The new officers were sworn in and assumed the duties of their stations.

The mayor read a statement of the financial condition of the city.

He called attention to the probable revenue and disbursements for the ensuing year and showed that the most pinching economy must be exercised.

The St. Charles hotel, corner Front and Morrison streets, Portland, is the oldest of the good hotels in the city, and in its day was one of the famous homes for the traveling public, but as business moved back its landlords neglected the old favorite till it was badly run down. The building, is a four story brick substantial structure, and the property is well located and ought to be as favorite a resort as of old. Two far sighted men saw all these things and last spring they bought the corner. They organized the St. Charles Hotel Company and started the work of building up the business. The president of the company is Frank Davies a Washington county boy who got his start in Washington county. Mr. Davies has been a hotel man from his youth up, while Mr. Belcher has all his life been in positions where he had to study and cater to the whims of humanity. His life training serves him a good turn.

Belcher is a broad man and cranksy in but one direction and in that he is joined by Davies. Both of them are positive in having every thing about them clean. This trait of character went into the hotel with them, and the first thing they did was to scrub from garret to cellar. All old carpets were sent to the cleaning mills and thoroughly renovated. Some may be much worn but they are clean and will be replaced with new when their turn comes. New bedroom sets take the place of old which go to the woodshed. The greatest change however is in the office. The old entrance hall, the front street but the entrance has been changed and a Morrison street entrance has been arranged. Now there is a fine lobby luxuriously seated with easy chairs. These changes are gradually becoming known to the public and the old liberal patronage is returning to the house. In connection there is a good restaurant presided over by another Washington county man John B. Kellogg. The company is passing liberal appropriation bills and fast bringing the house to what it was in the 60's.

Mr. E. Burst will on Monday morning next open a meat market in the Finney building on Main St. He will keep in stock fresh meats of all kinds as well as fish and poultry. It is Mr. Burst's purpose to furnish market where purchasers and vendors may meet. What he does not need for the home market will be taken to Portland. He has his own wagon and is accustomed to the trade.

The stranding of the light ship at the mouth of the Columbia river last week was a tragedy for the community that no lives were lost. One man was injured. Our neighbor Sidney Thirkle was on board but saved with the rest. This is the second time the ship has broken from her moorings. The government will without doubt replace it with a steam schooner.

The Forest Grove republican club held a meeting in its elite room last Wednesday evening and appointed a committee to revise its membership roll. The next meeting of the club will be held next Wednesday when officers will be chosen for the ensuing year. The club proposes to hold three or four meetings before the gates to the club are selected.

B. S. Pague who has been weather forecast official at Portland for the past 11 years, has been assigned the Chicago office temporarily in pursuance to a regulation of the weather bureau which requires its officials to have practical experience in forecasting for all the districts in the United States. Mr. Pague will be at the Chicago station for about six months. He will take charge of the Chicago office January 1st and leave Portland about Dec. 1st. The Portland office will be in charge of Mr. Geo. N. Salisbury of Seattle, and the work of the office will proceed uninteruptedly. Weather forecasts are issued from only four offices, Washington, D. C., Chicago, Portland and San Francisco. It is just possible that Mr. Pague may go to Washington from Chicago. It was only the lack of experience in forecasting in the territory east of the Rocky Mountains that prevented him from earning the highest per cent in the examinations when Willis L. Moore was chief of the Bureau. A little higher per cent and Pague would have been chief.

The announcement has many times been made from the weather forecast station that the amount of rainfall was below the average. This is an acknowledgment that the precipitation sometimes goes above the average. Well that condition is with us now. About a month ago it was stated that the average had been reached. It has rained constantly since so that now more rain has fallen than is usual. It was in 1895, Nov. 15, that Lewis and Clarke reached the mouth of the Columbia. The rains commenced early that year and we can imagine that season being about as this, a wet one.

There was an amusing incident happened at the M. E. church last Sunday evening. The auditory was crowded when several young women came in and were shown to a seat already nearly full.
