THE FATHER OF TRUSTS.

Some of our influential journals are charging that the present tariff is the father of trusts. Some prices are quoted with a view of creating opposition to the tariff. For instance it is stated that when the Dingley law was passed steel billets were selling for \$15 per ton, now they sell for \$26. Steel rails \$19, now \$28. Common granulated sugar \$4.47 per sack of 100 pounds, now \$5.87; lead \$8.61 now \$4.37, tin plates \$3.70 now \$4.20; salt \$4.50 per ton now \$19. Assuming that these quotations are correct and that the increased cost is due to monopolies aided by the revenue laws may we not enquire how much the tariff has had to do with the increase of price?

The Democratic party has championed the cause of free trade and has enacted its idea of tariff legislation in the act commonly called the Wilson bill. That was the law when the low prices above quoted prevailed. According to the tariff reformers of today that law was responsible for those low prices. Let us compare. When steel billets sold for \$15 the tariff imposed by the Wilson Act was 36 per cent. That imposed by the Dingley Act, the law now in force when the price is \$26 is the same 36. If foreigners could import under the Wilson act and keep down the price why do they stay out now seeing the duty is the same? The Wilson duty on steel rails was \$7.84 per ton so is the duty by the Dingley law. How, then does the tariff now give excuse for enhancing the price when it did not then. The price of sugar then was \$4.47 with a duty of 50 cents per sack and now \$5.87 with 95 cents duty only 12 cents increase but the price of sugar has increased \$1.40. Why cannot importers pay the 45 cents increase of duties and still make 95 cents profit or at least compel the American refiners to sell at \$4.92 which is the sum of the added tariff and the price of 1894. Tin plates sold under the Wilson tariff for \$3.70 with a tariff of \$0.12 per pound. The Dingley tariff is only three-tenths of one cent higher but the selling price of the tin is 50 cents higher. Why cannot foreigners afford to import and pay the three-tenths? The tariff on salt was 8 cents per 100 pounds by the Wilson bill and that is the tariff now. But the price of that necessity was kept down to \$4.50 by foreign imports, says the free traders. Now it is kept up to \$19 by the salt monopoly aided by that Dingley tariff of 8 cents per 100 pounds. The absurdity of the proposition is seen by the general reader and is now acknowledged by some of the organs of so called "tariff reform."

The truth of the matter is that those organs berating the great manufacturing and trade combines do so not to correct that evil but to cast odium on the present tariff revenue law. What ought to be done by those publicists, is to formalize public opinion with a rational and effective method of dealing with the monopolies that put up the price of commodities. The tariff is not responsible in every instance for trust prices. If however it is shown that it is, even for a single item, then let that item go on the free list.

The Republican party has suffered more from the assassination of its leaders called to the highest station than any other formed. In looking back over the line of martyrs the historian will be struck by the fact that all three, Lincoln, Garfield and McKinley, were sons of poverty who rose to eminence through the recognition of great qualities by their fellow-citizens. Lincoln was so poor that he had to educate himself; Garfield paid for his education by manual labor on the township and elsewhere; McKinley came from a long line of toilers, was too poor to obtain a college course and was compelled at an early age to earn his bread. All these men, great by nature's birthright though born in poverty, fell by the pistols of assassins. In a speech last week on these martyrs of American history, Gen. Grosvenor said: "The great men of today in politics, at the bar, on the bench, in the great railroad organizations of the country, in the mighty industrial field of our tremendous success, and in all the vast world of effort, mental and physical, in the United States and the men of grandeur, wealth and leadership, have come up from the humble walks of American boyhood."

Every observer of American affairs knows that, nine times in ten, the leading men in the country were originally poor boys. What, then,

is anarchism trying to accomplish by the assassination of these martyrs to the post of highest responsibility in the United States? Would they kill the spirit of ambition in the children born to poverty and let them follow the example of the Garfields, whose sole object was to display and murder? The common people, the toilers themselves, are the chief victims of anarchism, who object to American opportunity and the rise of any man to a higher station. There is something so demonic in anarchism, that it appeals to the mind by its possibilities of human depravity. The poor are the last who should listen to or tolerate it, for it substitutes malignant hate for the spirit of emulation and cheerful obedience to nature's law of labor.—Globe Democrat.

The tariff reformers ask that the tea tax be removed. By all means. Tea is on the free list of the Dingley Act and the tax of 10 cents per pound was put there by the act that imposed the war tax for carrying on the Spanish war in 1898. It is most repugnant to the republican idea of tariff taxation. The tax was imposed supposing that it would secure a better grade of tea for the use of the people, but it failed to meet expectations. Reduce the revenue by repealing the tax on a food product that is not grown in this country, but used universally by the people.
