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The following is the proposition passed by the city council at its last meeting:

Resolved, That, whereas, the franchise granted by the town council of the town of Hillsboro, Washington county, Oregon, to H. V. Gates on July 7, 1891, to put in and maintain water works and electric light plant in said Hillsboro, Oregon, will expire on July 7, 1901;

And, whereas, the contract entered into by and between H. V. Gates and the said town of Hillsboro on July 13, 1891, will also expire on July 13, 1901.

Now, therefore, be it resolved that an ordinance be drawn authorizing the city council of the city of Hillsboro, Oregon, to grant to said H. V. Gates, or the Hillsboro Electric Light & Water Co., a franchise for the term of five years from 1901, to furnish water and light to said city of Hillsboro on the following terms, viz:

1. To maintain 13 arc lights.
2. To maintain 2 more hydrants in addition to the number now maintained.
3. Lights to run from twilight until midnight, except three days before, on, and one day after day of full moon in each month, if the weather be clear.
4. If said city fails to purchase the plant of said Electric Light & Water Co., or to renew the franchise at the end of the said five years it to forfeit the \$10,000 bond, and this contract to expire by limitation at the end of said period of five years.
5. The said city to pay \$100.00 per month for the arc lights, and to have water furnished free for hydrants for fire purposes.

The regular bills were audited.
