Meek and his brother in law Newell being of the latter company. They trapped on their own account and while they found some beaver, the price of furs had tallen and and the profits of the business was gone, After about two years of this independent trapping Newell proposed to Meek that they leave the mountains and come to the country West of the Cascades. Meek consented. This was in 1840. At Fort Hall the trappers changed to the pioneer and two wagons that had been left there by Dr. Whitman were repaired and loaded with the families. By this time Meek's first born, Courtney, was a responsibility. Teams were hitched to the wagons and further experiment of "taking wagons to Oregon" commence I and successfully performed.
