Platform Adopted by Republican Convention.

THE CONGRESSIONAL PLATFORM

Platforms for Sound Money and Endorse President McKinley's Cuban Policy.

The Republican State Convention, in session at Astoria, April 14th, adopted the following platform:

"We, the republican voters of the state of Oregon, in convention assembled, congratulate the people of the state as well as of the whole nation on the unmistakable fact that the dark cloud of adversity, which has hung like a pall over our fair land, has been dissipated. We recognize that the return of prosperity is due to the restoration of the republican party to power.

"We are in favor of the maintenance of the present gold standard; we are unqualifiedly opposed to the free coinage of silver and to all other schemes looking to the debasement of the currency and the repudiation of debt. We believe that the best money in the world is none too good to be assured by the government to the laborer as the fruit of his toil and to the farmer as the price of his crop. We condemn the continued agitation for free silver as calculated to jeopardize the prosperity of the country and to shake the confidence of the people in the maintenance of a wise financial policy; we particularly condemn as unpatriotic, the effort of the free-silver agitator to array class against class and section against section; we declare that the interests of all classes and of all sections of our country alike demand a sound and stable financial system.

"While we deplore the imminence of war, we recognize that the country is on the eve of a war, undertaken for the vindication of the national honor and the performance of a work dictated by every instinct of humanity; we declare that the administration is entitled in this conflict to the confidence and support of the entire people.

"We are firmly attached to the principles of the federal constitution; we recognize that representative government is one of these principles, and we are opposed to any change in law or constitution which will abrogate this time-honored principle.

"We are in favor of retrenchment and reform in state and county matters.

"We demand strict economy in public affairs, and the abolition of all needless offices and commissions. "The salmon fishing industry, so fruitful a source of revenue to the state, should be fostered, and to that end we favor state aid in the artificial propagation of salmon, and their distribution in the waters of this state.

"We reaffirm our allegiance to the principles of the republican party of the United States, as enunciated by the republican convention in St. Louis in 1896.

We denounce the fusion party in Oregon as an aggregation of spoliemen, who are ready to subordinate principles to office. Each of the parties to this compact is willing to stultify itself and form alliances with elements which it heretofore denounced as dangerous and unfit to be intrusted with power; we declare that good government cannot come from such an alliance.

Congressional Platform.

The following is the congressional platform adopted at Eugene, April 21, 1898:

"We, the republicans of the first congressional district of Oregon, by delegates from each county, in convention assembled, do proclaim the following facts and principles:

"First—We affirm allegiance to the national republican platform, adopted at St. Louis, in June, 1896.

"Second—We declare our confidence in the present administration at Washington, and especially in the wisdom of President McKinley in dealing with the Cuban and other international questions.

"Third—We declare our approval of the course of the Oregon delegation in congress in securing appropriations for carrying on internal improvements; and especially do we commend the labors of Hon. Thomas H. Tongue and his colleagues in securing the continuance of the work of improving Yaquina harbor, the construction of the locks in the Yamhill river, the improvement of our Upper Willamette, and looking to the further improvements of Coos bay, Coquille, Tillamook, Siuslaw and other Oregon harbors; the purchase by the government of the locks at Oregon City, securing liberal pensions for the soldiers of the late war; furthering the measure to reimburse the Indian war veterans for their losses in laying the foundations of the commonwealth, and granting them pensions, and, generally, their faithful labors in promoting the best interest of the people of this district and of the state and nation at large.

THE FINANCIAL POLICY

The Coinage laws fully stated with their history.

12th. Is it not true that the far more debts in this western country are all evidenced by notes payable in gold coin and the payment of that indebtedness in any other money than gold would require as many more dollars as would equal the difference in value between the two kinds of money.

13th. Is it not a fact, that the national banks have over \$200,000,000 out in paper, now redeemable in gold, and on a change to a silver basis they would be redeemed in silver dollars, the bullion of which is now worth 43 cents, and would not the banks be the gainers and the people the losers.

