AN ILLUSTRATION OF TWO.

A correspondent asks "Why we of Oregon should be anxious about the provisions of a reciprocity treaty with France? France has no products to compete with Oregon exports unless it be prunes and our prune crop is so small that the State could be slightly affected." Admitted France has wishes to send to America. Remit the duty and two fundamental republican tariff ideas are set at naught—import a duty on luxuries imported and on articles that come in competition with domestic production. California raises grapes that are made into wines and raisins. Destroy the eastern market by importing French wines and raisins and the California industry is ruined. The California tracts of land devoted to grape culture does not come in competition with Washington County farms. But these tracts are owned by enterprising Americans who will find another crop than grapes. Suppose it is grain and hay. Then our farmer has competition. The supply is greater and the over-production has to be worked off at reduced figures. Thus the correspondent can see that it is to the interest of Oregonians to have Californians raise crops that cannot be grown here. This is but one illustration. There are other ways that can be worked out the same way. Barley is one. Mississippi states barley to acre to oats here. But if Canadian barley is admitted free by a reciprocity treaty, the Dakota, Minnesota and Nebraska farmers might quit sowing barley and devote their acres to oats. We already know how such oats compares with us in the Philippine trade.

THE SLOWPOKE WORKINGMAN.

What is true of the painter, printer and bricklayer is equally true in nearly all of the mechanical trades. The result is that a very considerable number of the members of trades unions who would be able to find employment under a system of classification, according to their capacity are only occasionally employed or not employed at all because they are members of the union. As union men they cannot work for less than the scale and they cannot get employment at the scale because they are not able to earn as much for their employer as the quick, bright men in their trade. If they were not union men they could work at any price they choose to accept. Hence this class of men drops out of the unions to join the ranks of the independent workmen who cannot afford to remain in the union and see their families starve. This is a very serious source of weakness to organized labor and will grow worse unless the unions drop the idea that all men are created equal and should have equal pay for an unequal day's work. The employers of labor are not all philanthropists. There are very few employers who are willing to hire a slowpoke when they can get active men who will double the capacity for work at the same price. But the slowpokes must live. They ought to have recognition and protection in the trades unions; they ought to have an opportunity to belong to the unions and yet work for less per hour and per day than the men that can do twice as much work in the same time.—Tillamook Headlight.

Let us not get muddy about our rights in the Philippines. We either have a fee simple title or no title. We are either sovereign there or usurpers, with the sovereignty resting in another nation. But to question our title or our sovereignty is absurd. Being sovereign we have a right to promote government, civilization or commerce in any direction. Therefore we have a right to send a telegraph cable or to grant it franchise to a private citizen. If we have a right to start out of San Francisco Harbor with a cable, to touch at Honolulu and Guam, we have a right to land at any harbor in Luzon or any other island of the Philippine group.

If Platt is a boss in New York, I would want that, with Roosevelt as president, Woodard governor of New York and Low master of the city, his lines are not strings that will lead far toward the control of a big machine.

Miss Stone who is a prisoner held by Baudilla in Bulgaria, is an American citizen and as such may properly claim the protection of the U. S. government. By no means does she forfeit that guardian care by her occupation which is that of a Christian missionary teacher. She did not go to Bulgaria to do her work, but to Turkey with which government we have a treaty permitting our citizens to reside there and teach. Her calling is recognized as legal. Subjects of Bulgaria crossed the line and kidnapped Miss Stone. Bulgaria as one of the family of Nations is bound to maintain good order and justice among its subjects—and it may not permit any of them to do unlawful acts nor insult its neighbors which has been done to Turkey. Hence, Bulgaria is responsible to Turkey for this unlawful act, and our government may properly hold Turkey in a demand for the person of Miss Stone. It is proper to reject the demand for a ransom of \$150,000 or any other sum. Long before the publishing of the Monroe doctrine it was written "Millions for defense but not a cent for tribute, not a cent for a cent." The Bulgarian government may not be liable for damages for the acts of its lawless population, but it is bound to produce the kidnapped person of Miss Stone.

The Portland city council last week passed an ordinance repealing a perpetual franchise given 20 or more years ago to the North Pacific Terminal Company allowing that corporation to use a part of North Front street for railroad purposes. Mayor Rowe has vetoed the ordinance. The council it seems, is working at cross purposes. New franchises are granted for a term of 25 to 30 years only and then only to favor interested parties. The N. P. railroad wanted a right of way through Front street and it was thought that the repeating of the old right was for the purpose of granting a new right to the N. P. Co. The mayor evidently thought that the old company is as good as the new. The council is refusing a franchise to the Washington County motor line. Can it be that the standard gauge cars are thrusting their fingers in the pie?

The San Francisco teamsters strike has been settled. The union men are at liberty to seek jobs wherever they can be had of the employers association. Competent free labor that has been engaged during the strike is not to be discharged or otherwise disturbed. But the fly in the ointment is that "competent" condition. The dock men and stevedores of Port Costa refuse to return to work. They are offered 30 cents per hour for 10 hours. They demand 30 cents for 9 hours and 40 cents for all over time.
