EUROPEAN TRADE.

An Oregon paper points out that M. Leroy Benulis, a French writer who gathers statistics, has been giving advice to the United States—sound advice, comments our local authority to the effect that "if the United States persists in a policy that consists in developing to the utmost its own exports to Europe, and reducing as much as possible, its imports from there, vigorous opposition on the Continent, and perhaps in England, will result."

To prevent this, the author advises us to buy of Europe, which reminds the INDEPENDENT of a little story. Some years ago when beef on foot was cheaper than now, a farmer named Biglow sold a nice young beef to a butcher in La Fayette. Farmer Biglow happened into the market next day when the butcher pointed to the nice carcass and said, "I have bought of you and to trade more, can't you buy something of me? You know we have to make one hand wash the other."

"Well, I don't know. I do want a piece of fresh meat. You may give me that fore shoulder and credit its value to my account." At the first of the next month, Biglow received a statement showing that he owed the butcher a balance of \$2.40. It was a paralyzer. The value of his bullock and coin besides was represented in that fore quarter. Biglow at once saw that he could not long afford to trade with the butcher.

So in this instance, if we have to buy of Europe what we can produce or make ourselves or buy manufactured stuffs that we may be able to sell our raw products, it would be better not to trade at all.

But it seems really silly to assert that we have more than we need for home consumption, may not sell to whomsoever we can induce to buy without being required to take in payment what we do not need because we are already supplied from home factory or farm,

**BRYAN AS A YELLOW JOURNALIST.**

The INDEPENDENT has always been opposed to Mr. Bryan's policies and has believed that his election would be disastrous to the country; yet it has always given him credit for being personally an honest man and has supposed that he was sincere in the views which he advocated in most respects although, as was believed, mistaken. There is sorrow though to be compelled to change this opinion in that regard. Mr. Bryan is the editor and proprietor of the Commoner and his present occupation is, writing editorials for that paper. He dislikes Henry Watterson, the editor of the Louisville Courier-Journal, because that paper did not support him in '96. When President McKinley was assassinated, Mr. Watterson wrote an editorial in which he said: "Is it not time that this brood of foreign riffraff and their domestic fellow conspirators who take refuge under our government in order to plan and direct destruction of all government, our own included, should be crushed?" Mr. Bryan in the Commoner says: "The Courier Journal, speaking of the assassination of President asks: 'Is it not time that this foreign riffraff and their democratic fellow conspirators who take refuge in our free government in order to plan the destruction of all government, should be crushed?' Mr. Watterson does not specify to what fellow democratic conspirators he refers, but other editorials which have appeared in his paper, suggest that he probably had in mind the 6,000,000 democrats who supported the ticket in 1896 when his influence was given to the republican party." It will be noticed that Mr. Bryan deliberately substitutes the word democratic for domestic and then makes it a text from which to abuse Mr. Watterson. This is the most shameless piece of editorial work which has ever come to the notice of the INDEPENDENT. It is unfortunate that Mr. Bryan did this. It is no credit to our country that aman who has been twice nominated by a great party for the highest office in the gift of the greatest nation on earth should descend to such miserable subterfuge as this in order to try to wreak vengeance upon a man who simply differed with him on the silver question. It is not plain how there can be an explanation of it consistent with honesty, but it would be well if it turns out that there is, if there was simply the quotatior with the word changed and nothing more, one might easily ascribe it to the typesetter or proof-reader; but the manner in which it is quoted, and the argument at-

tempted to be made from the forged quotation would seem to preclude any idea of such mistake. Anyone who will do this, no difference who he may be, puts himself outside the pale of decent society.

**VALUES THAT MUST ADVANCE.**

There is certain to be an advance in the price of land in the Willamette Valley. In Illinois, farming land sells at \$100 per acre; in Eastern Nebraska at \$60 per acre; and in Iowa at \$80 per acre. Not long ago a section of one land within three miles of Corvallis went for \$5,125 or a little over \$12 per acre. The Johnson Halfway tract of 320 acres within two and a half miles of Corvallis sold at something less than \$18 per acre. Prices like the latter in comparison with the \$100 per acre of Illinois and \$60 per acre of Nebraska are out of all proportion. The productiveness of the Oregon land is equally good and probably better than that of Illinois. The climate is far better, because Willamette has no dry winter, no torrid summer. Not infrequently Oregon pastures are green with grass in midwinter while those of Illinois are white and dress under a deep mantle of snow. For natural production of any kind of stock, the Willamette Valley, Illinois, or any other state in the Union, far in the rear.

Yet an acre of land in Illinois sells for so much money as four or six acres bring in Benton County. The values are awry. They are unbalanced and unstable. They are bound to adjust themselves. Values, like water, ultimately find their level. It is only a matter of time until Oregon lands will take their place in line with land values in other states. It will happen as soon as Eastern people learn generally of Oregon lands, their prices and their environments. When it does happen, not a few now eager to sell, will regret that their lands were not kept out of the market.—Corvallis Times.
