

SHERIDAN TO NESMITH

A letter, heretofore unpublished gives shots on the war

WRITTEN IN NEW ORLEANS

Gen. Sheridan was continually changed from one plan to another but did not complain

It has from the beginning been known in Oregon that an intimate friendship existed between Gen. Phil. H. Sheridan and Senator J. W. Nesmith. It is not surprising therefore that these two men laid bare one to the other their innermost thoughts. Among the many papers filed with the State Historical society is the following letter from Sheridan to Nesmith and never before published. Thus it we get a glimpse of the great commander's inner consciousness. It was written when Sheridan was in command of the division which was watching Maximilian then in Mexico and supported on his throne by French bayonets. Not long after Sheridan took command of that department the French army was called home when Maximilian was easily overcome by the Mexicans. This is Sheridan's letter:

Headquarters Military Division of the Gulf, New Orleans, July 15, 1866.

My Dear Nesmith: I send you today a map of the operations of the Cavalry under my command in Virginia. It will give you the clearest idea of the amount of work which I did in the suppression of the rebellion. I have also nearly completed the maps of the Infantry operations in the Shenandoah valley which I will send to you if you will be kind enough to accept it.

There was no general officer in the war who was subjected to so many tests as myself. Sometimes I was commanding Infantry and sometimes Cavalry and sometimes both together. Then I was constantly changed from one line of operations to another and each time I had to take strange troops and had to overcome local prejudices. Then I had to study new lines of operations and a new country, but with all this I do not believe I missed a single point. I asked no one to help me but my legitimate superiors. I never made a fuss over what I accomplished. In fact I took up the idea that it was my duty to be successful and more than Gen. Grant expected me to do. I subjected everyone under me to these conditions and it made them good soldiers. I issued no congratulatory orders. I stimulated no fust and feather courage, but I gave officers and men victories so complete that the humblest private saw and knew it. If my course has pleased you, I will feel very grateful as I feel very proud of our old friends.

I wrote you some time ago in reply to your Cottage Grove letter. Did you get it?

County Surveyor Merrill has just returned from a trip into the Coast range where he went to establish some lines for Portland parties who are locating timber claims. These people squatted in township 2 North Range 6 west. That township is noted for its timber, and land there has been eagerly sought till it is all gone but two or three fractions. While out in the woods the question came up as to how much timber there is on a quarter section of that land. To guess intelligently a single tree was measured, then the trees on an acre counted. The estimate was from 15 to 18 million feet. Logs at Portland are worth \$6.00 per thousand feet. At that rate 15 million feet of timber is worth \$90,000. But then of course there is a lot of labor represented in \$6.00 worth of logs in Portland. On the other hand it would not take many quarter sections of land to build a railroad into the timber belt of the Coast range. Other places than Portland are becoming interested in timber claims. One day last week 45 claims were located among the big firs of the Coast range. A while ago it was said that we need a Nicaragua canal so that we could market our lumber. After one travels over the great plains of Idaho, Montana, Colorado and New Mexico that just now are coming into cultivation made possible by irrigation. It is seen that we have a place for every board in our own country. We need no canal for that purpose, and seeing there are coming to be bread eaters across the Pacific it is a question if on this coast need a canal for any purpose.

Gen. H. Himes secretary of the State Historical society has spent this week in the county talking with the pioneers and making records of their conversations. Mr. Himes will not write history himself but only gather facts and put them in such shape as will be material for the future historian.

Mr. B. T. Flint of Scholls was in town last Tuesday visiting after safely housing his grain. Like the rest his wheat and oats got wet because it was not ready to stack or thresh before the rain came. He patiently waited till it was ready to put away when he took care of it. He says his grain is in most excellent shape, the oats are colored some. For feed or seed they are perfect. Mr. Flint is one of the best farmers in the county and always has good crops. He attributes to his sheep. He keeps a small flock of a hundred or so sometimes he lets the number increase. Mr. Flint's practice is to crop a field about three years and then pasture it the fourth year with sheep. His farm is divided into fields for that thing. The result is his grain fields are always clean and his product is first class besides he has as large a quantity as could be obtained from all the fields in the county. He has matured a ton and a few hundred pounds of wool which this year has been as good as gold. Wild oats do not thrive on Mr. Flint's farm, or for that matter any other vile weed.

At the special session of the legislature held last fall an act was passed setting off 11 sections of land from Columbia county and attaching them to the extreme northern part of Washington county. These were sections 2 to 6 in T 3 N R 5 W and 1 to 6 in T 3 N R 5 W. The reason for the change was one urged by the residents of the annexed territory to the effect that they are removed from St. Helens, the county seat of Columbia county and that they had to travel a long distance through Washington county to do county business. Their convenience would be served by attaching them to this county. The thing was done. The act provided that the County Clerk of Columbia county should make certified copies of all instruments effecting land titles in those sections and send them to the Recorder of this county for record. Mr. Recorder Jack received the act containing the sections and mortgages and released the Clerk's bill for making the copies is \$50 and as he omitted to stamp his certificate Mr. Jack had to invest \$5.10 revenue stamps. Washington county has this bill to foot. Washington county will get no fee for recording them here neither will Mr. Jack, since he is on a salary. There is about two weeks work to do. It will probably be a month before the batch is cleaned up. Washington county will even up on the transaction by hereafter collecting taxes from these newcomers.
