

U. S. G. Marquam, a Portland Attorney Attempts to Make This Graft

Last week U. S. G. Marquam a Portland attorney, filed claims against Washington county aggregating about \$1000. This claim is based upon fees collected of litigants just after the county officers salary law went into effect and before its provisions were thoroughly understood. Mr. Marquam wants those fees repaid. For his services he gets one-half of what is collected. The sums in dispute are small, hardly any of them amounting to ten dollars while some of them are no more than 40 cents. Mr. Marquam searched the fee books in compiling his claim. The individual litigants were not seen, hence they did not employ him to do this work. The county officials are inclined to consider this a case of grafting. If after a proper examination the county court decides that the claims are valid, warrants will be issued to the litigants when Mr. Marquam can sue them and get his 50 per cent. The court will not issue him a warrant in bulk.