14th. Is it not true that there is out in circulation in the hands of people, besides national bank notes, over \$1,200,000,000 in silver; silver certificates, treasury notes, and greenbacks, that would lose one-half of their value under free coinage?

15th. Is it not a fact that there are today, according to bank reports, in commercial and savings banks, over four and a half billions dollars on deposit which the depositors would be paid back in 43 cent (or less) dollars and would not the banks be the gainers and the depositors the losers?

16th. Is it not true that besides the losses to the people, detailed in props. 12, 13, 14, and 15, that the railroad companies, and insurance companies, and trusts, and all other great corporations would be enabled to pay their bonds, policies, and etc. in 43 cent dollars? and,

17th. That the free silver agitators and advocates instead of fighting these great corporations in behalf of the people as they claim are on the contrary the coadjutors and workers for these great corporations.

18th. Is it not a fact that with a change to a silver basis, the (nearly) \$700,000,000 in gold would be immediately withdrawn from circulation, and the consequent depreciation of the \$1,200 million of silver and paper thus contracting the currency to the extent of \$1,300,000,000 and with a simultaneous increase of commodities would it not be in an elegant plight?

19th. Is it not a fact that every pensioner or the holder of an annuity would find that his payment would have less than half its present purchasing power? and,

20th. That every holder of an insurance policy would receive less than half in case of loss for which he had paid his premiums.

21st. If that is true will it not be the same with all other creditors where their loans are not made on contract notes payable in gold coin?

22nd. As straw shows the direction of the current is it not a fact that it is as likely that there is a "money trust" of silver mine owners, banks, trust companies, insurance companies, railroad corporations, silver bullion speculators and others, in combination to "beat" their creditors, as it is likely that there is a "money trust" in Wall street, to juggle with gold?

23rd. Is it not a fact that if the foregoing is correct, and they are all inferentially conceded, would not the logical conclusion be, that there is nothing to be gained with free coinage of silver by the United States alone but on the contrary it would so change the character of every investment, unsetting values, again paralyze the business of the country, that another panic follow upon the heels of the one from which we are just recovering. In summing up I will call your attention to the five propositions of ex. secretary of the treasury, Carlisle at Bowling Green Ky. in 1895, which have never been answered in the negative:

1st. There is not a free silver coinage country in the world today that is not on a silver basis.

2nd. There is not a gold standard country in the world today that does not use silver along with gold.

3rd. There is not a silver standard country in the world today that uses any gold along with silver.

4th. There is not a silver standard country in the world today that has more than one-third the circulation per capita that the United States has.

5th. There is not a silver standard country in the world today where the laboring man receives fair pay for his days work.

And now having presented to you some of the reasons why I think your interest and mine, demands the maintenance of the republican financial policy and the rejection of the policy of the Chicago democratic platform, I remain,

more than doubled, and the increase amounted to \$12,097,830. Food dominated under the head of luxury increased \$1,785,296.

As an indication of increased activity in manufactured articles the importation of articles in a crude condition for domestic industry outside of wool increased \$29,153,909.

These figures furnished conclusive evidence that the farmers of the United States during the first eight months of this fiscal year have had a much more extensive market for all of their products, and at the same time have been brought into much less competition with foreign producers of like articles. This shows immediately why all classes of agricultural products have increased in price as well as wheat.

The American, published in Philadelphia, a populist paper that opposed the passage of the Dingley bill, admits that there has been a marked increase in all classes of agricultural products, while but a very slight increase in textiles, and in iron and steel. Or, in other words, the goods purchased by the farmers have increased in price very slightly, with a marked increase in whatever they have to sell. These are the conditions needed for agricultural prosperity.

It is wise to continue them by continuing the conditions of legislation that have brought them about, or shall we change and go back to the conditions that were brought about by the last change indulged in by the American people?
