All persons having anything to sell or expect to ever sell ought to join in this effort to attract buyers to Washington county. Ordered that no premium be offered or any fees be charged at this first meeting, relying purely on patriotism and the pleasure received from the great st. benefits from judicious advertising.

BEAVERTON.

Beaverton is booming at present, because everybody is rushed with work. New buildings are going up and newcomers are locating here.

Mrs. Hornbuckle's new residence, a neat little cottage is completed. Mr. G. W. Hughson's house caught fire last Friday noon but was discovered before great damage was done.

Arbor Day exercises were held at the school house Friday afternoon, and were well attended. The school room was tastefully decorated with flowers and green boughs. The program was rendered in a manner that reflected credit on the scholars and teachers.

At the "pie social," given by the Y. P. S. C. E. of this place at Morton's Hall, Wednesday night, the hall was crowded and all had a merry time in singing, playing games and partaking of pie.
Last Saturday a mass meeting was

held here with Mr. Brischel, of Elk City as the central figure, for considering the project of installing a creamery and cheese factory. Satisfaction progress was made indeed to the extent to justify steps being taken to secure buildings for the plant.

SCHOLARS ITEMS.

The stockholders have sold their interest in the hall to the Artisans. Preston Skeels has moved in his new house.

Mr. J. Frost and family started east Tuesday by team.

The Red Cross people are doing some hard rustling to start a lodge here.

Plowing and seeding are in full blast here and farmers all look happy.

Mr. Ed Sathriand has moved his family here from McMinnville.

The onion men are all busy planting onion seed.

For 1200 a plant can be installed in Hillsboro that will furnish employment for 75 to 100 operatives for 12 months in the year. We have with us a skilled artisan for superintending and all the raw material. The finished product is in demand and being more sought every day. From the first small beginning the enterprise will expand till a \$100,000 plant will be required. In building the large concern the product of the small will be used. The industry in mind is a vitrified tile plant where flat tile vitrified brick and all clay building ornaments are to be made. The demand for these things is not to be satisfied except by importations at fancy prices. Yet they can be made here. The clay is at hand though it must be properly mixed for satisfactory results. But the skill for the proper blending is here. Fuel of the best grade is at hand and cheap. For the roasting ovens nothing surpasses our fir wood cut out of large timber. There is a vitrified paving brick factory now in operation on the Columbia River near Vancouver that is turning out paving brick of a superior quality. A sample of its brick is that part of Washington street between Front and First, Portland which has been down for three years. Examination by an engineer this spring shows that the wear of three years traffic has only been one per cent, thus requiring 300 years before the pavement will be worn out. This economy in wear makes a demand for brick. The Portland Company will welcome another factory, and signify a willingness to put sample adobe into their kilns for the purpose of testing our clay. If our men having capital will invest in this clay industry there will profit come to them and to the city.

As stated before the State Fair management offers a prize of \$500 to the county making an exhibit that is adjudged to be best in excellence. Washington county has material which if assembled would be adjudged best. All that is lacking is to have one or two men to prepare the exhibit. It is proposed to assist the collectors by securing subscriptions, a bonus of at least \$100 to be returned to subscribers if the exhibit obtains first prize. The railroad company will carry all county exhibits free. By commencing now, the county agents can secure all material in its season. As an advertising proposition a successful exhibit will be worth to the county many times its cost. Here is an opportunity for some one to make \$500 this summer without having to work very hard. N. H. Jones, of Pumpkin ridge spent a day in town recently. He has been in the logging camps of the Columbia where great logs are put in the water. One log was pulled out of the woods that contained 17,000 feet of lumber. Some of the poles are 110 feet long and 8 feet in diameter. These sticks are "logged" with donkey engines.

Mr. D. will be here for a month or more and perhaps permanently since he left no valuables at the old home.
