EX-PRESIDENT HARRISON.

Ex-president Benjamin Harrison died at his home in Indianapolis, Ind., on Wednesday afternoon, Mar. 13, in the 68 year of his age, after an illness of less than a week. On Thursday of last week Gen. Harrison complained of pain in his lungs. The attack made rapid progress till pneumonia was firmly seated, then the end quickly came.

The General, born in Ohio, Aug. 20, 1833, was a grandson of Gen. W. H. Harrison, the 9th president of the United States. In 1888, Benjamin defeated Grover Cleveland for the presidency, receiving a majority of 65 votes in the electoral college. At that election he carried all the old free states except Connecticut and New Jersey.

When he was elected a congressman who had been in college with Harrison predicted that his administration would in no wise be sensational but would be conservative, clean and dignified. At its close no other judgment could be passed. Harrison was a fine lawyer and his practice since his term of president has been in the higher courts where constitutional questions were in controversy. He was employed by Venezuela in the settlement of the dispute between that country and England. The fee received was \$100,000. His estate is estimated to be worth \$250,000. The General was twice married, his first wife dying in the White House just before the close of his administration. A son and daughter is of the first union and a daughter of the second.

THROUGH HAWSE HOLE TO QUARTER DECK.

Not long ago gunner Charles Morgan, of the U. S. Cruiser New York asked his old Commander Admiral Sampson to endorse his application to promotion as a commissioned officer. Sampson favorably endorsed the application, but added:

"It is earnestly to be hoped, however, that the Secretary of the Navy will not find it necessary to take advantage of the authority which I understand is to be granted him to appoint a certain number of warrant officers to the grade of ensigns."

"While it is true that these men are selected from a large class of men of very unusual ability, which distinguishes them as perhaps the professional equals of their officers, as far as their technical education stands it is also true that they are recruited from a class of men who have not had the social advantages that are a requisite for a commissioned officer. It is submitted that in time of peace the navy's function consists, to a certain extent, of representing the country abroad, and it is important that the navy's representatives should be men of at least refinement. While there are perhaps a certain few among the warrant officers who could fulfill this requirement, I am of the opinion that the vast majority of them could not."

"Once they are commissioned they will have the same social standing as other officers, and no distinction properly could be made in extending general invitations. The consequences that would arise from their acceptance might not redound to the credit of the navy or the country which the navy represents."

"I do not mean to detract from the sterling worth of the warrant officers of the navy; I merely mean to suggest to the department that, unfortunately for them, they have been deprived of certain natural advantages and in consequence their proper place is that of leading men among the crew, and not as representatives of the country in the wardrobe and steerage."

Since July 4, 1898 the relations between Admirals Sampson and Schley or at least between their respective admirals have not been very cordial and this unfortunate break on the part of Sampson has been made most of. It is recalled that Paul Jones, Decatur, Stockton, Porter and Farragut were not graduates from the naval academy, but promoted from the lowest places. It will be noted that Sampson makes exceptions to the general rule he has written and that Morgan is one of them. But the papers generally condemn him as an aristocratic martinet. It is worth while however to record what Paul Jones has written on this same subject. Sampson seems to have distinguished backing.

"It is by no means enough that an officer of the navy should be a capable mariner. He should be as well a gentleman of liberal education, refined manners, punctilious courtesy, and the nicest sense of personal

honor. "The naval officer should be familiar with the principles of international law, and the general practice of admiralty jurisprudence, because such knowledge may often, when cruising at a distance from home, be necessary to protect his flag from insult or his crew from imposition or injury in foreign ports."

"He should also be cognizant with the usages of diplomacy and capable of maintaining, if called upon, a dignified and judicious diplomatic correspondence; because it often happens that sudden emergencies in foreign waters make him the diplomatic as well as the military representative of his country."

"In his intercourse with subordinates he should ever maintain the attitude of the commander."

"His authority when off shore being necessarily absolute, the crew should be as one man impressed that the captain, like the sovereign, can do no wrong."

"But part, and often an important part, of his career must be in port or on duty ashore. Here he must be of affable temper and be master of civilities."

