W. J. ROBINSON.

Pioneer W. J. Robinson died at his home near Progress last Monday night, May 25th, after a long illness aged 70 years 7 months 11 days. The funeral occurred last Wednesday. The remains were buried in Crescent Cemetery.

William Johnson Robinson was born, Oct. 12, 1827, on Shenango river 2 miles from New Castle in Mercer county, Penna. There he lived till May 1841 when he went to Jefferson Ind. where he lived most of the time till 1851. January 9th 1845 he wedded Miss Elzeline Barnum. This union has been blessed with six children, Bertha, died at the age of 16 years. Agnes, Oia, Florence, Kate and Leona; the last was born to death aged 2 years. Wm. J. was the 2d in a family of 5 children.

When he was eleven years old his father was drowned during the construction of the Pennsylvania and Erie Canal, of which he was a contractor. Being cheated out of his earnings the widow with her young family was left in destitute circumstances. Boy W. J. at this critical time showed the spirit that was so noble in later years—cheerfulness and self reliance. He worked on the canal and every where that insured the earning of a living. Along these lines he toiled, even after his marriage till 1851 when he determined to seek fortune in the New West.

May 1st of that year he and his wife with their first two born occupied a wagon in a train of 23 which reached Ebers in Wasco county Sept. 10th 1851. These pioneers at once plunged into the mountains where they were caught in a fire snow storm and died in its icy grip for over a month. Their stock was not able to pull through this first snow of the season or ford the streams swollen by its melting. Provisions ran short and for days the camp of the weary and worn out immigrants was a soup kitchen, the meat for the soup being the little red squirrels which their trusty rifle brought to the ground. This soup was thickened by a dust of flour that yet remained. Mr. Robinson had started with five fine brood mares but three of these perished in the mountain. A messenger got through and told of the dire extremity of the little company. Oct. 17th Thos. Denny and Felix Hicklin, old neighbors already established in Oregon, met them with six yoke of fresh and strong cattle. With this assistance the Willamette Valley was soon reached.

During this long and toilsome journey across the half of a continent young Robinson never lost heart. Always brave and cheerful, he furnished strength for the timid. He never shirked. He stood guard, took his place in the ranks when a foe was to fight or hunted stampeded teams with equal cheerfulness. If fellow traveler was out of provisions he divided even to self deprivation he did last. In Oregon he looked about for home. He found a tract of 320 acres near the present post office of Progress. A squatter named Lish Wilkinson was on the claim. His right Robinson purchased. This has been his home ever since. The first seven years were hard ones for him. He had to do with everything to do and nothing to do with. The first winter he worked on the night shift in a sawmill at Millaukie while his young wife and babies were in the log cabin home amid a dense forest seven miles away. But industry has its reward for in less than a decade fortune smiled on this her favorite son and competence was his possession. Now the Robinsons denote land claim is one of the most valuable farms in the county.

In character Robinson was one of the strong men of the county, a leader. Public spirited, generous and modest his influence was positive. Good roads, commodious school houses, comfortable churches were his delight. One public institution that was dear to him was Crescent Grove Cemetery. So well has he cared for that city of the dead that it is the fairest monument that can be erected over his ashes. As early as 1853 he, with Thos. Tucker, now of Hillsboro, and James McKay, deceased, took hold of it and so skillfully managed its affairs that now it is one of the best cemeteries in the county and not excelled by any in the state. Mr. Robinson was treasurer for twenty years. The work is to be continued by his son Raleigh.

Mr. Robinson always took a great interest in young people who desired an education and to many instances he has furnished money with which they attended school at the academies. It has been his proud boast that he never lost a dollar by helping such ambitious youths. Many people to-day who are teachers and in other good positions owe their places to the start given by him.

The orphan and widow found him a warm friend and a liberal giver. His hands being bestowed so quickly that the public had no knowledge of it in many instances.

He was a member for many years before his death of Hassalo Lodge I. O. O. F. and while, because of the distance from the lodge, he was not very regular in attendance, the principles of the order were well grounded in his life. In politics W. J. Robinson was a republican and positive in his allegiance to the platform. He never sought office himself and never held office but his friends know his worth and Billy Robinson's support in a nominating convention was always reckoned equal to the support of a large political delegation, but if his favorite was defeated, Billy never balked. He was too honest for that and though he was skilled in all political tricks he would not employ them himself or let others. He was a great vote getter as the returns from his end of the county testify. Robinson was in the first convention at the organization of the Republican party in this county, and few have been seen since held that he has not attended.

As a business man he was shrewd but never overreaching. During the latter years of his life he bought and sold either as principal or agent, many tracts of land, but always to the full satisfaction of his clients.

He leaves a comfortable fortune for his wife and a fair portion for each of his children.

He has done a good work in his day, and while his friends would like to have had him with them for another ten years, yet they cannot complain that he has gone from them.

ACKERMAN AND LYMAN.
A fierce war is waging in some quarters on the school book question. Mr. Lyman personally enters the ranks and seeks to prejudice Mr. Ackerman because at the last time the selection of school books was made, he voted for no change. It will be remembered that the country was at that time in the midst of a great financial stringency. To make a change of books then would saddle an additional burden upon the people. Parents said that books which had been good for four years and had educated the older children were good enough for the younger brothers and sisters. So there was a universal, almost unanimous demand that no change be made. Professor Ackerman, republican nominee for superintendent of public instruction, voted to retain the old books. That was recognizing the popular demand. Mr. Lyman the tripod candidate for the same office, voted for a change of books. He was not practical enough to see the burdens already on the people or if he did he was unwilling to people to add others. He was not attempts to arouse in his own favor the prejudices the people have toward the American book company. Mr. Lyman misses the mark completely. We do not want to down the American Company and elevate another trust in its place, but repeal the law which makes the peculiar methods of trusts possible. It is the uniform school book system of which we should rid ourselves and not the American Book Company or its rival. We want Ackerman to help do that and not Lyman who is pledged to the rivals.

The Argus is Long on business management but a little short on figures. Last week this statement appeared: "It will be remembered that the county levy for 1893 provided only about \$23,000 with which to cancel warrants, while the levies for 1896 and 1897, each provided more than that. So it simply comes down to business management." The net assessment for that year was \$4,365,385. The levy was 7.9 mills. This gave \$44,495.44 instead of \$23,000 as above. This \$11,495.44 difference may be a small matter with the Argus which seems inclined to deal loosely with figures.

A gentleman said yesterday that in 1861 he brought sale leather for 16 cents per pound in gold. In 1865 he paid 38 cents per pound for the same stock. He paid in greenbacks, but had he paid in gold his leather would have cost him no more than 16 cents. Had leather advanced or greenbacks depreciated?

The 2d Oregon Inf. sailed from San Francisco for Manila on Wednesday last. A California regiment sailed the same day together with a detachment of regulars. The transports will make the voyage in 20 days if fortune favors them.
