Aiken's wife left while he was in that scrape and came out to her father's in this county, Jimmie Burgess who lives out north. Aiken was a regular visitor at Mr. Campbell's till he went to his 15-year-old daughter from her home. The girl was finally found in the lower part of Portland but dear Jimmie had skipped. A warrant charging rape was sworn out and placed in the hands of Sheriff Bradford of this county to serve, as it was supposed the young criminal had gone to his father-in-law. Mr. Bradford could not serve the warrant personally so he sent Mr. Barrett. A hint of the whereabouts of Aiken was whispered and Mr. Barrett went hunting. Just before arriving at Burgess' there was information that Aiken was going to leave there and come this way. Mr. Barrett concluded to wait for him. In just a few minutes here he came on horseback being armed with a Winchester and accompanied by his brother-in-law. Mr. Barrett ordered him to throw up his hands, instead Aiken made a dash for it. Mr. Barrett fired and hit the horse's ear, Aiken fired at about the same time, the ball passing between him and his assistant. The horse commenced to plunge and wheel in a circle. Barrett shot again but hit nothing. About this time Aiken was thrown to the ground and in the fall lost his gun. He started to run but a ball from the officer's pistol clipped a patch off his coat whereupon he stopped and was reasonable, only remarking "well I am your game, I thought I had a chance to get away." It was then 9 o'clock at night and dark. Mr. Barrett brought his prisoner to town and next day turned him over to Detective Ford from Portland. Young Aiken is the making of a bad man.

You are hereby required to appear in the Circuit Court of the State of Oregon, for the County of Washington, and answer the complaint therein filed against you on or before the expiration of six weeks publication of this summons in the Hillsboro Independent, the first publication thereof being made on the 3d day of March 1899, and the last publication of this summons upon you and your wife please take notice that if you fail to appear and answer the complaint, the Plaintiff will take judgment against E. H. Malitz and Theresa Malitz for the sum of \$440.35 with interest thereon from February 6 1894 at the rate of 10 per cent per annum, the sum of \$100.00 Attorney's fees and the costs and disbursements of this suit and for a decree against all of the above named defendants annulling and setting aside and holding null and void that certain judgment and decree of foreclosure made and entered in the Circuit Court of the State of Oregon, for Washington county on the 25th day of November, 1895 in favor of the above named plaintiff and against the above named defendants and for a decree correcting a certain mortgage executed and delivered by E H Malitz and Theresa Malitz to M J Sammons, the above named Plaintiff on the 6th day of February, 1894, to conform to the intention of said parties thereto at the time of execution thereof; That said mortgage be foreclosed and the property therein intended to be mortgaged and described as follows: Commencing at the S E corner of S W 1/4 of Section 21, T 1 N E 1 W of willamette W 46 rods, thence N 38 rods and 5/8 inches, thence E 46 rods, thence South 28 rods and 65 links to the place of beginning containing 11 acres excepting a strip 15 feet wide on the E line thereof; be foreclosed and the property above described be sold in the manner prescribed by law in the practice of the above entitled court.
