The directors was granted the option of paying one bond before maturity whereupon they directed the clerk to pay it.

All the Sunday schools in the county regardless of religious denominations will be invited to participate. The Warren Grove has been spoken for and will be suitably prepared for the occasion. It is contemplated having a procession from the city to the grounds headed by the band and with other exercises will be an address by the mayor of the city. While the arrangements are yet uncompleted, the official announcement is expected to appear soon.

Miss Emily Adams and Mr. John Boge were married at the home of the bride's parents July 17. Miss Eda Adams acted as bridesmaid and Mr. William Jack as best man. The simple but impressive ceremony was performed beneath an arch of evergreen. The bride was beautifully robed in a gown of white crepe and carried a bouquet of Marsechal Nie roses. After the dainty lunch was served the bride and groom drove away amid a shower of rose petals and good wishes to their future home in Farmington where they will receive their many friends after August 1st.

In another column appears a well written letter from Guy Brown son of our O. R. & N. Co. Brown is a young man near Sidney, Cuba a few days after the rough riders had their fight. Mr. Brown is a private in Co. A. 3rd U. S. Infantry. The letter was wrapped in a leaf torn from a Spanish merchants account book. It was tied with five insulated telephone wires. Enclosed was the diaphragm of the transmitter part of the telephone over which Gen. Pando talked before he deserted his forces and fled to Havana.

Little Rosa daughter of D. Burkhalter of South Tualatin fell down stairs last Monday afternoon and fractured her left arm between the wrist and elbow, dislocated the right wrist and bruised her forehead badly. The child was upstairs with her grandmother but just how she happened to tumble over the banister is not known. She fell a distance of twelve feet. Dr. F. A. Bailey reduced the dislocations and made the little sufferer as comfortable as possible.

JUST BEFORE THE BATTLE

Camp near Sidney, Cuba.

Dear Sister—Today is about the first opportunity I have had to write to anyone since we succeeded in landing. We have had a successful time of our expedition in landing as in coming of course a few men were drowned and a few were killed in coming to shore in small boats as the sea was rough and a number of boats were smashed on the beach in landing. The one I came to shore in was beached and three men were hurt badly and the rest of us were scratched some. I got a cut on the foot from a chunk of coral, also a bruise on the hip but am now O. K. In fact I marched with the command that day from Altira where we landed to Firmaza, a distance of 19 miles.

Our frigate is now doing guard over the base of supplies here at Sidney and while we are not the farthest to the front yet we hold a most important position. We were doing outpost duty for two days during which time our cavalry were engaged the Spanish frigates. I saw all the wounded and dead that I want to see for a while. They brought in wounded Cubans by scores but only 104 of our men were wounded and about 30 killed including some wealthy officers of Roosevelt's rough riders. Oh, they were too rambunctious and ran into an ambush of 2,500 of the enemy and if it had not been for the regular cavalry they would all have been killed but the cavalry got around in flank and killed nearly half of the Spanish forces, but the rest of the brutes went down the mountain and surrounded about 900 Cuban soldiers and would have completely exterminated them but for our navy which took them on board and brought them on to this place in rear of our army where they can be healed and equipped for duty.

Oh, say! I wouldn't have missed this expedition for ten years of my life. Why this town ten days ago contained 1600 Spanish soldiers in the 20 block houses which were on the mountains around the town. But our navy put a half dozen explosives in each blockhouse and shot the artillery completely out of and off from the parapets on which they were mounted. Then the Spanish burned the shops and stores at Altira, but at Sidney, where we now are, they fled so precipitately that they destroyed nothing. One funny thing happened: they took apart all the locomotives and the engine at the water works but in two days the U. S. navy had water works in order and three engines running up and down the yards hauling provisions from the docks to the top of the mountains where they are loaded on pack mules and sent to the front where we have 20,000 of our men and 7,000 Cubans under General Goyenche's command around Santiago. Our troops are not bombarding the city, they are just lying still behind the earthworks on the crest of the mountains around the city and the Spanish forces are wasting their ammunition by firing over them. We are putting our forces in condition and getting stronger every day, getting more grub which is a great necessity while the Spanish troops are eating their mules. So by the time you get this letter I expect to be in Santiago, though there will be a great deal of dead and a good many more with sore places. I saw a Cuban who had a bullet in each leg and a saber had slashed off about 21 pounds from his shoulder.

Well I am writing on the back of some business letters of the iron company that comes out of the city and it is so dirty you can read it but it is all I have or will have until we get our field equipment, meantime we have nothing. We sleep in our little shelter tents and carry everything with us.

I can now see my captain, colonel, and even General Bates, sitting on the boughs of a banana tree eating a coconut, of which there are plenty. Good grub is bacon,hardtack and coffee. We get no vegetables now, but will in a few days as soon as our engines can be gotten out of the ships and everything in shape for campaigning in proper shape. You see all along the coast it is nothing but mountains, while back inland it is a beautiful plateau. I think this is the most beautiful country in the world I don't care to leave it. But I am so at sea, as it were, I can't talk Spanish yet and a fellow can't buy anything; money is no good. There is nothing here, the dons have eaten everything and destroyed the rest. The Cuban women and children come out of the rocks like animals, and we gave them the houses that the dons deserted and some of them are fine too. Our officers have headquarters in the old Spanish headquarters, but of course they can't be there as they have to be with their commands.

Well I will write again when I get to Santiago, if I get there.

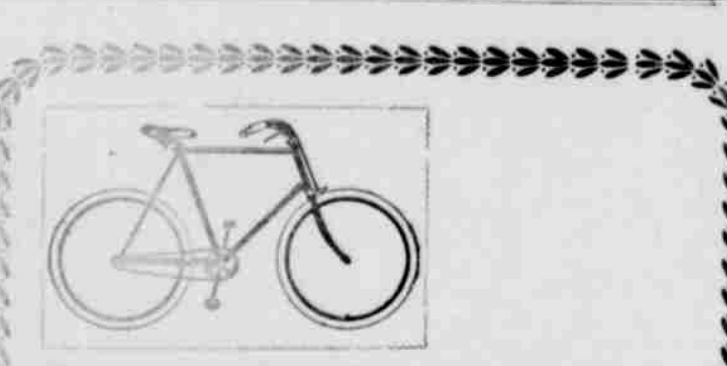
