Mr. Rasmus Pearson, a successful farmer at Raleigh in the eastern part of the county, was in town Tuesday last. He reports that crops in his neighborhood are making a fine growth. This is especially true of clover fields that were seeded last year. Old clover meadows though are dead.

Mr. Jacob A. Riss' autobiography, published under the significant title, "The Making of an American," in The Outlook, continues to attract attention and forms one of the most popular serial features ever published in that periodical. The installment contained in the May magazine number dwells in a somewhat humorous way on many incidents and adventures which befell the young Dutch immigrant in his attempt to gain a foothold in America. U. S. McHargue, who has caused so much wrangling in the Reedville school district did not attempt to get a certificate in this county, but went to Clackamas county where one was granted as appears from the report of the examination printed in the Oregon City Enterprise of April 26. A primary certificate from the same county was granted to A. D. McHargue. It is supposed that this is Alice D. sister of U. S. Both applicants are of Portland. From which it would appear that Mr. McHargue plans to take the advice given to him recently in the Oregonian and shake the dust of this county from his shoes.

Hon. John C. Trullinger died at his home in Astoria last Sunday after a brief illness. Trullinger was a son of an elder in the Christian church who came to Oregon in 1852 and was well known in Clackamas county, though his son John had come earlier, being of the immigration of 1848. John C. wedded Miss Hannah Byles in 1853. For several years thereafter he owned the Oswego water power in Clackamas county and operated a sawmill. He also built a sawmill on Fanno creek near the present Tigardville in this county. Afterwards he built and operated a flouring mill at Centerville, north of Cornelius. But before going to Centerville he designed and secured a patent on a water wheel known as the "Trullinger Turbine." This he took to Boston, Mass., where he superintended its building. In a contest at Lowell, where all the water wheels in the country were entered, his wheel was adjudged to be the best. A large foundry and machine shop offered him a half interest if he would assign to the company his patents. Mr. Trullinger agreed to the proposition and returned to Oregon for the purpose of disposing of his interests here so that he could go east and devote his entire attention to manufacturing. His wife objected to leaving Oregon where he abandoned the project and later invested in Astoria property. At first he engaged in manufacturing lumber. Afterward when one of his sons had graduated in an electrical engineering course, he obtained a franchise for wiring the city and installed an electric lighting plant. His power house is a model. The foundation for his heavy machines is concrete the building of brick solid and substantial. Competition with the gas plant was so active that the gas people proposed about four years ago to sell out to him. He bought and at the time of his death had a property bringing an income of about \$4000 per month. In the industries Trullinger was a leader, but his taste for public affairs remained dormant. However, he served one term as mayor of Astoria and one term in the state legislature. His wife and several sons and two daughters survive him, the eldest being the wife of Gov. T. T. Geer. The girls were well known by the Hillsboro women who were here twenty five years ago when they all attended school together in the old school house that stood on the corner of Third and Baseline streets.

Sam'l Gates came home from Portland last Saturday sick with the measles.

Jacob, aged 12 years, second son of Grant Holcomb, who lives near Lenox postoffice died last Saturday morning after a brief illness of four days. The lad was in town on Sunday and on Monday drove a team hitched to a harrow till noon. In the afternoon the lad could not go to the field being disabled by a high fever. When the doctor was called next day, he found a very bad case of scarlet fever, complicated with a diphtheric condition of the throat. With such complications the dangerous nature of the disease could not be controlled and the patient died Saturday morning. The funeral was on Sunday. It is not thought that diphtheria will be communicated to others but the virulent form of scarlet fever is contagious.

The county has bought a rock crusher for the northeast part of the county and it is being installed at Cedar Mills. It is crushing rock or about ready to begin. How has the road been prepared to receive it? Is the road permanently located? Has a grade been established? Have the sharp hills been graded down and the dirt been filled into the gulches and low places? Has the road been rounded up to a width of 45 feet, and above all, has the road bed been under-drained and all ponds of water by the side drained? Without this initial preparation any rock-crushing of the surface will be disappointing. Some of the Cedar Mills road has years ago been cross laid with rails. These ought all to be taken out before any rock is spread. Our supervisor does not want to repeat the experiment of a Multnomah supervisor made about 12 years ago. He spread his rock on cross laid rails and it never did form. Every time a wheel passed over a rail, it tilted and loosened the rock covering. This was particularly true during the summer. The rock was pushed off into the gutter. If a proper foundation receives the top dressing of rock a road will be built every way satisfactory and one that will cost only a trifle to maintain.

A Hiramian act has commenced injunction proceedings against the city government of Forest Grove to prevent the city from contracting with Hon. E. W. Haines to furnish power and operate the city light and water plant. The motion for a temporary injunction will be argued before Judge McBride tomorrow at Oregon City. If the temporary injunction is allowed the contractor, Mr. Haines will probably have to disconnect his wires when the service will be continued from the city's power house as heretofore, but if the temporary injunction is denied, Mr. Haines will continue to furnish juice and the big fight for a perpetual injunction will be made at the July term of the Circuit Court. Messrs. Langley & Son and Williams Wood and Linthicum are plaintiffs' attorneys and Hon. Thos. H. Tongue and S. B. Huston are for defendant. The papers in the proceedings were drawn before Mr. Haines commenced the service under his contract, but they were not served till afterward, the plaintiff supposing no doubt that making the change from one system to the other would take more time.

