RICH STRIKE IS MADE

Theodore McNamer has a Good Claim

ON EMMA CREEK IN ALASKA

The Party are Taking out Immense Sums of Money

The San Francisco Examiner of Oct. 15, publishes the following account of a rich gold strike made by Theodore McNamer, telegraphed to that paper from Tacoma, Oct. 14.

Confirmation of the discovery of rich nuggets on the middle fork of the Koyukuk river is brought by Theodore McNamer of Forest Grove, Or., who discovered Emma Creek, the richest stream in the district, last June. It is in the same locality as Myrtle Creek. In twelve days McNamer's force of seven men dug \$2,000 from one claim.

Emma Creek has been thoroughly prospected, with showings of \$50 to \$150 per day per man. Course gold is plentiful in the soil above as well as on the bedrock, which is from two to eight feet below the surface.

Emma Creek is nine miles long and has a number of tributaries, which are also rich. McNamer is certain another great gold producing district has been discovered.

However as time passes the remedy for these inconveniences will come. When each of the islands have our common county organization many of the evils now hindering business will disappear. While there Mr. Hughes examined volcanoes and volcanic eruptions quite carefully and pronounces an account of his observations in the near future.
