

THE BIG BAND CONCERT

Will be the Largest Musical Event ever held in the County

A GOOD LONG PROGRAM

All the Invitations Accepted, Which Assures at Least Sixty Band Men Being Present

The concert tomorrow evening will be the musical event in the county. It is seldom that 60 instruments are brought together in the large cities and still a rarer event for the small towns. Everything is working well for the meet tomorrow. The weather promises to be favorable and the musicians are all coming. The program that will be followed is here given:

PACIFIC UNIVERSITY.

For the second time in three years P. U. has won the State Championship in inter-collegiate debating. Thru our victory over Willamette University some two months ago it fell to Pacific University to contest with University of Oregon for one of the greatest inter-collegiate honors of the year. It seemed at one time that on account of the increasing demands made by the U. of O. the debate would have to be given up, but after a hotly contested preliminary debate over the wire which was no time limit, as long as Eugene's bank account held out, peaceable terms were agreed upon and our team left Saturday morning for the scene of the combat. The P. U. team so successfully supported their case, and disclosed the fallacies of their opponents arguments that the judges decided it would be unwise for Uncle Sam to go into the railroad business. After the decision the debaters were tendered a reception at the home of Prof. Young where the victors were congratulated and the vanquished were consoled.

There was a very nervous crowd hovering around the telegraph office late Saturday night, but all latent energy was soon turned into making the night hideous with yells and fish horns. And the "old college bell" was put on a triumphant knell. Then around a glorious big bon-fire occurred a war dance which would credit to the aboriginal tribes which used to inhabit these 770000 Plains. Monday evening the boys of the team were given a royal reception only such a one as all the students and good townspeople can give. The speeches of congratulation were exceptionally good full of wit, spice and comprehensive thought. Among those who spoke were Senator Latoro, Prof. Robertson, Rev. D. M. King, Prof. Atwell, Robt. McClelland, Miss M. Tibbals, Mr. Hale, Mr. E. Meresse and the 8 members of the team. Mr. A. D. Schoch, Lynn Laneheld and W. T. Fletcher. After this part of the program, light refreshments were served in two prettily decorated rooms adjoining the auditorium and then the merry crowd gradually dispersed never to forget this evening of intense enthusiasm.

AGED PIONEER DEAD

Henry B. Tucker Pioneer of 1852, died at Home of his Son

PNEUMONIA THE AILMENT

He was an Exceptionally Good Shot with a rifle in his Younger Days.

Died at the home of his son, William, near Beaverton, Friday, May 4th Henry B. Tucker, aged 90 years. The deceased contracted a cold which settled on his lungs and developed into a severe attack of pneumonia. His advanced age was against recovery.

Mr. Tucker was born in Kentucky Dec. 12, 1804. In early life he went to Indiana where he lived till 1852 when he came to Oregon and settled near Beaverton. In 1853 he is remembered as an old man who of course he was hardly fifty then, but to us boys he seemed old. At that date he was recognized as a sure shot with a rifle. No one was able to beat him unless it was his son Thomas who was the unquestioned best shot in the county. Henry B. leaves two sons, Thomas Tucker, 69, of Hillsboro and William Tucker, 67, of Beaverton. The Tucker's come of fighting stock, William Tucker, father of the deceased, was a soldier in the war of 1812 and a member of the celebrated Kentucky regiment that went to Detroit. He never returned from that campaign and it is supposed that the Indians ambushed him. Representatives of the family were in the Revolutionary war, tradition relates with the Samuels, but the story is too thin to repeat. The funeral was on Sunday last in Crescent cemetery where his neighbors of almost half a century followed him to the resting place.

Olsen 32 and Lena Johnson 19. Last Sunday Thos. Tucker, while returning from the cemetery where his father had been buried, was thrown from his buggy and seriously hurt. Yesterday he was far from resting easy. He was passing over that very bad piece of road from Fanno's to Heaverton and in trying to maneuver a deep rut, drove to one side of the track near a stump. The wheel of his buggy ran on a large root but slipped off letting the opposite wheel into the deep hole. The buggy did not tip over, but the tilt was violent and Mr. Tucker was thrown rapidly to the ground, striking on his shoulder. He was unconscious for twenty minutes and then rallied only to realize that he was suffering intense pain. He was unable to come home that day, but on Monday morning he was able to get to the cars and come home where he has since been confined to his bed. Mrs. Tucker was thrown out at the same time but fortunately was not hurt much.
