Congressmen and yellow newspapers. It is impossible to imagine that Populist farmers could engage in such an unwholesome way of acquiring wealth. That they could not have made it at farming we have been assured over and over by the ablest economic authorities the prairies could turn out. These have demonstrated to our complete satisfaction that the Kansas farmer is so ground under the heel of the plutocratic railroad that it is impossible for him to make more than a bare living, and throw his farm to the money-lender in the bargain.

Another thing that convinces us that Mr. Bridenbath is mistaken is that the grip of the gold-standard has not been loosened from the neck of Kansas, and with the gold-standard agricultural prosperity is unthinkable. With a State currency and with private banks and Government warehouses for the storage of the farmers' great collateral—potatoes, onions and the like—a moderate degree of comfort might be possible, but not \$250,000 and still less \$300,000.

It may be that Kansas became demoralized when it sent a breeder of short-horned cattle and an ex-Confederate to the Senate, but we will not believe it as long as Gov. Leedy is there to keep guard over corporations and preserve the Palladium of Liberty from the Supreme Court.—Courier Journal.

The heavy frost Monday night injured the fruit and early plants. It also destroyed some asparagus.

Two loads of Beaverton people attended the literary exercises at Reedville last Friday night.

WEEKLY CROP BULLETIN. Portland, Or., April 18, 1898.

WEATHER.—The weather during the past seven days has been fair and warm. A sprinkle of rain fell over the northern portion on Thursday. The temperature averaged 51° for the week, which is 4° higher than for the preceding week and 10° lower than the corresponding week of 1897.

The highest temperature during the week was 54° on Tuesday; the lowest 32° on Monday. The temperature of 32° was reported from Roseburg. Excepting Sunday morning and this morning, the lowest temperatures have been from 41° to 48°.

There was an absence of frosts during the week except on Sunday morning, and the prospects when frosts were quite general. There have been clouds in the mornings and bright, warm sunshine in the afternoons. Northerly winds have prevailed.

Crops.—The weather was very favorable to the growing and ripening of vegetation, and to farm work. The frosts of the past two mornings have done no injury. Cold rains are more liable to prove injurious than frosts. The correspondents are uniform in their expressions of the favorable and beneficial weather conditions.

Fall and winter sown grain are making good growth. Early spring grain has made marked growth during the past week. Plowing for summer fallow continues. Spring seedling is practically finished.

The correspondents all report a greatly increased grain acreage as compared with last year. The acreage of hay crops also has been increased. As the water in the rivers is not expected to be high in June, the hay lands along the Columbia River bottom are being seeded for hay. The farmers are about four weeks ahead in their work as compared with last year. Corn planting continues, and garden making will be about completed this week.

Fruit prospects continue most excellent. Fruit bloom has commenced to fall in the southern counties. Apple and quince trees are coming into bloom. The pear, cherry, plum and plum trees are literally a mass of blossom, and unless very materially thinned by frost, hand pruning must be resorted to. There is now no doubt that the March frosts did injure the peach, almond, and apricot buds; to what extent the injury extends, is yet to be seen. Expert fruitgrowers claim, however, that unless more injury results, the peach, almond, and apricot crops will be good.

Hop yards continue to be worked. The hops are making good growth. Lambing continues, and it is reported to be with little loss.

Sheep shearing is in general progress and excellent clips are reported.

The week closes with most excellent prospects for crops of all kinds. Grain would be very beneficial in the southern counties.
