MISSIONARY LOOTING.

Mark Twain himself ought to be satisfied with the information made by Minister Conger relative to the reported looting in China by the missionaries. There simply has been no looting by the Christians. What part they have had in the Chinese disturbances brings no gain to themselves but did serve the cause of humanity and will be approved by their entire body of countrymen excepting only the bigots. Minister Conger's paragraph reads: "There were really no acts on the part of the missionaries there that were not entirely justified when the circumstances are known. The missionaries did not loot. They found 2000 destitute men and women on their hands. There was no government, no organized authority. There were houses of men who had been firing on the foreign quarter, directing the attacking leaders of the Boxers; their property had been abandoned as a result of the state of war, and it was taken in order to succor hundreds of suffering and destitute Chinese whose lives the original owners had been laboring to destroy. Winter was coming on and measures of some kind were imperative and the appropriation of property for the ends in view was unquestionably justified. That, briefly was the situation. I am prepared to justify the conduct of the American missionaries before the siege, during the siege and after the siege."

"WHERE ROLLS THE OREGON."

At a banquet given by Hon. H. W. Corbett in Portland last Wednesday evening attended by the commissioners of Oregon and Washington, a name was chosen for the exposition to be held in Portland in 1905. It is "The Lewis & Clark Centennial and American Pacific Exposition." The trade mark is "Where rolls the Oregon" to be used on all literature connected with the exposition. The quotation is a half line from William Cullen Bryant's "Thanatopsis" written at the age of 18 years, in 1812 only 7 years after Lewis and Clark explored the Oregon country.

Bank examiner Maxwell closed the Vancouver, Wash., National Bank last Saturday. The president of the bank was Charles Brown and the cashier, E. L. Canby. These men seem to have been the sole managers of the institution. Maxwell discovered on Friday what was wrong though up to this time he refuses to tell what it is. It is surmised that it was false entries in the books made with intent to deceive. Brown and Canby left the bank Friday evening together and as since developed went directly out of town a few hundred feet, where they sat down on the ground, Canby leaning against a stump and Brown against a bunch of hazel brush. Canby placed the pistol in his mouth and fired. Brown then reached forward took the same weapon placed the muzzle in his own mouth and fired the second shot. Both men were found dead with feet almost touching. Canby was 62 years old and Brown a few years older. Thus two bank wreckers hurry across the river.

A National Exposition is to be held in Portland in 1905 to commemorate the Lewis & Clark exploration one hundred years ago. Gov. Geer has already appointed five commissioners who are to be the preliminary committee of arrangements. The first work the commission will do is to choose a name for the exposition. Many cognomens have been proposed already. The last is "The Oregon Centennial." This is a good designation if it is enough to suggest the region known as "Oregon" when Lewis & Clark was here in 1805. The fear is that only the present boundaries will be read, in which case the nation character of the enterprise will be dwarfed to that of a state affair. In 1805, Oregon was Idaho, Washington, some of Montana as well as the present state of that name.

The Wilsonville correspondent voices a fact which emphasizes anew what has been known before, that the westerners are a restless folk. The young men, natives of Wilsonville are leaving home and seeking employment in more sparsely settled counties. This is not because they are unable to get employment at home, for there is work to be done there. Immigrants from Nebraska and Kansas are doing it. The Oregon youth will, when increased expenses are met, have no more savings than they could have at home, but

the spirit of adventure so often found with the young of the west is more nearly satisfied when the restraints of home are thrown off.

Gilbert's bank at Salem, a private institution has suspended payments. The business world at Salem is not much affected, though time depositors have money tied up, the Gilberts doing a savings bank business rather than pure commercial. The cause of the closing is said to be the run commenced by depositors because of a suit that had been commenced by the heirs of the Cooper estate to compel an accounting of funds by Gilbert who had the handling of the estate. Hon. Tilmon Ford is concerned in the litigation.
