The Triumph of a Diligent Student

BURIED AT CORVALLIS

Suffered With Brights Disease for Over Four Years.

John M. Gates, notice of whose death was received in time for announcement last week was buried in the family lot, Corvallis cemetery, last Saturday. The deceased was born in Iowa, May 16, 1873, hence at date of death was a few weeks past 27 years of age. He was a graduate of Stanford University being a member of the famous '96 class, and while he may not have stood at the head of the class in markings yet he led all the others since he did the work of four years in three. He was a scientific investigator and a diagnosed case of the disease that was the cause of his death six months before he graduated, a judgment that has no parallel in medical history. He knew that the fatal disease was upon his vitals for four and a half years and during all those long weary months he looked toward the close of his life with a heroic determination to live was allowed to take second place, and the spiritual life of the dying man was advanced. Clear and steady, the flame of his christian faith lighted his sick chamber. He approached the line dividing time and eternity without faltering and stepped over to rest in the mansion prepared for him by the Master.