A churning of 150 pounds of butter was turned out at the Eugene creamery yesterday. C. M. Elspass informs us that four churns will be made this week but as the routes for gathering cream have been nicely established and the pasturage throughout the country is becoming more luxuriant, churning, beginning with next Monday, will be held daily. A wagon for the Creswell route was put on yesterday. J. E. Noland, of that city, will have charge of the route in the Creswell neighborhood. Cream will be shipped from that point to the creamery. One wagon now makes the Coburg country, another makes the Bailey Hill and Pleasant Hill neighborhoods. Mr. Elspass will put on two more wagons as soon as he can map out the routes, one to ply between Coburg and Harrisburg, and the other to cover the territory beyond Coburg. Mr. Elspass says he is now being supplied with "milk of the first water," and that he will soon be making butter on a large scale. Eugene Register. Mr. Elspass was here last summer with the money in his pocket for a creamery at Hillsboro. He proposed to send his own teams to the farmers' doors for the cream but he got no encouragement hence he went elsewhere. The above paragraph tells where. It all will be as prompt to notify us in other lines as the cattlemen it is confidently believed by us that all can be accommodated. The sheep men ought to speak up. We have set our audience at between 8,000 or 10,000 people from every where. We have the promise of business men, dealers and others sufficient to load two coaches from Portland.

During last Saturday McQuillan, of Farmington superintendent of sheep regaled the secretary with a story of having four generations of jersey cattle culled to him in three years and he is going to show them all in line. In a conversation with Fred Hamel, living some four miles east of Hillsboro, he wanted it distinctly understood that their neighborhood had cows for blood and producers that they could and would show against anyone. Hesse notified us that he would be in with sheep against the world. Also it was told that Dr. Nicolls, man living on the old D. K. Bills place had the largest back in Oregon and his ewes were one-third larger than common claimers to be mutton sheep. He is reported as going to show.

The church women are going to give a big chicken dinner in the Grange Hall on the day of our festival and probably have some ice cream stands in court yard square, the chicken dinner together with our two most excellent hotels and other caravansaries it is thought will be ample to feed all who come.

A good joke is told on the creameries. Mrs. Scheffelin out of the goodness of her heart said to the church ladies on chicken dinner that she would donate some butter if they would tell where it came from. McQuillan of Farmington creamery and Schulmerich of South Tualatin creamery rather thought that President Scheffelin was not sprouting angel wings in the matter and the two creameries offered to furnish butter also if the church people would furnish cards bearing their company sign. The women sent back word, certainly gentlemen let every creamery name the color of their cards.

Mr. W. E. Thorne will show Chinese Phases: ts and wood ducks. A gentleman whose name is lost will show split cedar posts and shingles. From inquiries there is many farmers would like to know where they split cedar posts can be had.

Any person that has stuff to sell or show and does not will show their lack of good judgment, so they will be in it, too. We will soon get together and clean up and fix for the accommodation. Hillsboro will be ready.

On Tuesday a man hailing from Albany got off the train complaining of feeling sick and beginning to break out with an eruption. Dr. Bailey of this place examined the man and pronounced it a case of smallpox. The man whose name is Dyer, and is traveling for the Chicago Art Company went on to Portland Dr. Bailey phoned to county physician McKay and City physician Zan of Portland to look out for the man and he was run into the pest house in Portland on Wednesday. The case was not a severe one, but precautions were necessary to prevent the spread of the disease.

Notwithstanding the fact that Minnesota is running potatoes into San Francisco, that Yakama is taking care of the Seattle market and that Eastern Oregon is trying to cover up Portland dealers, the price is 75 to 80 cents per sack for choice lots is offered in Hillsboro this week. There are a few jancie lots in this county but they are held for \$1.00. This is a little dangerous at this date and especially when outsiders are competing in our market. Dealers are a little uncertain of their standing room seeing that potatoes are coming Eastern Oregon. This is the first season that shipments have come from that potato patch and it is not known how big it is or how many it produced.

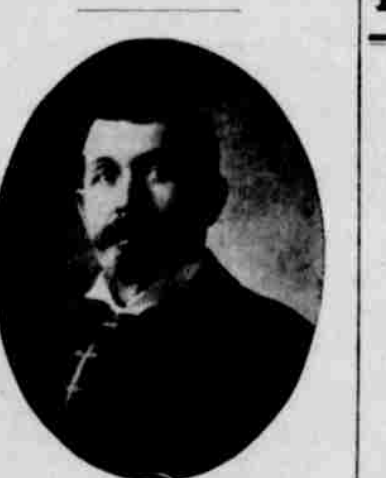
