W. E. Thorne started last Saturday morning to deliver some cattle that he had sold. Only a short distance on the way had been made when a homesick steer started back for his old range. Mr. Thorne put his horse to his full speed to turn the brute, but when the turn in the road was reached, the horse's feet went from under him and Mr. Thorne was pitched forward striking the frozen ground face down. His forehead was badly scored, and the lower eyelid of the right eye was torn loose its inner corner and stripped down on the cheek bone. Dr. Linklater dressed the wounds taking stitches in the slits on the forehead as well as fastening the eyelid to its place. Yesterday the patient was doing as well as could be hoped, and his speedy recovery is predicted, though much of his beauty is gone not to return.

A mild coal oil excitement has taken hold of citizens on the Trumbo farm, and adjoining lands north of Glencoe. Something floating on the water of a well gave a tip to the curious. A prospecting company of Portland has taken an "option" on the property and it enough land is bonded to them they obligate themselves to drill a well to the depth of 2,000 feet unless oil shall sooner be struck. Land owners may bond on a royalty receiving five cents on each barrel of oil brought to the top of the ground. They concede nothing on the surface except rights of way to the wells, and land enough for the boring and pumping plant. There will be some prospecting in the foothills this summer.

PORTLAND-NEHALEM RAILROAD.

From a Hillsboro gentleman who has had opportunities for conversation with some of the promoters of the Portland-Nehalem Railroad it is learned that the enterprise is on a substantial business basis, with sufficient money to have what is planned. The bulk of the money comes from New York and of course the New York people will decide which of two routes will be adopted. The Portland interests favor the Tualatin river route while the New York directors will wait the report of the chief engineer who is yet to arrive and look over the ground. A policy of light grades is to be adopted; one per cent will be accepted as the maximum. Indeed the company expresses a willingness to increase a distance three and a half miles to get the coveted one per cent. The Tualatin valley route gives the one per cent at least until the mountains are struck and is the cheapest by several thousand dollars. The Cornelius Pass route is found to be bad because of the lateral gulches. To cross these will require high trestles and deep cuts besides a tunnel a half mile through. But the north route will lead the road into Union depot Portland, while the south route by Tualatin valley stops above the Madison street bridge or else crosses the Willamette at Oswego and proceeds on the east side of the Willamette. But here again is a snag, that will tear a big hole in each wheel sack, in the shape of the steel bridge. The tolls across that structure are frightful. True, warehouses on the east side offer a solution, and that may be the knife for cutting the knot. If Portland real estate holders would do the proper thing, they would let the road go down Front street to Union depot. The city would then have complete command of the situation. Men are now out taking attitudes on the divides between Dairy and Gales Creek waters and the streams tributary to the Nehalem. As soon as the chief engineer gets here from New York, organized surveying parties will get out into the field.

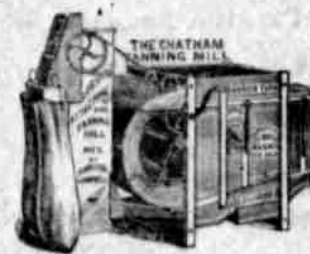
