We would suggest to all of our readers who visit the Carnival at Portland, or the Street Fair at The Dalles, that they should not fail to take advantage of this opportunity to take a trip on the Bailey Gatzert, between Portland and the Dalles, the scenic route of the Columbia River.

Horse racing, unaccompanied by the gambling fraternity, is the greatest and most exciting of sports. This objectionable feature will not be present at the carnival racing. There will be no pool selling and the management is laboring hard to make this a success. A race with lady riders certainly should be a drawing card and worth seeing.

The Native Daughters want to make a display at the Carnival, the week after next, of Old Pioneer Belles, Canned Fruits and Fancy Work. Friends in the city or country who are interested in the Carnival, are asked to loan articles for this exhibit and leave the same at the residence of J. W. Sewell on Main St., Hillsboro, where they will be well cared for and placed on exhibition.

Mrs. Atkinson who carries the mail between Hillsboro and Laurel, was on Monday last, thrown from her buggy and somewhat bruised about her head and shoulders, but the worst hurt was the dislocation of the bones of the left arm at the elbow. Dr. Bailey was the surgeon who reduced the dislocation. He says it will be some weeks before Mrs. Atkinson will have perfect use of her arm. The cause of the stampeding of the horse was a ring of yellow jackets.

The Great Carnival, which opens at Portland on September 19th and continues until October 19th, 1901, will be well worth a visit to the metropolis. Exhibits of agricultural and horticultural products, milking and manufacturing industries, athletic exercises, a horse show at which feats of horsemanship and the various forms of fancy riding will be seen, and a magnificent military tournament, participated in by picked companies from the Oregon National Guard, are a few of the attractions at the Carnival this year. The Southern Pacific Co. will sell tickets at low rates for this occasion, and will also run a special excursion from Ashland to Portland and return, stopping at all intermediate stations, the date and rates for which will be announced hereafter.

A complaint was filed in the Justice Court, this week charging Mr. Ferd Groner with a violation of the game laws. Mr. Groner has been, so it is alleged, shooting birds out of season. He has not yet been arrested for the reason that he is out of the state, visiting the Buffalo Exposition. He, however, has been expecting the commencement of the action and said that he would defend in the courts below and if beaten, take an appeal to the Supreme Court. It is reported that many violations of the law have occurred in this County where the officers are correspondingly busy. Who it is that are thus commanded to perform this duty is pointed out in section 19, of the game law, which reads, "It shall be the duty of every sheriff, deputy sheriff and constable, within the state of Oregon, to enforce all laws for the protection of game, game birds, song birds and forests, within their respective Counties. In the performance of such duties, they shall be subject to the direction and control of the game and forestry warden."

This latter bequest is in recognition of the kindness and attention bestowed upon her mother during her last illness, also watch and chain. Annie Schulmerich wife of Wm. Schulmerich 7 1/2 shares in Hillsboro Electric Light & Water Co., in recognition of kindness and attention shown his deceased wife during her last illness. Josie Schulmerich, daughter, \$3000. Etta Schulmerich, daughter, \$3000. Tualatin Lodge, No. 6, A. F. of A. M., 4 shares stock in Building Association the revenue therefrom to be used for relief of distressed Master Masons, their widows and orphans.

To daughters, Maggie, Josie and Etta household goods in equal shares. Remainder of estate goes to. Executors for debts and expenses of administration and legacies. Edward Schulmerich is made trustee to collect rents from brick building on Block 7. These rents are to be used in making necessary repairs and the balance is to be paid to Herman and George Schulmerich. Directs that a monument to cost not to exceed \$500 be erected over grave of dec'd wife. Directs that Edward and William Schulmerich pay \$1000 per year each, to be applied to pay debts which may be due at time of death, 2, expenses of administration, 3, payment of legacies. The legacies are to be paid in this order. James Stephens, Kate Burkhalter, Maggie Schulmerich, Josie Schulmerich and Etta Schulmerich. But none of these until the legatee shall have reached the age of 25 years. Edward and William Schulmerich sons, are named as executors to serve without bonds. Date of Will Nov. 2, 1900.

Memorial services, commemorative of the life and work of President McKinley were held in the Congregational church last Sunday evening. The large auditorium was filled to its utmost capacity with an audience of earnest citizens who gave closest attention to every word uttered. The speakers participating were Rev. H. Oberg, of the M. E. church, Rev. E. P. Hughes, of the Congregational church, Hon. S. B. Huston ex State Senator and Hon. Thos. H. Tongue, Congressman from the First District of Oregon. The service was simple but impressive by its very simplicity. Pastor Hughes presided. Rev. Oberg read the scripture lesson and led in prayer. The first hymn sung was "Nearer My God to Thee." Mr. Huston reviewed the life and character of the dead president as it appeared to a student at a distance through the public prints. Congressman Tongue told of the president as he had personally known him. Rev. Oberg spoke of the president as a Christian. At the time of arranging for the Sunday evening services it was not known that the governor would set aside Thursday, Sept. 13, for holding memorial services, hence, the Sunday evening service was allowed to stand for the Thursday service. The business houses of the city and the county offices were draped in mourning and closed for the day.

Frank Jones in the employ of his uncle, Alex Gordon, of Glenwood, was severely injured last Wednesday in a runaway at the wheat warehouse of Mr. Milne's mill. Portland Carnival's Brilliant Array of Attractions.

Never in the history of the Northwest have the people been offered such enjoyable entertainment mingled with useful instruction as will be laid before them during the month of the Portland Carnival, which will be held in the great Exposition building from Sept. 18 to Oct. 19, and also in the beautiful Multnomah Field adjoining. The Committee of representative business men having the carnival in charge have already made contracts involving the expenditure of \$50,000 to make the Carnival a success. On the music and amusement alone there will be \$13,000 expended and the other appropriations will be in proportion for the Horse Show and the Grand Military Tournament and the Athletic Exercises, etc.

These figures will give people an idea of the grandeur and immensity of the Carnival, which will be illuminated with 3500 electric lights. The music by two full military bands will be grand, and there will not be a dull moment, afternoon or evening. There will be a reproduction of Multnomah Falls in the Exposition Building, a big working Mining Exhibit, a German Village, a showing of all the products of the Northwest, and many other sights to see. All railroad and steamboat lines will sell excursion tickets to the Carnival, good for 7 days, at one and one-third fare for the round trip. People who miss the Portland Carnival will miss a grand event.
