The disarmament congress called at the instance of Russia is in session in Holland. The United States and the principal nations of Europe have sent delegates.

The Philippines have been driven back a distance of about fifty miles, as far as from here to Salem.

The time from San Francisco to Manila has been shortened to 22 days. Ships with a sufficient coal capacity do not stop at Honolulu.

It is suggested that the best way to bring the Cuban army to a realizing sense of its dependency is to bring that \$3,000,000 home again.

Admiral Dewey will start home by way of the Suez canal in a few days. He comes in his flagship, the Olympia. Rear Admiral Watson succeeds Dewey at Manila.

The Philippine capital, Malolos was captured some weeks ago. Then San Francisco and now their third protem capital San Isidro is ours, the insurgents having been routed last Wednesday by Col. Sumner's brigade.

There are some mutterings to the effect that Gomez of Cuba is becoming dissatisfied and may reorganize his insurgents. Now let Gomez know that when he again takes the jungle the idea of an independent Cuban republic is a dream of last night's sleep. If the United States has to take up arms to maintain order the island will soon become states' territory.

The war department seems now to realize that there is a Pacific Coast and a port looking toward Asia. When the regulars began pouring into the Philippines the Suez canal was the favorite route, but no more troops will be sent through the Indian ocean. It is a longer sea voyage more unhealthy and hotter. The Pacific is to be the highway hereafter with San Francisco or Portland as the port.

Gov. Geer's answer to the proposition to buy a house in Washington for Admiral Dewey is the most healthy utterance that has appeared. He truly says "that the presentation of houses or other valuable goods to public officers, as such, is of doubtful propriety." True sentiment for our government pays its servants reasonably well so that they are able to buy their own houses.

Frank E. Weed, first sergeant in company A, writes to his mother in Oregon City: "If they reorganize the army by the first of June, are you willing for me to re-enlist? We all expect, however, to have opportunity to leave here for the States sometime in June or July. Many will, in all probability remain here in the service of the United States. As for me, I could ask for nothing better in the world than the opportunities presented in these islands."

E. C. Miller of Portland secretary of the prohibition state central committee was in Hillsboro this week. He states that his party will be thoroughly organized in each county of the state before the next election. They may elect some of their candidates, but the cause of temperance will not be advanced greatly. Indeed totalism will be received more encouragement from the industrial and economic interests than from this political support. Prohibition, free silver and free trade is a bad combination.

In a letter to an Ottawa county, Kansas paper one of the members of General MacArthur's brigade writes from Manila: "Night before last I was on picket duty all night, and yesterday morning I found that the nigger picket was within a hundred yards of me. After a little talk we both laid down our guns and met between the lines and had a little visit. He said the people in their army did not want to fight us, but they had to or their officers would kill them. He also said that he had not had a bite to eat for three days. I gave him what hardtack I had with me, and it did me more good to see him eat it than if I had eaten it myself. When we parted we shook hands and he cried like a baby." Remembering this incident can it be credited that Aguinaldo's will for liberty and national independence is genuine? Rather, is it not the mockery of a selfish despot.

PORTLAND v. ASTORIA.

Is Portland handicapped? And is Portland a clog to the prosperity of Oregon? Portland and Astoria have had many wrangles some of them temperate, as to which ought to take precedence as a commercial point. Astoria has claimed that wheat load on ships that can come there is worth more than Portland is paying for it. And consequently ought to net the farmers more than he is getting. Astoria enthusiasts put the sum that ought to go to the farmers should they ship to Astoria at \$500.

000. All this is denied by Portland which city asserts that the cost of transporting wheat to Astoria by inland methods is so much greater than when taken into sea-going vessels at Portland docks that all claimed profits are wiped out. This dispute has not been settled.

