LOCAL AND GENERAL.

Mrs. Lane is prepared to do all kinds of sewing plain or fancy, at her home.

The Street committee of the city council have laid a number of new cross walks at intersections that have needed them for many months.

The Hillsboro odd fellows sent 12 of their initiators to Gaston last Saturday night to visit the lodge at that place. The Gaston brethren treated them as favored guests.

Rev. Julian Haen will occupy the pulpit at Tualatin Point Presbyterian church next Sunday. Rev. S. A. George is at Roseburg, a delegate to the state convention of Christian Endeavor societies.

The United Evangelical church of the state will hold a Bible conference and camp-meeting at Independence, Polk county, commencing June 22, and remaining in session from day to day till Friday July 1st.

The supervisor of the Reedville district has graded up the road in good shape for the distance reaching across the Ladd & Reed farm. The only error in the matter is that the work was not done early in March.

Hon. H. V. Gates spoke on Saturday evening at Greenview. There was a fair audience and much enthusiasm aroused. Congressman Tongue has many friends in and about Greenview and his vote will be a large one.

Gen. Ransom Post, G. A. R., has in hand the arranging of a program for the proper observance of Memorial day, May 30th. The services at the church will be held on Sunday May 29th while the cemetery ceremonies will be on Monday, the 30th.

Mrs. Jos. Mann sent a nosegay of sweet peas to the INDEPENDENT on Tuesday morning May 10. It is claimed that these are the first blooms of the season. There is quite a rivalry between several ladies in town as to who shall have the first sweet pea blooms. This year Mrs. Mann is the first to report.

Next Sunday, Rev. Daniel Staver of Forest Grove, will exchange with Mr. Hughes and occupy the pulpit of the Congregational church at the morning service. A special evening service has been prepared by the ladies missionary society and Mr. Staver, who at one time was a missionary of the American board in Turkey, will deliver a short address. The other services will be in the usual order.

The testimony showed that Wardle had been working for his board at Mrs. Jones' the saucers were missed and found at the store of Mr. E. Mays. Mr. Mays got them from the defendant. The latter says he bought them from Mrs. Jones' son. The lad says no. The justice held Wardle in a one hundred dollar bond which was given.

One J. A. Dolan some months ago sold his claim for mileage and per diem as a witness in the circuit court to one of our townsmen, who at the time was investing a little little money. When the warrant was ready for delivery it was discovered that Dolan had been thrifty and sold his claim twice. The matter was laid before Dept. Dist. Attorney H. T. Bagley who began a hunt for the irregular man. He traced him to Washington, requisition papers were at once obtained and a trap set to catch the thief, but do what he could Mr. Bagley could not get the claim. Mrs. Dolan was caught at Seattle. On Sunday Constable Redmond went after the game which he landed in jail Wednesday. While Dolan has been running, an indictment was found by the grand jury, hence if he is a witness in the November term of the circuit court.

Dr. E. Poppitzer of Portland was in town Wednesday last. The Dr. is fond of talking politics some times and he was in the mood when here. He thinks the whole republican ticket will be elected in Multnomah county and in the state. He is particularly earnest in his support of Dunbar for secretary of state. He asserts that Mr. Dunbar's equal as an office man has not been yet found in the state. Mr. Dunbar is very popular at home and it is said that he will carry his county by 1000 majority. The whole ticket will receive the McKinley majority of 600.

The S. P. Co's bridge builders are at work this week on the Rock Creek bridge east of Newton Station. Last summer when it was partially burned the repairs were carried no further than necessary for the passage of the cars. Now the work is substantially done and equal to any of the standard bridges of the company, which are the best that timber and mechanics can make.

Mr. Dorrence of Mountaineer has started his sawmill for the summer run. We hear up to this date shipped the greater part of his output to Newberg in Yamhill county. He loads at Cornelius. The car is taken to Whetson where it is switched to the Oregonian railway and carried back to Newberg. Mr. Dorrence is investigating a new market at Portland. Prices are enough better there to pay the freight.

Mr. Barlow has shipped one year load of potatoes to St. Louis, Mo. and will send away another in a few days. Mr. Cady of Beaverton will also send a car load. The quotations there are such as to justify shippers to enter that market when the price here is no more than 25 to 30 cents per sack. The freight rate to St. Louis is 75 cents per hundred pounds.

Mr. F. L. Dunbar, republican candidate for secretary of state was in town for a few hours on Wednesday last. He is a very affable gentleman, and after meeting him, it is readily seen why he is so popular. Dunbar is a very different man from Kincaid, and will never refuse to obey the mandates of the courts.

Traffic on the railroad so far in May has been brisk and the S. P. Co. have had to work all kinds of schemes to supply cars. Last week they have been ordered. Indeed in some instances shippers have been compelled to wait. The active movement of what is what creates the extra demand.

