Mr. R. E. Bryan is in receipt of a letter from a friend in La Grange, Mo. who reports that the beet is rather small, that was expected but sweeter. It was expected that the first sugar would be ready for packing on Thursday, yesterday. The people at La Grange are much interested in the enterprise, and a celebration is planning and arranging to appropriately observe the event. Mr. Bryan expects to attend the gathering.

Deputy Sheriff C. E. Deichman returned Monday last from his trip to Illinois. He spent a day in Chicago, two in Omaha and a half day in Portland. At Omaha he met Commissioner Dosey who is in charge of the Oregon exhibit. Mr. Dosey is in need of fresh fruit, particularly apples. In a few weeks the exhibition will have an apple day. Mr. Dosey wants such a stock on hand that he can give an apple to every visitor. He estimates that a carload will be required. How would it do to put in 30 boxes from Washington county with heads enough to go with every apple. This office would furnish the cards as its share of the exhibit.

Mr. S. Wilson this week received a letter dated August 24th from his daughter, Mrs. Black who is in the Klondike district about 15 miles from Dawson. Mr. Black is working in the mines making what we would call good wages, but taking expenses into account the dust and is not so enriching. It costs \$10 to get a sack of flour packed from Dawson to their camp. Sugar is worth 45 cents per pound and butter \$1.50 with other things in proportion. The most Mr. Black had made in a single day was \$10. Mrs. Black with her children expect to stay there this winter but next summer they plan to come out. Mr. Black says he will stay till he makes a raise.

W. O. Donaldson who has been in the engine room of the Climax mill for four years was disappointed in the gratification of a desire this week. He had planned to start on Tuesday last to visit his mother in Nebraska and with her attend the Omaha fair. This was to be a surprise. Three days before starting he received a letter from home that incidentally mentioned that his mother was about to start to Ohio to visit sisters whom she had not seen for many years. W. O. would not call her back by a telegraph message, for his visit can be postponed till spring.

The Light & Water Co. last Friday commenced moving its engine and dynamo to new found home expecting to be able to complete the job the same day but unexpected hindrances were met so that the machinery was not in running order till 11 p. m. FRUIT PRESERVING IN HILLSBORO.

There is much fruit grown in the neighborhood of Hillsboro that should be manufactured into suitable forms for transportation and that it is not gathered is due to the fact that the growers do not know where the plants are for its manufacture. "No" there is no big dealer here that will consume 1500 bushels per day, yet there are several smaller ones that have capacity for more fruit than is furnished. Mr. Rice in the north-west of town has a little evaporator that does perfect work and will turn out many a box of first grade fruit.

Another establishment of larger capacity is that of Mr. J. Kester. His drying closet will hold 250 trays of a half bushel each and they are made in the closet from 20 to 30 hours. Mr. Kester evaporates by the French method which is somewhat different from the American and those accustomed to using the American product do not take readily to the French.

In addition to evaporating fruit, Mr. Kester has two powerful cider presses which if operated to the full capacity will use up 420 sacks of apples per day and yield 1200 gallons of cider. In 1897 the product from these presses was 15,000 gallons mostly made into vinegar. The great difficulty is to get barrels to hold it. So far this year 1000 gallons have been made, hardly a day's run, yet the barrels are in town. Mr. Kester filters his cider through sand before he puts it in his barrels for vinegar. A Mr. F. M. Heide is operating the drier on the T. D. Humphrey's estate but as he has a capacity of only 100 trays, he is not kept busy, though his product is good. H. B. Luce is operating his own drier but receives no fruit except from his own orchard. His drier is constructed on the best principles of any in town, though he finds that a brick furnace room is necessary to ensure rapid work.

All the driers here are built on the gravity system, that is they have no machinery for distributing hot dry air to the evaporating closet or removing the watery vapor. But gradually Oregonians are finding markets for dried fruit and the business will become more profitable each year till a large establishment will be installed that will use all the fresh fruit that can be grown. But to begin that time only first class fruit must be put on the market and it must be packed in attractive packages. Boxes made of dressed lumber are superior to burlap bags, and the evaporator must not be afraid of using white paper for lining his boxes. These details help to establish a market.

ONE BY ONE.

The pioneer of fifty years ago was roisterer under the conditions of a dense population. This coupled with a consuming spirit for adventure led many brave men of that day into the wild west. In 1846 before the Mexican war, Benjamin Stewart with five sons, and their young families and one daughter drove into the wilderness, and started for Oregon. The train that crossed the Missouri river was made up of Benjamin Stewart and wife then a young man in years, Charles Stewart and wife, Thomas Stewart and wife, Holman Stewart, Alfred and Albert twins with their wives, and last daughter Nancy who died on the way here.

Benjamin, Charles, Thomas, and Alfred squatted on tracts of land near Reedville and there built homes. The old people were gathered to their fathers within a few years and lie buried on the Thos. Stewart donation. Holman died many years ago and if Alfred is yet alive his home is somewhere in California. Albert died last Friday aged 80 years and

five months. Only one of the brothers, Thos, is left. Charles was born at St. Charles county Missouri April 9th, 1818. As a stripling of a boy he waged in Florida.

Of the hardships that were endured in blazing the trail to Oregon no record exists, but the trials were severe and only the heroic courage of those five young men cheered on by their young wives could sustain them to the end. They did not reach the settlement for there was none till they made it.

The family that survives this patriarch is his widow now aged 70 years and his children, Mrs. John Simpson, Hillsboro; Mrs. Andrew Jack, Farmington; Mrs. Geo. Fuller, Spokane; Mrs. James McFarlin, South Yuland; Mrs. J. D. Alley, E. Portland; John Benjamin, Geo. and Charles Stewart, Hillsboro, and Wm. Stewart, California.

TEACHERS' INSTITUTE.

Supt. Ball has issued the following announcement which calls the annual teachers' institute for Washington county:

The annual teachers institute for Washington county will be held in the public school building at Hillsboro, on Thursday, Friday and Saturday, the 20th, 21st and 22nd of Oct. beginning at 9 o'clock a. m.

Hon. J. H. Ackerman, State Superintendent elect and Prof. W. A. Wetzel have been engaged as the principal instructors. Papers on educational subjects will also be presented by several of the leading teachers of the county.

Evening sessions will be held on Thursday and Friday at which will be presented literary and musical programs, including lectures by Presidents McClelland of Pacific University and Campbell of Monmouth State Normal School.

All teachers in the county are required by law to attend the annual county institute and the county superintendent may at his discretion revoke the certificate, reduce the grade or refuse to grant a certificate to any teacher who refuses to attend the county institute without cause." Sub. Div. 23, Sec. 25, Title 3 of the School Laws.

It is hoped to make this institute one of the most interesting and profitable ever held in Washington county.
