THANKSGIVING PROCLAMATION.

President Roosevelt, last Saturday, issued his proclamation, fixing Thursday, November 28, as a day of National Thanksgiving. It reads: "A Proclamation: The season is nigh, when, according to the time-hallowed custom of our people, the President appoints a day as the special occasion for praise and thanksgiving to God."

"This Thanksgiving finds the people still bowed with sorrow for the death of a great and good President. We mourn for President McKinley because we loved and honored him, and the manner of his death should awaken in the breasts of our people, a keen anxiety and a resolute purpose not to be driven by any calamity from the path of strong, orderly, popular liberty, which, as a Nation, we have thus far safely trod."

"Yet, in spite of this great disaster, it is nevertheless true that no people on earth have such abundant cause for thanksgiving as we have. The past year, in particular, has been one of peace and plenty. We have prospered in things material, and have been able to work for our uplifting in things intellectual and spiritual. Let us remember that, as much has been given us, much will be expected from us; and that true homage comes from the heart as well as from the lips and shows itself in deeds. We can best prove our thankfulness to the Almighty by the way in which, on this earth, and at this time, each of us does his duty to his fellow-men."

"Now, therefore, I, Theodore Roosevelt, President of the United States, do hereby designate as a day of general thanksgiving, Thursday, the 28th of this present November, and do recommend that throughout the land the people cease from their wonted occupations and at their several homes and places of worship, thank the Giver of all good for the countless blessings of our National life."

"In witness whereof I have hereunto set my hand and caused the seal of the United States to be affixed."

Done at the City of Washington, this 24 day of November, in the year of our Lord one thousand nine hundred and one, and of the independence of the United States the one hundred and twenty-sixth.

HIGHLY RESPECTABLE.

There are few colleges in the world that can summon graduates of the standing in society, diplomacy, theology, law and science equal to the sixty men on the same platform of that seat of learning at the celebration of the second centennial of the founding of Yale college. Among the notables were the president of the United States, the present Secretary of State and his predecessor in office, the Chief Justice of the Supreme Court, the ambassador to Great Britain, the former Prime Minister of Japan and the Bishop of Gotland of the Swedish parliament—foremost leaders of the world in knowledge of affairs of state. Presidents of universities were numerous, with famous teachers from Russia, Germany, England and Scotland. There were editors of our great newspapers and magazines and authors in the front rank of literature. Religious leaders, Protestant and Roman Catholic, expounders of law, and men eminent in the science of education received recognition of their services for mankind.

Coloquos, the assassin, was executed in pursuance of the sentence of the Court, on Tuesday morning, Oct. 29. The criminal asked one favor. He wanted to make a statement to a great audience. This was denied. An autopsy was made which showed that his brain and other organs were normal. The body was buried in the prison grounds but they have been returned to the elements ere this, as a carboy of acid was poured into the coffin.

Earl Li Hung Chang, the eminent Chinese statesman and diplomat is dead, Earl Li was born according to his own statement and other credible authority in 1822, hence at the time of death he was nearing his 80th year. The malady that brought the fatal result was gastritis.

BUY WHAT WE DO NOT NEED!

Here in the Pacific States we want trade with Asia, but we cannot have it on an extensive scale unless we take Asiatic commodities; nor can we build up a trade with the Philippine Islands, or even keep the Philippine Islands, unless we allow the introduction of their products into the United States on terms free, or substantially free.—A tariff reformer.

May the INDEPENDENT ask, must we be compelled to buy things we do not need, that trade be promoted by outsiders? Is there anything grown or made in foreign countries that we refuse to import, when its possession will be to our benefit or pleasure? There is a deal of nonsense hashed up by those who are opposed to our tariff laws. And as to Philippine products. They ought to come to our Continental ports as free as oranges, lemons and grapes come from California to Portland. But because that should be so, is no reason for "reforming" our tariff laws on free trade lines, because the Philippines are a part of the United States.

PROGRESS MADE.

The Census Bulletin of manufacturers in Oregon has been received. The growth for the past fifty years is presented in a table by decades. In 1850 there were but 52 manufacturing establishments in all Oregon which then included Washington and Idaho. In 1900, there were 3088, with Washington and Idaho excluded. The capital invested, fifty years ago, was \$843,600. In 1900 it was \$3,422,393. At the first epoch, the employees, men, women and children, were 285 and at the later date 17,236 of whom 1825 were women, over 16 years of age and 295 were children under 16 years of age. The value of the manufactured products last year was \$46,000,587, but fifty years before, it was only \$2,236,640.

The population in 1850 was 13,294 and the per cent. engaged in manufactures was 2.1, and in 1900, the people here were 409,285 of whom 4.2 per cent. were engaged in factory work. The increase in the number of factories occurred in the ten years between 1890 and 1900, but the greatest per cent. of increase was between 1850 and 1860 when 494.2 per cent. was reached. The increase in the value of products was greatest during the decade from 1880 to 1890, amounting to 279 per cent., while, during the decade from 1890 to 1900, the increase was but 11 per cent., the smallest per cent. of increase during any decade since 1850. This was during free trade times.

The principal manufacturing industry in the state, is lumber. Then comes flour with products valued at \$4,187,478 to be followed by canning of fish, \$1,843,324. This last gives preeminence to the Columbia river over any other river in the world. One industry of the past ten years is worthy of inspection, that of paper and wood pulp, which employs 716 wage earners and puts out a product worth \$1,305,696. This occupies the place on the list just below the car shops, that manufacture and repair rolling stock, valued at \$1,750,926.

TUESDAY'S ELECTIONS.

The Portland Telegram puts the election returns of Tuesday last in this nut shell:

Beth Low, Fus, elected Mayor of New York by 29,864. W. T. Jerome, Fus, elected District Attorney of New York County by 15,000.

All Fusionist nominees for Justices of Supreme Court in New York Co. elected.

New York Assembly of 1902 will stand Republicans and Fusionists, 138; Democrats, 42.

Buffalo, Syracuse, Albany and Troy elected Republican Mayors.

Nash re-elected Governor of Ohio by 60,000. Senator Foraker's re-election is certain.

Baltimore Republicans elected their entire city ticket, but Maryland Legislature will be Democratic by narrow margin.

Schmitz, Union Labor, elected Mayor of San Francisco by 4109. Union Labor also elected three Supervisors.

San Francisco Republicans elected Auditor, Sheriff, Tax Collector, Treasurer, County Clerk, Public Administrator and six Supervisors.

Democrats elected City Attorney, Recorder, District Attorney, Coroner two Police Judges and nine Supervisors.

Republicans carry Pennsylvania by 70,000 to 80,000.

W. Murray Crane elected Governor of Massachusetts for the third time.

Republicans of Nebraska elected their state ticket by 10,000.

Republicans of Utah victorious and South Dakota probably elected eight Republican Circuit Judges.

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Crocker, the Tammany boss, left his home in England and came to New York to elect Bryan. He failed. This year he came back to elect Shephard and has failed again. He now quits.