"In old-established navies, like, for example, those of Britain and France, generations are bred and specially educated to the duties and responsibilities of officers. In the land forces generals may and sometimes do rise from the ranks; but I have not yet heard of an admiral coming ashore from the forecastle."

"In all my wide acquaintance with the merchant service I can now think of but three competent master mariners who made their first appearance on board ship through the hawse-hole, as the saying is."

"The navy is essentially and necessarily aristocratic. True as may be the political principles for which we are now contending, they can never be practically applied or even admitted on board ship."

The New York Times sums up its comments thus:

"The papers and politicians that aim at popularity with the untutored and unintelligent are indulging in frenzied denunciation of the officer who dared to speak of refinement and social graces as necessary qualifications for the holding of naval commissions, while calmer critics admit the general truth of what the admiral said, and object chiefly to his failure to recognize the fact that there are exceptions to every rule and that the innovation he opposes was designed to turn one class of exceptions to good account."

SEEK IMMIGRANTS.

Last week a paragraph pointed to the necessity of organized effort looking toward advertising Washington county and turning immigrants this way. This is still further emphasized when the following article published in a Benton county paper is read. What is necessary for that county is doubly necessary for us, for if Benton county attracts the new comer thither we must do as much to acquire him with our attractions, and a little more to counteract what our neighbors further up the valley have done. The Corvallis Times reasons thus in favor of organized action.

The meeting for perfecting an organization devoted to the development of Corvallis and Benton county happens at the court house tonight. It is the duty of everyone to attend. The presence of large numbers rather than of a limited few lends enthusiasm and encourages those who are going forward with the movement. Every absentee, by his failure to attend, throws the weight of his influence, unintentionally perhaps, against the movement. The mere presence of each one that shall attend is a vote for progress and better conditions. No property owner, no business man, no citizen, can afford to allow this movement to suffer, drop or lag, by inattention or lack of sympathy and generous encouragement.

In a nutshell, the whole question is, do we want to go ahead, or do we want to stand still? Do we want that unity of purpose and concentration of effort that is sure to bring success; or do we want the division, inharmonious and cross-purpose that insure stagnation and paralysis? Which do we want?

No harm was done two years ago when Judge Lake, of Multnomah county was legislated out of office, but there is an outrage this year when he is legislated back into office. Two of the county commissioners refuse to recognize County Judge Lake and threaten to set up a rump court. There are politicians in Portland who badly need reconstruction.

Mrs. Nation, the saloon snorter was tried before a jury last Monday for rioting. The jury hung and was finally discharged. It is said by word of mouth that Mrs. Nation stood 7 to 5 for conviction. Mrs. Nation was returned to jail but was released on bail furnished by her brother.

Four million is an important industry in Jerusalem. The wheat used is obtained from the valley of the Jordan and from Samaria.

England has returned an answer to the Hay-Pauncefote Nicaragua treaty. That government refuses to approve the U. S. senate amendment permitting the United States to fortify the Nicaragua canal. The public press of England has intimated that the amendment would be ratified if our government would order to England a seaport in Alaska. Now the INDEPENDENT has been radical about the fortification of the canal, and has thought the better policy would be for England and the United States to guarantee its neutrality, but when England demands a port in Alaska a horse of another color marches out of the chapeau. If the Clayton-Bulwer treaty hinders the free action of our government then let us at once abrogate the thing. We can do now what would have been inconvenient in 1850, when Clayton made that little agreement with Bulwer.

Venezuela's press and public men continue to assail the Americans. Something of the Venezuelan spirit actuates many of the Cubans. The United States has rendered almost as great a service to Venezuela as it has to Cuba. In fact, the United States has aided, directly or indirectly, all the peoples of Central and South America. All of them have, with one exception, assailed the United States at one time or another. Are the Mexicans the only Latin-Americans who understand the meaning of the thing called gratitude?

The business done by the congress just adjourned is shown in a supplement to the house calendar prepared by Tully Clerk Wakefield, of the house staff. The congress was in session 197 days, which is less than any congress for years. The following is given of bills, acts, etc. Number of bills, 14,336; number of reports, 3,009; public acts, 345; private acts, 1,250; total acts, 1,595; number of joint resolutions, 393. The congress of course includes the two sessions commencing December 1899, and ending March 4, 1901.