The odd fellows are agitating the question of building a hall on their lot at the corner of Maine and Third street. A resolution instructing the trustees to build will come up for action at the regular meeting of May 25th.

London's circus is in town to-day. The tent is stretched near the railroad station. The show is a month or more old and those who want to laugh will find opportunities for so doing if they visit the exhibition.

The republican county central committee will hold a meeting in Hillsboro to-morrow. This meeting is for the purpose of determining the plan of campaign on the part of the republican candidates.

Washington Encampment 1, O. O. F., will work in the royal purple degree this evening at odd fellows hall, Hillsboro. A delegation from Edison Encampment, Portland, is expected to be present.

E. N. Ordway has been rearrested at the instance of Mrs. Gishwiller. The charge this time is assault with a dangerous weapon. The examination takes place today in Justice Smith's court.

A party of Hillsboro fishermen E. D. Thorn, W. E. Thorn, accompanied by Horace Butterfield of Butterfield's Portland, went fishing for trout yesterday. They expect to bring home fish.

Three bay horses have been impounded by the city marshal, two geldings and a mare. These will be sold on Friday next, May 29, unless the owner soon claims them.

Wallace McCamant of Portland spoke to the Hillsboro republican club last evening. His address was a fine and clear presentation of the issues of the campaign.

A visitor dropped a pair of steel framed spectacles yesterday in the editorial room of the INDEPENDENT. They are here for him.

Mrs. J. N. Brown is serious ill at her residence at the corner of Fifth and Washington streets.

Sheriff Bradford has collected taxes assessed on the 1897 roll to the amount of \$41399.48.

W. W. McKimney deputy clerk went to Portland yesterday for a days vacation.

The young people of the Congregational church will give a concert in the opera house, Hillsboro, on Friday evening, June 5. The program will appear later.

The republicans will have a big rally at Beaverton on Friday, May 27. The speakers cannot be named yet but the features will be an old fashioned barbecue, a procession and general merry making. The whole day will be devoted to the hustings.

Walter Melley who was in town last week advertising himself as working in the interest of the widows and orphans of the Maine disaster, is a bill. Congress has taken care of those weeping mourners and no one asked this fellow to go shinning over the country. He is a dead beat.

On the Tillamook Stage that runs to North Yamhill, Moses Dorstler and another gentleman were passengers last Saturday. Passing along the grade up Frank river the stage slipped over the bank and rolled down a distance of fifty or more feet. The horses were drowned. Dorstler was not able to get out of the wagon till the water was reached. He was considerably bruised, though not so seriously as to prevent him continuing his journey. His fellow passenger was more lucky about getting out of the stage but he was badly a distance of thirty feet and badly shaken up.

Young Gressinger, a lad of 9 years, through force of circumstances has been on the street for some months where he has proven himself to be an apt scholar. His mother has had her living to earn and could not give that care to her children when they deserve it that she desires. The young lad would not allow his mother to correct him, but fought like a lion. He went from bad to worse till last Sunday he broke into the public school house where a brick iron crayon he found, and tearing up books he gathered the paper and lighted a bon fire in the room. Paper does not make a very hot fire so that the damage is trifling. The fire was discovered by Officer Green who caught the boy in the very act. Superintendent of the Boys' & Girls Aid Society has been informed of the condition of things. He came out and took the boy back with him yesterday morning.

Hon. H. V. Gates was at Dilley last Friday night and made a speech that will set some of the tripod people thinking. Free silver tripod has asserted that unlimited silver coinage would enable the mines producing low grade ore to be worked thus providing employment for more laborers. Mr. Gates denies this, and challenges his opponents to show a mine producing gold and silver, and profitably operated when silver was worth one dollar per ounce that is not operated now unless the vein has pinched out. More than that, he denies them to show a mine producing silver alone and profitably operated when silver was worth \$1.00 per ounce that is not now operated. It thus appears that the field for the employment of labor in silver mines or for the increased use of materials cannot be extended beyond the present limit. Mr. Gates has recently been through the mines and has gathered some facts not heretofore known. He expected the big gun of the Dilley "reform" forces to challenge his statements, but such was not to be.

Mr. Kirkwood of Farmington was in town this week signing vouchers for his back pension, mention of which was made last week. His back pay amounted to \$57.60. Talking with him brought to mind some pension facts communicated in a recent letter from a friend now in Washington. The correspondent says: "I was over at the pension department today and learned that 402 pensions were allowed yesterday, and the rest of the week it has been running from 300 to 400 allowances each day. During this administration, since Evans took the office they have passed on an average of about 400 claims each day about one fourth rejected and three fourths allowed, at the time he came into office there were pending a half million claims. There have been a quarter million filed since making in all about 750,000. You will see by this that if they pass 400 every day it will take about five years to dispose of the applications now on hand." These figures ought to go far toward allaying the apparent ill feeling that seems to exist against the commissioner of pensions.
