LAST LETTER TO DR. LINKLATER

He was Cheerful and in Good Health A Letter from W. F. Carter to Mrs. Illiott.

Our friend, Percy, is gathered to his fathers. In a distant land surrounded by the hard bearded faces of soldier comrades, with the savage hoard just beyond the rifle pits, he wrestled with pestilence and answered the last roll call. The bare official announcement was made Monday evening last and was repeated from lip to lip till it seemed every one in the city knew that a favori e associate was removed. The sad hush that fell on the street and in the home brought many of our citizens who have friends in the army to realize that death stalks through Manila.

Private C. P. Oliver enlisted in Co. H 24 Oregon- Infantry last May and sailed with the 1st expedition for the Philippines. He had planned to take a degree in medicine, and was about ready to go to the medical college. Dr. Linklater who had volunteered to see him through college called his atten tion to the fact that he might get killed, "Well I have no one dependent on me and I can go," was his reply. "But why do you want to go to war?" "O, I suppose the spirit is in me. My father was in the Great Army of the Republic and my great grandfather was one of the Boston tea party." Indeed it was a surprise to all that the quiet and studious O.iver should enlist. But he saw an opportunity for exercising patriotism and at the same time get an experience that would be valuable when he came to practice his chosen profession-As indicating somewhat how he was esteemed here it is proper to state that the mothers of the young soldiers individually went to Percy and requested that he have a care for their sons, but he is the first to go. The deceased has a father in

Carter's Letter. MANILA P. L.

Sept. 30, 1898 Mrs. Dora J. Elliott.

Dear Friend: Your letter of Aug. 22 was received yesterday. I was glad to hear from you and think it is very kind of you to remember me for we boys away out here cannot receive

too many letters from home.

Manila is a very pretty city situated on both sides of the Pasig river; the part on the east is called New Manila and the part on the west, Old Manile: the latter having a high wall around it. The wall was built in 1670; it is about five miles long, thirty feet thick and twenty feet high and has ten gates.

As you say, we are seeing new and strange sights every day, we also are learning something new each day; chief of which is how to speak the Spanish language. It is something wonderful how quickly one can learn it when he hears nothing

spoken but Spanish. The natives are mostly of the Malay race and from their habits, they are naturally becoming dwarfed in size; although small of statue they are well built, very filthy and some of them, the boys say, hav'nt sense enough to carry them across the street, but in spite of all these drawacks, they are becoming civilized

very rapidly. We landed at Fort Cavite July irst and remained there until Aug. 13th, the day we took Manila. Fort Cavite was a very pretty place, it is six miles across the bay to Manila and sixteen around by land. We did not see much fighting while there excepting when we were doing picket duty, then we had to keep our eyes open, I can tell you and sometimes we kept our guns warm for two or hree hours at a time.

The weather was very warm there out the mango and banana trees gave us great shelter from the hot sun, but when under them we had to keep a sharp look out for the poisonous tar-antula the bite of which will prove fata, in thirty minutes or an hour.

The taking of Manila was quite battle; we all saw sights, and had experiences we may never see or have gain, at least we hope not. I suppose you have read all about the bat le before this time, so I will just give you a few details about the Oregon boys-the first to land at the Ladrone Island, the first in Fort Cavite and the first in the old wailed city of