A table of wheat exports published in the Oregonian of October 8, last shows that for the previous 9 months Portland exported 8,815,749 bushels wheat valued at \$6,941,940 or 78.7 cents per bushel. San Francisco sent away 5,819,782 bushels valued at \$5,108,150, or 87.7 cents per bushel and Seattle and Tacoma sent away 4,198,000 bushels valued at \$3,369,247 or 80.2 cents per bushel. From this it appears that Seattle paid 1 1/2 cents more per bushel than Portland and that San Francisco paid 9 cents more per bushel. Astoria claims that had she been permitted to load the 8,815,749 into the deep sea boats her exporters could have at least met the Seattle price which would have left her \$132,225 more money than was left here. This is not the half million gain to be sure but they claim that the San Francisco price could have been approximated.

Astoria shows that her claim is tenable by pointing out that the channel to Portland is only 26 feet deep and hence only ships drawing that water can get to the inland harbor while vessels drawing 30 feet go to Astoria. And that the small ships are more expensive and have to receive more for freight than the big ones because they can carry more tons and can afford to do carry for a less tonnage. This gain is added to the price paid to producers for their product. If these things are true then Portland is handicapped, because she can not pay the price even if so disposed. Further she is a clog on the prosperity of the state.

If the clog is there, Portland can remove it and she ought to do so. Portland can get wheat from the Upper Columbia basin cheaper than Seattle for the latter city has to pull it over a mountain while Portland gets it by gravity almost.

Another thing. The big ships that go to Seattle and can come to Astoria carry the Oriental traffic. The little ships do none or next to none of that business. The high charters of the canoes, urges Astoria, is reason enough for this. Teas and silks are light and Jim Hill carries them over the mountain while he is willing to send the wheat to Portland. Seattle is represented to be a live town while Portland is only just so. Can Portland get that Seattle business? Astoria says yes. Make Astoria the harbor for the 30 foot ships. Bring the wheat down the Columbia and send the riches of Catho back again. Portland is the great railroad center of the Pacific coast. Let it be the distributing center. Farmers will bring more money, more money will bring a denser population. The population will make Portland. Is it an endless chain?

THE TOWN OF CORNELIUS. Continued from First Page equipped with improved machinery. The mill is kept running steadily and a good trade has been built up. Their brand of Silver Dust flour is in great demand. Their ware house is 60,000 bushels capacity. The best steam power cider and preserving works in the state is located at Cornelius. Its successful operation is due to the business capacity of Mr. L. Bailey and his enterprise has been the means of giving to the farmers of this county a certain market for their apples. He operates his factory 3 months in the year and gives employment to six hands. His output last fall was 350,000 gallons of cider 190,000 gallons of vinegar, 15,000 gallons of apple butter. He also has a vineyard of four acres and last season made 5,000 gallons of wine and 1,100 gallons of grape vinegar.

J. E. Reeves operates a large warehouse in which he handles hay, oats and onions. Hendrix & Son, the saw mill men have a small planing mill and sash and door factory in the town but at present it is not being operated.

The union business and commercial lines are fully represented in Cornelius. C. C. Hancock, Fred Matthias, Ernest Haberstroh and L. Bailey have each a general merchandise store that compares well with those of other towns. Mrs. Etta Matthias attends to the wants of the ladies with a selected stock of millinery. Dr. A. Standee conducts the drug store and attends to the wants of the sick. The hungry wayfarer is looked after by Mrs. Anna Miller of the St. Joseph hotel. The wants of the thirsty are supplied by John W. Corey and Brinn & Godfrey whose saloons have all the drinkables to keep one hot or cold. To the tonorial skill of E. R. Miller is due the handsome appearance of the men of Cornelius. John Cornelius and John Clarke are ever ready to provide home-seekers with the property to be had in this county. Albert Honning has the lively stable. Frank Elsholtz does the tinning and plumbing and also handles a stock of hardware. L. G. Wiedonwitsch and A. S. Hatch attends to all blacksmithing and repairing of the town.

Cornelius has a fine, sociable class of citizens and intending settlers will find it and the surrounding country a very desirable location in which to make a home.
